

Plans for New Auditorium Sunday morning about 7:30 o'clock, the bodies of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Hamilton of Lockney were found near their wrecked car about four miles north of Floydada near the Jess Shurbet home.

A passerby, Bruce Mitchell of Plainview, called a Harmon ambulance, who carried the injured couple to Peoples hospital here.

On examination, it was found that Mr. Hamilton had suffered a broken neck, a skull injury and possibly internal injuries. Mrs. Hamilton, who is office nurse at the Lockney General hospital, was carried to the Lockney hospital after an examination here. She suffered a compound fracture of the arm, a broken nose, an ankle and leg injury and deep shock. Later in the day Mrs. Hamilton regained consciousness and asked for her husband. The Harmon ambulance removed him to the Lockney hospital Sunday afternoon


State Highway Patrolman Dan Saunders stated that the car occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Hamilton apparently overturned four times. Mrs. Hamilton was thown out the first time the car overturned and her husband was thrown clear the fourth time. The car was traveling east. It was thought the couple had started to visit relatives in Oklahoma. They were last seen at 5 o'clock in Lockney. The motor of the automobile was cold when Mitchell found the couple and their wrecked car Sunday morning.


Mr. Hamilton died in the Lockney hospital Tuesday morning at 2 o'clock. His body was carried to his former home, Wynnewood, Oklahoma, by the Carter Funeral Home ambulance accompanied by his father Roy Hamilton and brother, John Hamilton, who arrived in Lockney Sunday evening.

Mrs. Hamilton is still in the Leckney hospital and it was reported on Wednesday that her condition was improved. She is also announced by Coach L. F. Gresham, suffering from facial paralysis.

Mrs. Hamilton is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Hargo, also of Wynnewood.

Mr. Hamilton was 26 years of age and was employed by the Lockney





The requirement that when postal cards are bought at the post office in quantities of more than 49 at a time, an additional 10 percent shall be collected, has caused considerable eye-brow raising throughout the country. It develops that this is done by an act of congress, and is not a postal regulation that something can be done about unless and until the congress applies itself to this part of the national statute. Thus it would appear that Postmaster General Donaldson is not the only person in Washington who is affected by the heat.

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An economy tip may be contained in the fact that while postcards, bought in quantities of 50 or more sell at a 10 per cent advance over postcards bought in quantities of 49 or less. Four-cent air mail postcards still cost only 4 cents and you can buy them in any quantity without the additional 10 per cent. You can air mail a post card for four cents. Thus you could air mail a post card instead of an air mail letter. Many fast messages are short enough to be put on a postcard.

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Probably there are times when the air mail facilities are overloaded. Experience and observation seem to indicate this may be true. Often an air mail letter is as slow or slower reaching its destination than a letter mailed in the regular way with regular postage. But when an air mail letter does catch the schedule it is supposed to travel on it really skips through the dew. What it is that often slows down air mail to a slow train through Arkansas pace is one of the things that is not known to this affiant.

farm records can be used to find the weak points in present operating plans. Parm records, he continues, are a kind of mirror. They reflect for study the year's business. And, too, records will show what farm enterprises should be expanded or cur-tailed. Cost of production figures on
