Q. Who may take the first step toward the creation of a district?

A. Any individual or group of individuals who feel that a district is needed for the benefit of the land surrounding their homes.

Q. How may an individual or group signify this interest to the State Board?

A. By requesting a blank petition from the Texas State Board.

Q. What is necessary besides filling out the blank petition form?

A. The petition must be signed by at least 50 (a majority where there are less than 50) landowners of the proposed district. The petition, filled in and signed, and an outline map of the proposed district, must then be filed with the State

must set a date, place, and give due notice of a public hearing to be held for an open discussion of the questions of desirability and necessity of the creation of the proposed dis-

Q. Who may take part in the hearing? A. Any interested party may

present spoken or written opinions or testimony. Q. If the general opinion of

the hearing is unfavorable, what does the Board do with the petition for organization of the district?

A. The petition is denied. Qi Does this denial make it impossible for interested persons to go any further toward organizing a district?

A. No. Another petition may be presented after six months. Questions and Answers will be picked up here next week)


