Paving on Fifth to High School To Follow Road to Baptist Camp

Paving on Fifth street in Floydada from its intersection at Second with highway 207, south past the gates of the athletic field and covering a 43-foot area facing nearly two blocks of the high school grounds was contracted for this week to be done by the West Texas Construction company, a Lubbock firm, at a cost which will be \$125 per square yard. Total expenditure of nearly \$6,000 is indicated.

Also on the job already with the preparation of the first set of plans for the county road construction program is the Lubbock Engineering company which began running surveys last week on the road from Highway 70 at the J. R. Belt farm east of Aiken, south to Irick. This is the first of five road building projects which the county will carry out as expeditiously as possible...

## Views and Comment

When you're in business there is no stopping place. Take a man on the farm, in the grocery, in the shop or sales room. He did all right a few years ago with what he had to do with. But his business grew and he grew and people had new demands. He had to keep on putting money back into the business. If he keeps going he always will. Same with the city. Argue whether or not it was wise for the city to be in business, the fact remains that it has water and sewer and light customers. Right now it's light business demands that more money go into it or failing this that it's business, relatively, grow smaller. That's about the story we hear from the city hall. The engineer's graphs seem to bear it out. Assuming the property owners will go along with the city council, only previous mistake we think the council might make would be in the options and maturities they agree to on the bonds, which are to be revenue-bearing. When and if another issue has to be passed on, nothing can be done about it unless and until the owners of the current issue are satisfied, either by contract made in advance or by agreement when the time comes.

As a side thought, The Hesperian thinks the city ought to go up on its light rates. So says the voice of experience. All the big boys are having to do it. And the graph on expense for the Floydada plant inevitably is curving upward fast. You can always go down. There comes a time when you can't go up. The rates the city has in effect now were made 12 years ago. Compare in your mind other prices then and now.

Since we have begun about things of which we are not too well informed instead of talking about the weather of which we are also uninformed, we had as well go on and declare our belief that the policy failures of Mr. Truman, Mr. Marshall and Secretary Acheson in China indicate the probable inability of the regime to operate a wise foreign policy anywhere. Their activities in China spoiled all the good that missionaries and statesmanlike efforts had built up in a half century. Short years ago the enlightened leaders and the people of China in general—470 million of them—were firm friends of the United States. This half century of increasing friendship has been destroyed by inept bungling which aided the Soviets, weakened the Chinese government. The congress took an attitude, even voted funds to send to the Chinese, which the hierarchy refused to send. Now we reflect in wonder where in all American history is recorded so painful a story of inability to judge events, of such perfect ineptness in dealing with them.

In these kind of times when the battle for the minds of men rages, harsh words, charges and counter charges fly thick, temperance in speech is so rare as to be remarkable. But a temperate word sometimes sounds out at the last like a trumpet. For instance, the words of Congressman George Mahon the other day in which he related that the Soviets are now ahead of the United States in the race for supremacy in the air. He said, among other things, that the Soviets are considerably ahead of the United States in the development of air machines. This seems to be a statement of fact on which all the authorities agree. But he didn't go back to that statement made four years ago by him in which he pointed up the refusal of the executive department to carry out the will of the congress in the development of the nation's air arm. At that time he remarked for the record that such refusal of the president and the defense department made one dubious of the ability to make our form of government function (words of that tenor). What Mr. Mahon could be saying is that if the president, the Pentagon and the state department had not set themselves up to disobey the will of the people we wouldn't be in this particular kind of a predicament. To us it is one of the many such acts which we think can rightly be charged to the executive department. Where Mr. Mahon is temperate many others are quite caustic in the president, his secretary of state, and the heads of the national defense department.

John C. White, young Commissioner of Agriculture for Texas, who went into office in the last general election after winning over unbeatable J. E. McDonald, talks an understandable and common sense language about the enforcement of the state's inspection law on weighing and measuring devices. The chances are roughly one out of five that the Texas motorist is buying his gasoline out of a faulty gasoline pump and the housewife one out of five times is getting her groceries weighed on a scale that is inaccurate. He points out these faulty devices as not the result in hardly ever an instance of deliberate fraud but rather are results of careless maintenance. For our part we add by parenthesis the thought that the grocer or gasoline dispenser may as likely be cheating himself as the customer. What we like about the story Mr. White sends out is this statement: "Essentially the inspection program is not a police action to ferret out criminals but a service of the government to see that equity prevails in commercial transactions." We think you're getting somewhere when you approach an age-old bartering problem in a common sense state of mind like that.

