



Present indications are that the early April freeze didn't do any big damage even to the most faradvanced crops. Some of these are beginning to fill out the shucks in the meshes. The late crop runs the hazard of hot late June winds, but even this prospect is discounted unless a long period of dry ensues in the areas southwestward.

What the weather has in store in the matter of hail storms is all a matter of conjecture, too. But most wheat raisers are reading about giant deep snow packs in the rockies and are taking the queue by insuring to some extent, progressively more as the prospect for greater yields are seen. There is ample moisture under the crop for all present needs.

The change in the outlook, when the weather man begins to turn his eyes favorably toward the high plains, is also reflected in better range conditions. Stock cattle and hogs are in bigger demand. Swine raisers who were liquidating their herds a month ago are now frantically looking for feeder size shoats, for brood sows, gilts and pigs. A rise in the hog market hit last week to carry tops considerably above \$18 at Floydada. Eighty and 100-pound feeders that went to market at \$12 and \$13 are now being sought at \$17

vides for representation in county conventions by precincts on the basis of one vote for every 25 cast for governor in that precinct for the party candidate in the last general election, cost several precincts in Floyd county a vote in the Democratic presidential conventions last Saturday. Assuming, as usual, that every precinct should have at least one vote in the Democratic primary The Hesperian said last week the total voting strength in the county convention Tuesday of this week woud be 41 votes. The fact is that every precinct did not have a voice in the county convention and there was no need for such precincts to hold conventions. It would have been a waste of time With these (assumed) votes eliminated by the factual rule of law the total voting strength in the county convention was 32 votes. The precincts (which should have had a voice in the presidential conventions) however, ruled themselves out by indifference of their own electorate last November when they didn't go to the polls and vote. Only real unfairness, after you consider the matter, we would say, is in the precinct where there are not actually as many as 13 votes (to make a major fraction of 25.)

A thing we have intended to mention aforetime is the considerably greater number of voting boxes in Floyd county than in any of the neighboring or comparable counties in the high plains country. One of the reasons for this is that Floyd county was generally settled for many years before some of the other counties were put into farms. Thus, with slow transportation and communication compared with present-day, there was a need for the larger number of voting precincts. Since custom and what the people are used to have a lot to do with things it has been easier, and possibly just as well, that the larger number of precincts be continued as formerly. However, there are some parts of the county where some of the citizens think that their precincts should be abolished. But since there are not a great many elections in a year, and there are some citizens in practically every precinct who object to the abolishment of their precincts, the successive commissioners courts let the matter rock along. 
Major Changes In Water Wells **Steel Permits**

Major changes in the water well construction regulation has been announced by U.S. Department of Commerce, National Production Authority in Lubbock.

Effective May 6, 1952, water well constructors may use up to 10 tons of steel per well instead of six tons. The amendment further provides that the water well contractor may use up to 10 tons of steel per well from his second quarter inventory and he may file a supplemental CMP-4C application for the additional steel

Third quarter CMP-4C applications for third quarter allotment must be filed by May 15.
