Views and Comment

On the Texas political scene the statewide activities this year are going to be the most interesting in several years and the man who fails to qualify for the exercise of his citizenship will regret his carelessness. One race that will be interesting is that for congressman-at-large. We assume it will be a Dallas or a Houston lawyer that will get the grapes, but it will be fun trying to get some country fellow elected. Maybe the lightning will hit. And there will be considerable sound and fury over the May presidential conventions. Many a novice in the political game is due to learn a lot about politics at that time. Some of them will get trod upon in the stampede and come out declaring "politics is rotten." Politics is always rotten to the loser, you notice. And then there is the senatorial battle between the titans, Tom Connally and Price Daniel. Long Tawm is a fighter from away back—half a century of it and never lost yet. But don't discount Price Daniel. He also has what it takes. Both are amply financed to go ahead and present their respective campaigns to the people. Decision of Governor Shivers to ask for re-election to that office has brought much of these interesting developments the past week. There will be a flock of good men out for the attorney general's spot, for instance, as a result of this, fellows who have been chafing to get going on their campaigns but didn't want to try to buck Price Daniel or Allan Shivers. Pay your poll tax unless you just don't want in on the fun. Don't be silly. Politics is not rotten when you walk up to the polls and cast your secret ballot, unless there is something wrong with the man who does the voting.

Whom the Democrats will have for their candidate is not so easy forecast. It can almost be said for sure that the Republicans will name either Taft or Eisenhower. If the old guard republicans get the ascendancy and there is a deadlock it might even be a dark horse, Joe Martin, of Massachusetts. Mr. Martin is the stalwart who is really entitled to be nicknamed Mr. Republican. But the Democrats—that is another story. Because we are so ardently anti-Truman, it may be we just do not feel the pulse of the rank and file. It may be the majority of Texas Democrats want him to make the race for re-election. But our objections do not constitute a threat to bolt the party. What we want is for the Democratic party to be like the Democratic party.

The Jaycees, that bunch of irrepressible youngsters wheresoever you find them, want to get things done. They are perhaps the most vote-conscious organization in Texas. In Floyd county their organization puts it up to people that voting is not just a privilege alone. It is also a responsibility, a duty. A man who lives in the great America that God gave the people through the instrumentality of those courageous young men now nearly 200 years ago—a man who lives in that kind of a country who sits around and gripes about how rotten everything is and doesn't try to do anything about it—that man ought to be ashamed to take that attitude, they think. They are trying to arouse the people. They are forthright about it. When they say every man should qualify to exercise the duties and responsibilities of his citizenship they mean you, too.

The distinguished service of General Eisenhower in World War II, when as commander-in-chief in the field he led an army of many nations to victory is a matter of pride to almost the entire and the unanimous citizenry. The fact that the victory was nullified by later developments in the caucus room makes his record none the less illustrious. However much we admire the general, however, we are loath to believe that it is wise for the country to have a career military man for its president. So we regretted to learn that General Eisenhower was talked into permitting himself to be put forward for the job.

Death of E. C. King this week takes a useful man from the community, a man of more than ordinary courage and fortitude who battled against the odds of pioneer days and learned the hard way. Quietly he did many things he thought would contribute to the welfare of the community in numerous channels. His passing will leave several church and community service jobs to be done by others who may have taken the fulfillment of these needs for granted through a third of a century or so.

Cap and Marcia Felton Declared Missing Out On Ozark Farmstead

of the Batesville Arkansas is far more handicapped than a legless individual who ignores his disability and courageously forges ahead toward a normal happy existence.

That sage quotation pretty well sums up the indomitable spirit of a Mountain View paraplegic farm veteran, whose bright outlook and vigorous plans for the future stand out like a beacon light in spite of recent misfortune that came as a serious physical and financial setback.

But Cap Felton and his pretty wife, Marcia, are too busy mapping out improvements on their picturesque 70-acre farm to fret over an automobile accident last June when both were hospitalized for several months with serious injuries. Marcia sustained a broken leg, from which she is just now recovering and Cap's left leg was amputated as a result of the mishap.

Veteran of Anzio Beachhead
A veteran of the Anzio beachhead fighting and Southern France invasion of World War II, Felton was paralyzed from the waist down in the explosion of a land mine near Cannes, France.

He has taken more than normal interest in class work and has carried out more improvement than the average veteran," commented Thomas Gary, of Batesville, VA training officer in this area.
Natives of Texas, Mr. and Mrs. Felton moved to Arkansas and their present location about five years ago. Their new six-room stone home is situated in a picturesque valley about four miles from Mountain View on Kohoko road. A large window in their living room allows them to look out on a beautiful meadow and a captivating range of the Ozark mountains.
Came From The Plains
"We can really appreciate these beautiful mountains," Cap exclaimed. "You see, we came here from the plains of West Texas."
Felton has a special jeep, which is rigged up to pull disc plows, mowers, distributors and harrows. His principal mode of transportation is a specially equipped Buick with brakes, dimmer light and gas feed attached to a lever under the steering wheel.

