

album, also velvet-covered it was a lovely trip......I handed the pres-ents to my own children, the dolls and the toy pistols and the books and games by the light of coal oil lamps and the warmth of coal fires

I sat by the fire with my husband, our children in homes of their own at Christmas ... I cooked turkeys and baked big hams, made pies and cakes and salads.....laughed with my friends, children and

some sixty years Such a trip... of going of seeing and remembering but the laughter I heard at last was not of my brother and I about our gifts, not of my own little children, but of my own dear happy grandchildren, their glowing like the Christmas stars outside, their laughter like the sweet ringing of Christmas bells, their joy unbounded and the voice of the littlest of them all, little Dale, saying, "grandmother that picture is the Little Lord Jesus."




