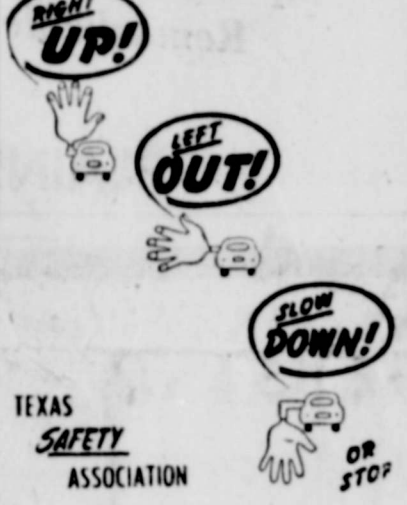

Figures for the total measured moisture in Floydada was set at 1.32 inches at the city hall. Probability that this was exceeded in the northeast half of the county is indicated in reports from that area.

Wheat men are jubilant over the fact that the moisture will make their small grain crops take deep root and the indications are now that several thousand acres of wheat will be added to the area available for live stock grazing in the late winter and early spring weeks.

No change was made in the capital structure of the bank at this meeting. In the year the surplus fund of the bank was increased from \$50,000 to \$75,000. At December 31 the capital stock, surplus and undivided profits stood at \$162,872.38.

In the year the deposits of the bank more than doubled. A year ago the bank report showed deposits of \$2,907,000. In the December statement the report showed \$5,063,486.72. The bank's deposits passed the five million mark for the first time in its history.

La Font to Run For Senator

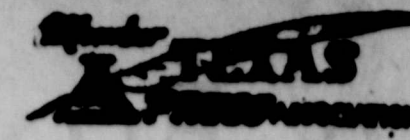

DON'T DO IT. The Borger Herald suggest a simple formula for public officials that would be good to go by in these days of talk of corruption in high places: "If you are a public official, local, state or national, and if what you have in mind to do, you would not want currently printed in the newspaper or analyzed over the radio, simply don't do it."

This thing of keeping your car in service on the roads, highways and streets is going to be sort of a different proposition to what it has been in the past. This is supposing that the new inspection law is carried out as it is written. This is our point of view. However, at least one person has a different opinion, who declares that if a man keeps his automobile in the condition it ought to be kept in for driving on the highways without endangering the lives of other people he will not have any trouble with the highway patrolman nor with the inspection stations or officials. We maintain there won't be enough mufflers to go around, or some other gadget the law calls for, or if not that that your favorite station can't get the equipment to give the owner an okay as an inspector. Equipment a garage must have on hand before he can get an okay from the patrolman will be determined by the safety department. This means that in every little area of the state there will be another little czar set up to tell a man whether he can or can't do business. They are nice fellows, they are good men, they are all right, but it will be just the same whether they are not nice fellows and not good men.

Appraisal of conditions over Floyd county this week following the four-day sleet and ice storm gives encouragement to the idea that there is going to be ample moisture to work land prior to the spring planting season and that range conditions will be fair to good when time for early grass to rise arrives. Also some wheat men think their

wheat is going to be good for grazing during February. A considerable acreage of wheat will be grazed for the first time this season when the ground dries out. This wheat was planted in time to come up from the fall rains but had not got set against damage by pulling up when winter hit along with the weather.

There are a good many things that many do not know about governmental powers and processes, among whom are we. For instance we did not know that the parcel post rate increase last October was ordered by the Interstate Commerce commission. We took it for granted that the Post Office department had to set rates, based on authority granted by congress. This is not to say Interstate Commerce commission did not have the authority to make a postal rate change. We just didn't know this commission had this authority, which, doubtless, it has had all the time.

The fall harvest of 1951 will go down in history as one that brought a minimum of riff raff into the county. Despite the fact that thousands of transients, principally Mexicans, came and saw and a large percentage stayed to work in the fields, the sheriff's office reports practically none of the kind of peace officer trouble like knife play, gun play, wild goings on, forgery, night prowling, and things of the kind. Of this minimum of trouble the record carries almost a zero sign against any names that indicate Latin American origin. On the other hand one or two instances have come to light of a high degree of moral integrity displayed by the Mexican element that made their Nomadic journey to the plains principally by way of bob tail trucks. A considerable sprinkling of these are finding or have found a place in the sun for their families and likely will become permanent residents of the area.

