Motor Vehicle Responsibility Follows Owner

As explained by Director Garri-

son, here is how it will operate when the law becomes effective in Texas

Assume that a Texas motorist is driving his autombile in another state having a similar security type safety responsibility law and is involved in an accident that results in death or injury to a person or property damage to any one person in excess of \$100. He will be required, under the laws of that state, to furnish proof of his ability to meet damage claims either through insurance or by depositing sufficient security to cover the apparent damage he caused.

Should the Texas motorist fail to do this, the authorities of the other state will suspend his privileges to own or operate a motor vehicle in Others found their | that state and will send a certified een. Others report he has satisfied the law of the other state to the same extent that he would be required to satisfy the Texas law.

In the same manner, the new Texas law applies to non-resident motorists who are involved in accidents in this state, resulting in death or injury to a person, or property dam age to any person in excess of \$100. Non-residents who fail to meet the requirements of the Texas law wil have their privileges suspended in this state and also in their home have called for similar action there.

"When you understand that 10 per cent of the traffic accidents in most states are caused by out-ofstate drivers," Director Garrison said, "You will appreciate the importance of this provision in our law. It means that a visiting motorist will no longer be able to skip out of responsibility for his damages by crossing the state line. If he does, he will find the administrator of his own state's safety responsibility law waiting for him with a suspension order. I think this alone will do much to promote greater safety on our highways.'

Since 34 other states have enacted safety responsibility laws similar to the one that soon will become effective in Texas, the area where motorists are not subject to these modern statutes has been considerably narrowed. While the safety responsibility law in a few of these states does not include this reciporocal provision, they are rapidly adding it. In addition traffic accident experts predict that most of the 13 states that have failed to enact these statutes will do so within the next two

\$300,000 dial telephone system, "equal to the world's best," if the Floydada city council approves the telephone company's request for an Oakley, manager of Southwestern Bell, announced today. The new rate set-up was dicsussed with members of the city council this week and a date for a hearing was asked for.

"An increase in rates is necessary in Floydada to help offset losses on the company's operations here and to help justify going ahead with the new dial system." Oakley said.

In the face of the high price levels of materials, equipment, and labor in recent years, the manager said, the company has spent \$445,-00 to extend and improve service facilities here.

"Actually, the Floydada telephone system is more than twice as large as at the beginning of 1946." he explained. There are now 1,580 telephones in service here, compared to 650 in January, 1946,

"Telephone rates have been increased in Floydada only once in the las 14 years in August, 1948. That increase, together with the addition of more telephones here, has brought in more revenues, but costs of furnishing service have been

Four-Party Line Service New rates required by the company for main service are \$9 a month for a business telephone, \$5 monthly for one-party residence service, \$4 for twoparty service, and \$3.25 for a proposed new four- party line



HALF OF AMERICAN MALES LIVE LESS THAN 65 YEARS

Despite the great victories of medical science in combating premature death, life ends before age 65 for half of all American males and 40 percent of all females. Each year about 360,000 men and 200,000 women die before reaching their 65th birthday.

These figures include over 100,000 deaths annually among infants under one year of age, and this although the mortality rate among babies in the first year of life has been reduced by more than one third in the last 10 years.

"While there are many biological and environmental hazards which beset early life, much more can be done either to prevent or to over-come them," statisticians observe, "The measures being taken in many communities to specially provide facilities for the care of prematurely born childern should prove effective in reducing further the mortality in

All of the common diseases, including the so-called "old age dis eases,"cause a relatively high proportion of deaths before age 65,it is noted. This is especially notable in deaths attributed to heart disease and cancer.





Deer recommends the use of power sprayer-with a pressuse of decrease the effectiveness of the treatment, he says. Animals should Your doctor is aware of the many, be sprayed while being held in a illnesses and injuries which have a chute and the spray nozzle should be held no further than four inches from the backs of the animals. It is ing messages to and from the brain, best, he adds, to use a full gallon of spray on each animal and from 10 to 15 seconds are required for making a thorough application.

The spray material should consist of 71/2 pounds of 5 per cent rotenone dust for each 100 gallons of water. Mix it thoroughly and this is often a rather difficult job because the fine rotenone dust is hard to wet. This mixture, says Deer, is the cheapest and most effective teratment for controlling cattle grubs.