Cap Felton is indeed a man of courage and a tribute to the rehabilitation program of the Veterans administration. And Cap gets plenty of help from his wife, who weighs less than one hundred pounds, and who operates the mower and performs a variety of other chores around the farm.
When the Feltons first moved to Stone county, he started raising hogs and broilers and invested his profits in land improvements and set his sight on cattle raising. He now plans to build up his herd to 25 or 30 registered beef cattle and develop his farm and meadows.
Cap attends the Veterans school and he carries out recommendations made by the Extension department.

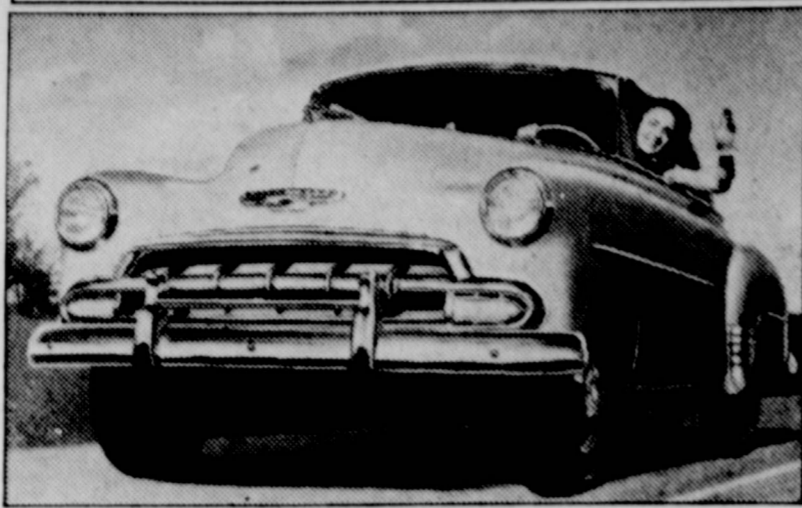

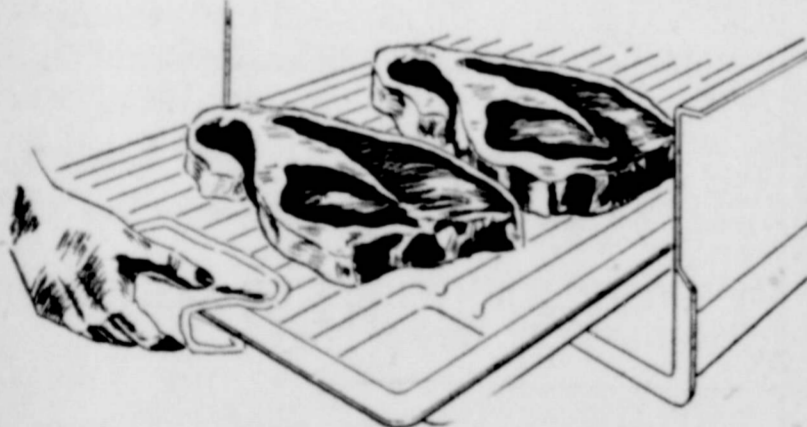

Self-Employed Coverage Not Voluntary Tax

LUBBOCK—Many self-employed persons do not know that the 1950 amendments to the Social Security Act extend coverage to them, according to John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock social security office.

This change became effective on January 1, 1951. Self-employed persons now have the same right to benefits on behalf of themselves and their families as employees.

Self-employment includes individual store owners, partners, pulpwood operators, owners of shoe shine stands and numerous other business activities. There are 14 specific exceptions for professional people, among them doctors, lawyers, optometrists, architects, veterinarians, professional engineers, accountants, funeral directors and farmers.

Self-employment coverage is not voluntary. The individual is either covered or not covered. The self-employed person's income is reported with his annual income tax return. The first report is due before March 15, 1952. The tax rate is 2-3/4 % of net business profit.

A representative from the Lubbock Social Security office will be in Floydada at the Post Office on Wednesday January 16th at 9:00 (nine) to assist persons in Social Security matters.

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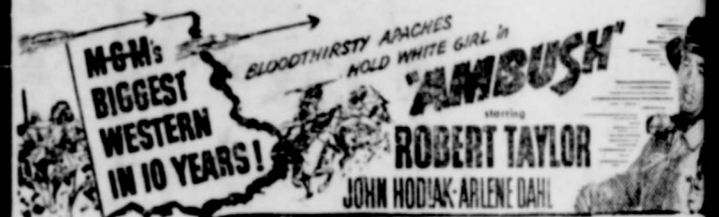
