Ges spiked by the 100-pound quartof these laws, similar to a light testing law of several years ago, probably still on the books but outmoded, is the one which requires a test of motor vehicles for safety before they go on the road, or at least before a license for their operation on the highways can be issued by the tax assessor-collector. Garages and mechanics will be licensed to perform this service and a fee will be charged, following the same old pattern. We are not informed how much this fee will be.

"The amended law concerning automobile owners' and drivers' public liability and property damage does not go into effect until January 1. However, it is the one about which there is more beating of the bushes than any other. The state fire insurance commissioner and the state safety head have been jerking up on the reins figuratively curbing the insurance agents in such towns as Floydada. They claim these agents are jumping the gun, some making mis-statements. The fact is the agents are just about right about the matter. It is foolhardy not to have insurance protection against public liability and property damage whether or not any new law is passed. The new law puts the bee on any man who has an accident. Listen to your insurance agent. Honesty and fairness in his category will average as high as that of the people in the state safety organizations or in the state insurance commission. The law does not say buy insurance against public liability and property damage in so many words. But that is definitely what it amounts to. The law will increase many fold, make a heavy increase in the personnel that works in this department. which is in line with other increased costs of being governed.