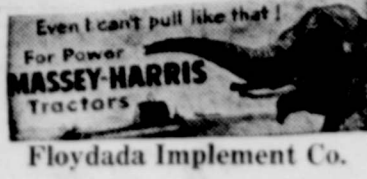

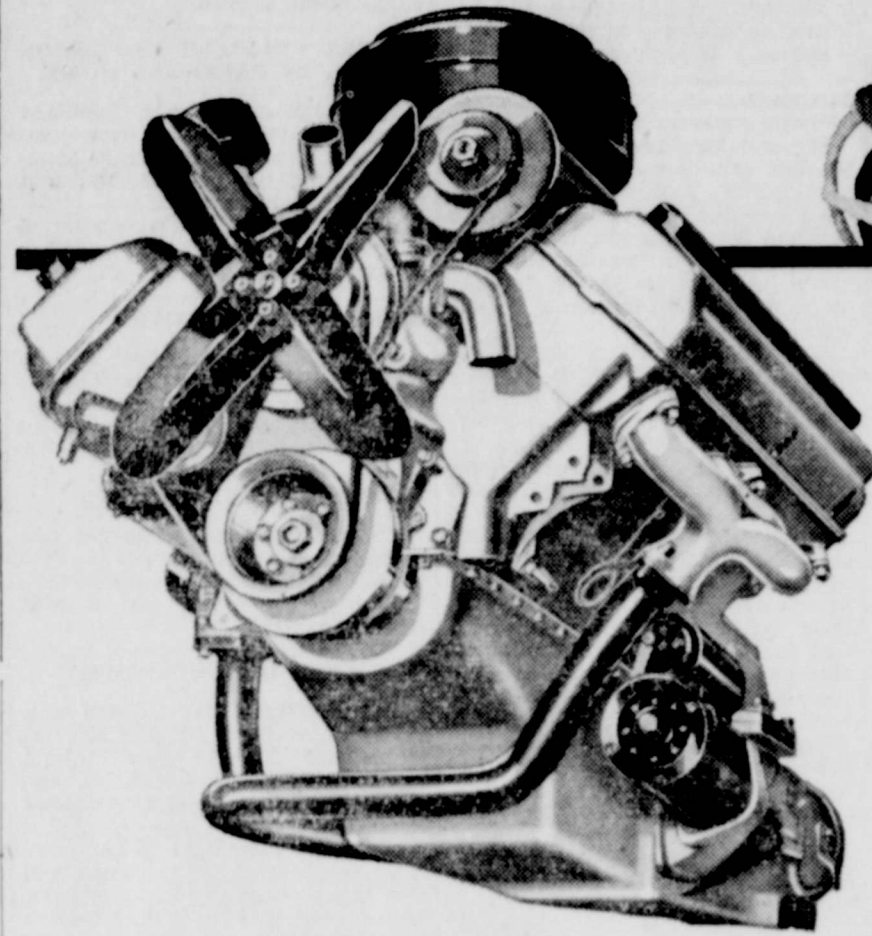

incrusted evergreens, jewels of fire gleamed on the trees, the wires were hanging necklaces fit for the queen of winter, silver icicles hung around the eaves, silver daggers of beauty, tho yesterday they looked in the cold and the gray like cruel daggers of destruction. The trees are clothed in ice dresses, but they were too heavy and bore the trees down, of ten breaking them. They were ice dragons clutching the trees to their death. But the sun is sending its warm rays and the dragons are only coats of ice that slip off with a clink and slide to the ground to water it with their tears.

Some of it was made in an ox wagon, journeys on the train, gay rides in an open fringed-top surrey, and much of it on my two feet, going back and forth over the paths of Emma which led to the school, the church, the gift-packed stores and then led to the big tree in the courtroom, up the stairs and in the courtroom where the smell of cedar and the burning of coal in the red, round stove, blended with the smell that is only of Christmas itself, oranges, apples and everything nice.

I looked at my things, the first Christmas I remember, the pretty plate with all the letters of the alphabet in gold round the edge, the little gold ring which I learned later my father had bought with the money he made by scraping and polishing buffalo horns which he sold for three dollars. Long years later this ring was lost in the water of the dirt tank at grandpa Jones' where I am sure it still shines in the dirt, perhaps far under the ground. I saw my beautiful doll with the lace on its petticoat patiently made by the hands of my pretty young mother. I held the fragile vases, the celluloid-covered work-boxes and dressing cases. I put pictures in my new velvet-covered

album. I got my schoolmates and friends to write in my autograph album, also velvet-covered. It was a lovely trip. I handed the presents to my own children, the dolls and the toy pistols and the books and games by the light of coal oil lamps and the warmth of coal fires.

I sat by the fire with my husband, our children in homes of their own at Christmas. I cooked turkeys and baked big hams, made pies and cakes and salads. Laughed with my friends, children and my parents.

Such a trip—some sixty years of going—of seeing and remembering—but the laughter I heard at last was not of my brother and I about our gifts, not of my own little children, but of my own dear happy grandchildren, their eyes glowing like the Christmas stars outside, their laughter like the sweet ringing of Christmas bells, their joy unbounded and the voice of the littlest of them all, little Dale, saying, "grandmother that picture is the Little Lord Jesus."

The year of 1952 comes to all of us: "A flower unblown; a book unread; A tree with fruit unharvested; A path untrod; a house whose rooms Lack yet the heart's divine perfumes. A landscape whose wide border lies In silent shade 'neath silent skies; A wondrous fountain yet unsealed; A casket with its gifts yet unsealed. This is the Year that for you waits Beyond tomorrow's mystic gates."