The first application should be

peated at three weeks intervals for as long as needed. Grubs normally begin making their appearance about this time of the year; howeer, this will vary with different sections of the state.

A good control job, points out Deer, will mean increased weight for the beef herd and a higher selling price when the animals are marketed. The dairyman with a grub free herd can expect a good increase in milk production. The specialist says local county agents can supply additional information on the when and how parts of a complete grub control program and suggests that livestock producers contact him at an early date.

Views and Comment

For the record Saturday bank debits broke all records again in Floydada as did the movement of money and goods through retail channels.

As is usually the case when many transients hit a community there is an occasional person who has to have the attention of the peace officers, but todate the heavy influx of workers has had little of this mixture in it, so far as Floyd county is concerned. We hope we are not bragging too soon when we say that the per centage of good behavior has been high indeed. One thing that people who have had contact in retail establishments would like to see bettered, is the aroma. Since most of the transients take out Friday afternoon to get their week-end shopping done, it seems they ought to have time for a sponge bath before they crowd into close spaces during Saturday. There have been no cases of "discrimination" we have heard of locally todate. Retail people have leaned backward in their determination not to find fault with the public they have found with ready cash to spend.

Net of the big cotton crop will be relatively small this season. We mean this when and as the new year rolls around and the cotton growers get ready to settle with Uncle Sam. One contributing factor in this respect will be the failure to keep track of outlay in a proper manner. Whatever else may be said in the usual complaining tone against the federals who lay it on thick these days, it is a fact that internal revenue people are going to recognize any legitimate expense a taxpayer incurs in the conduct of his business. But the taxpayer will complain in January about his high tax bill, some of which may be occasioned by his own carelessness in keeping track of expenses he has incurred in the conduct of his affairs during the taxable period. Right now, for instance ,with astronomical expense accounts, there may be some who are forgetting to think along this line. No revenue collector is capable of telling a man what went with all the money he had in November. The collector is entitled to see a record of these expenses. If the taxpayer has made no such record he will be cheating himself and giving the revenue department the blame.

With cotton gin yards in the area congested with loads of cotton, the danger of fire and the thought of all the consequences of such a calamity has the ginner treading softly. A spark and even a mild breeze could create havoc at dozens of points where big accumulations of the fleecy staple are assembled. Also the danger of fire is ever present in cotton fields and in cottonpiled on the ground. cotton fields and in cotton piled on the ground sure are stubborn and they sure are costly.

How much Floyd county cotton will be ginned at points out of the county this year will never be known, we assume. Not to put the idea into anybody's head but merely to record the fact, five or 10 bales loaded up and just a small chore, if it saves 24 hours. The loading is the most expensive and time-consuming. If a man can keep his equipment moving and keep some of his cotton off the ground he is going to some neighboring gin a few miles away instead of one where he habitually takes his staple.

Local county agents can supply information on taking and sending soil samples to the testing laboratory at College Station.

- Enforcement Begins January 1, 1952. On this date, the new Safety Responsibility Law, as passed by the Legislature, goes into effect. This law was designed to protect you against financially irresponsible drivers and owners of motor vehicles involved accidents. It affects all drivers and motor vehicle owners (except Federal, State, County and City-owned
- What Must You Do After An Accident? Under existing laws, you must file a written report to the Department of Public Safety if your car is involved in an accident where there is a death, an injury or property damage in excess of \$25. Under the new law, a written report must be filed within ten days if your car is in an accident resulting in death, injury or property damage in excess of \$100.
- You Don't Have to Carry Liability Insurance, But . . . If you are not insured against bodily injury and property damage liability, you must be able to deposit with the Department of Public Safety security equal to the estimated damage, not exceeding \$15,000.00, to cover all claims growing out of an accident anywhere in Texas in which you or your motor vehicle were involved. If you cannot establish financial responsibility for the future, your driver's license and your motor vehicle license plates are automatically suspended.
- It's Easy to Establish Financial Responsibility with a motor vehicle liability insurance policy. If you do not now have such a policy, call your local insurance agent today. He is a qualified insurance counselor who will be happy to advise you concerning your needs.
 - What is the Minimum of Your Liability? The law permits each driver to establish the following minimum limits of liability: up to \$5,000.00 for injuries sustained by one person; up to \$10,000.00 for all personal injuries resulting from one accident, and up to \$5,000.00 for property damage. You do not have to establish such liability but it is the easiest way.