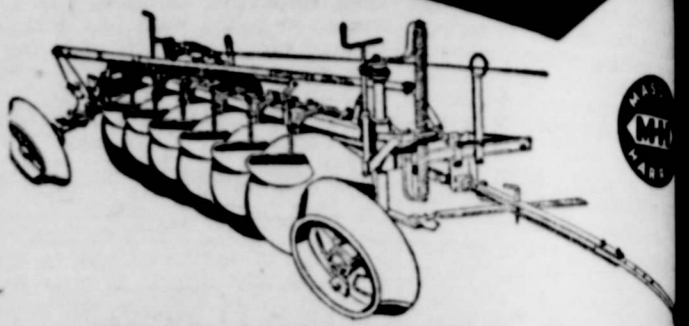

# Red-Tape Drones Heavy Burden IN Texas Road Making Program

ABILENE, Tex., Feb.—With string attached, the Federal government "granted" Texans this fiscal year two-thirds of the road money they paid in taxes to the U. S. treasury, according to an article that appeared recently in the Austin American-Statesman that is reproduced in the last issue of West Texas Today, the magazine of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

"The Editor's Notebook" in the Austin newspaper contained the following:

"Several weeks ago the Texas Highway Department announced that the federal government has 'granted' Texas \$36,621,000 for highway aid in the coming fiscal year.

"The state's program, including

\$15 million direct appropriation for lateral roads, regular state gasoline tax supported work, and federal matching, runs a little over \$100 million a year.

**Gets Back a Lot Less**  
"But the point is that the federal government takes a great deal more than any \$26 million out of Texas in road-use and motor vehicle taxes every year, and thus the state gets back a lot less than it contributes in taxes designed to support the highway program.

"Texas fared well in the generous federal 'grants,' with only New York getting more refunds of the money collected from citizens of a state.

"But the federal money comes

back with a lot of strings. For one thing, no matter what the state's needs, nor its local road financing program, it is limited to \$14,205,046 for construction of primary highways. It is required by a federal fiat to limit secondary and feeder roads to \$9,577,321; and it is graciously permitted to ask government an apply \$2,799,612 to expressways and urban projects.

**Federals Must Approve**  
"To get any item of the federal grants, Texas must prepare plans according to federal specifications, award contracts and supervise construction, all subject to federal approval.

"The allotment itself was made in proportion to area, population and mileage of postal roads, mileage and population of rural areas, population of urban areas and so on.

"Based on the state's collection of gasoline taxes, the federal government took more than \$37 million out of the state in gasoline sales tax levies alone; besides which is collected a lot of taxes on motor vehicles, tires, tubes, automobile accessories and parts. Texas will get back probably two-thirds the amount it paid, and that with strings attached.

"This is a perfect example of the type of thing the voters of Texas and the United States ought to wipe out next year, and they ought to be mighty sure that the votes they cast will be effective in that direction.

"It is no generous boon and benevolent grant to give back to Texas half the money taken away from it in road-use taxes.

**Where Is The Benefit**  
"It is no benefit to Texas to support a horde of federal bureaucrats out of the money taken away from motorists in the form of federal taxes.

"It is no compliment to the intelligence of Texas road-builders, highway planners and construction supervisors to require them to come in to some federal agency for approval on every phase of projects in which the state puts up money, in order to get federal matching from the money turned back to the state.

Why should a 50 per cent tribute in the name of bureaucracy be imposed, and then Texas be called upon to acknowledge in humble appreciation the generous 'grant' by the federal government of only a part of the money taken away from its citizens for the ostensible purposes of highway construction?

"Federal 'grants' with similar strings attached, and in almost every instance with their same factor of giving back a whole lot less than taken away from Texas taxpayers, run into other phases of governmental projects and operation.

"No wonder state officials of Texas and many other states are vocal in their demands that the states be let alone to carry on their own improvement program, and that their citizens be not penalized by the back-breaking load of federal taxes used in supporting hordes and hordes of non-productive federal red-tape drones."

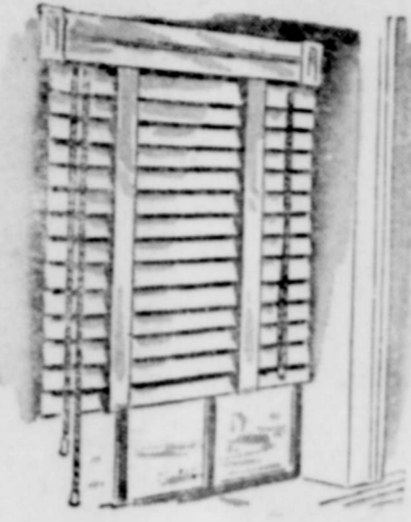

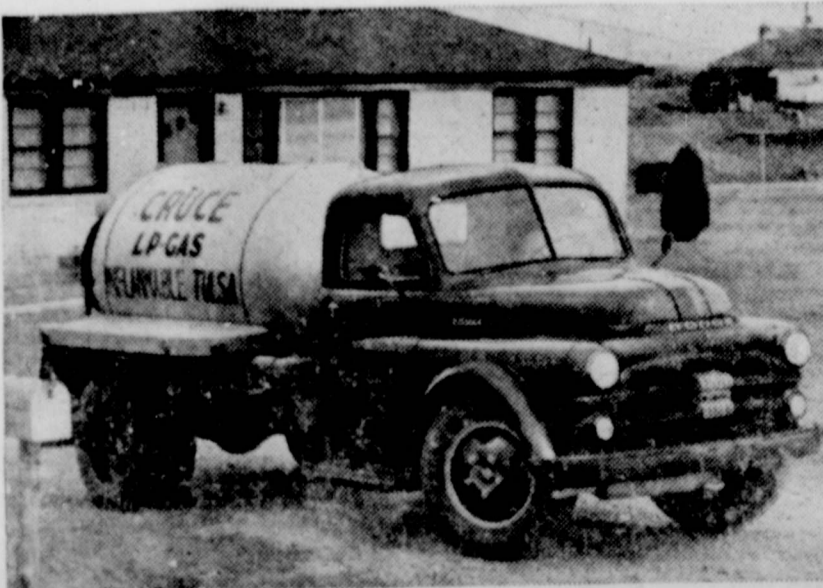

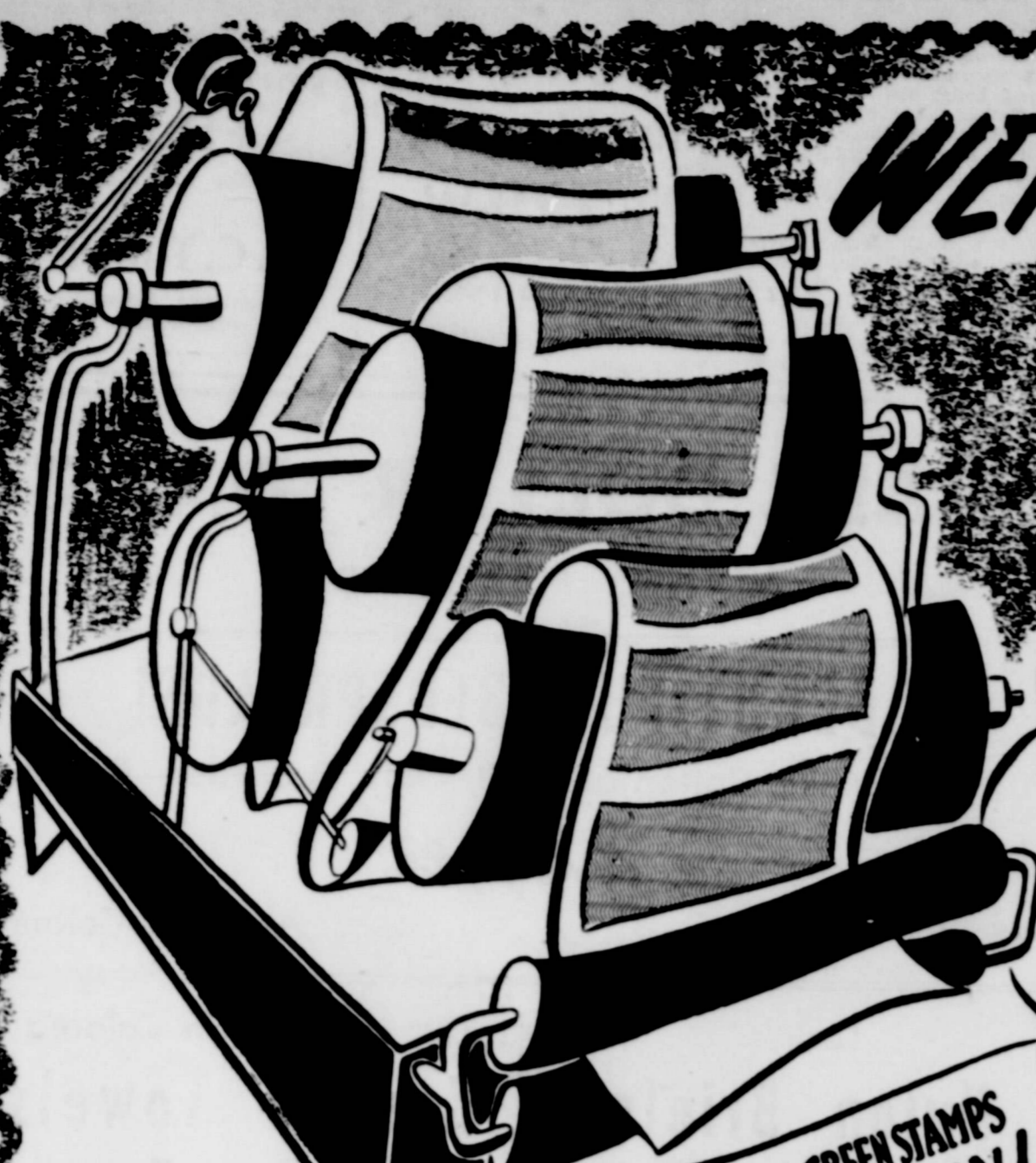
