Telephone Rate Hike Effective As of May 11

New telephone rates in Floydada are now in effect, not only in the corporate limits of the town but at all of the rural stations served by the Floydada exchange, as well. Oakley, of Plainview, commercial manager for Floydada. "The rates agreed upon within the corporate limits do not have to do with rates outside of the corporate limits," he pointed out. Soft Road Claims Life of Tot When Pick-Up Overturns

Floyd county and Floydada citizens were shocked late Saturday afternoon when the news came that young Teddy Smith, age 3, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Smith of the Antelope community 20 miles south of Floydada had died following injuries received in a pickup accident near his home.

Teddy, in company with his brother, Ronnie and a little neighbor friend, George Scott, had been assisted by their mother in loading some cotton seed in the bed of the pickup to carry to their father, who was planting in a field a short distance from the house.

Ronnie was driving the pick up with George seated in the middle and Teddy on the side near the door. The road to the field was very soft. It is thought that the pick up overturned once or twice, throwing the boys out of the truck. Ronnie and George received minor injuries in the accident, but Teddy was hurt badly. The parents rushed him to Stanley clinic in Matador where it was found he had a skull fracture and concussion. Teddy had passed away enroute to the hospital at about 4:20 o'clock.

Funeral services for Teddy Carter was held on Sunday afternoon from the Wall street Church of Christ, Elder H. Hall of Ralls officiated, assisted by Elder Ohmer W. Kirk of Floydada. Burial was in the Lakeview cemetery under the direction of the Harmon Funeral home. Pallbearers were Truman Dunavant, Jackie Johnson, Jerry Bob Harrison and Dale G. Smith. Teddy was born in Stanley clinic at Matador on January 2, 1949. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Smith, a sister, Janice and brother, Ronnie, his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Kinchloe and Mrs. R. C. Smith, all of Floyd county.

Drill Started On Krause Test

The drill on the Minnie Adams oil test well of Lakeview a half mile was still turning at a depth below 7,600 feet yesterday in a lime formation, where Standard of Texas has continued its search for oil in paying quantities on a considerable acreage they have had leased for several years. It is their second try for oil in that area. The hole is due to be projected to the 8,000-foot level. Its official location is in the northwest corner of Survey No. 32, P. D. Adams.

Drilling on Krause Land On the 8,000 foot test of the H. A. Krause land, Section 29, Block K, in extreme southwest Floyd county, the lessees lost no time in getting a rig on the ground and the drill started. Monday the drillers had rigged up their drill and set surface casing, and were making hole Tuesday. H. Bryan Toff and Brinsmere Oil Company, Fort Worth independent, are making this test. The stake was set 800 feet from the north and west lines of the section. The location is thought to be in line with the trend from the Arrick pool and the only producer in the county, the Carmickle well, just across the boundary line in Floyd county from Hale.

Quebe has been secretary-treasurer of the farm group for several years. Mitchell, in addition to his farm operations, is Texas field man for one of the leading registered swine organizations. He felt unable, he said, to take on another public service.

Views and Comment

We are glad that Memorial day is on the list of the retail trades committee of the Chamber of Commerce to be observed as a holiday by Floydada business men. Aside from the sentiment that goes with the day, the heart string pulling and the unrequited yearning which the day brings with it, a practical application is that it breaks a long stretch of duty-bound days for sales people, shop keepers and many other ordinary mortals. From the first of the year until the Fourth of July is a long jump. Apparently the last half of the year takes care of itself well enough with breaks in the routine on Thanksgiving and Christmas. Start your Memorial day off tomorrow by attending the ceremonies and services at your chosen spot—in Floydada it is the Floydada cemetery and the hour is "sunrise." Then make it a day to be represented in rest and calm if you can arrange it. Such would be a good way to observe Memorial day, a good day after a long grind of work at the counter and in the shop.

For as Far Back as we have been observing the doing of folks on old settlers day we have noted that a good many people have been spending the day planting cotton. Either planting for the first time or doing a re-do. Mostly this year it will be a re-do. The few cold days and the two days of wind made a big difference, the difference between a good stand of cotton in some fields and a stand not so good or not at all. The news is not all bad but it lacks of being all good on the cotton front. And there are people trying to do something about it as late as May 28 this year the same as for many years aforesaid.

As to progress of the cotton crop to date, we do not minimize the backward season we have had when we say that there is a lot of cotton up to a stand and off to a reasonably good start with moisture ample for immediate needs as of this date. No story is always all bad, none always all good. For instance, there is an occasional man who caught a high,

dry wind on his planting day. He had his rows running the wrong way for that particular day of this particular year. His ground dried out and he's out of luck until he gets some moisture either from the heavens or from an irrigation well. But not too much of that happened.

Splash Day in Floydada Saturday. At the municipality's \$35,000 (plus value of the site) swimming pool, and for which several thousand dollars (was it \$8,000?) was borrowed from the light fund to finish. You folks that just had to have a swimming pool better bear down and prove to the still unconvinced neighbors that we got our money's worth. Lets make it a big Splash day. That's Saturday.

And Dollar Day. That's Monday. A good many good merchandisers have put thought into making this another day that will be tops in merchandising values for you. The retailers in Floydada are working at the job.

discovered that the orifice of a flower is an attractive feature in the garden. It is in these latter counties that the housewife risks running afoul of the Pink Bollworm law as administered by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

For example, a cotton fancier in Brownsville, where planting and plow-up dates are mandatory, may find she has to destroy her "flower bed" by August 31 this year if she is to comply with regulations. This might ruin the entire effect of her summer garden, especially if she planted late in the season and the cotton did not have adequate time to bloom.

The Texas Department of Agriculture certainly has no intentions of pressing charges against housewives who innocently violate the cotton regulations. However, plants found growing in areas where their existence may constitute a breeding place for Pink Bollworm will have to be destroyed if they conflict with the legal growing season.

This word of advice, then, to the person who may contemplate adding cotton in the flower garden this year: Make sure of the law — then go ahead.

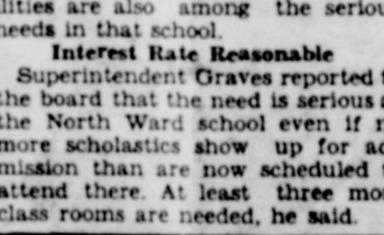

Dysentery Caused By Specific Germ

AUSTIN, Texas — Commenting on the unusually high increase of dysentery in Texas as the present time, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, described dysentery as being an infectious disease characterized by diarrhea, pain in the abdomen, and toxemia. It is caused by a specific bacteria or germ. These germs cause inflammation of the lining of the intestinal tract which produces pain through the abdomen and the discharge of many loose stools that frequently contain blood and mucus. Toxemia results from absorption of the poisonous substances produced by the germs.

"The germs gain entrance to the body through the mouth," Dr. Cox said, "and then make their way to the intestines in the same manner in which food does. When they reach the intestines they find conditions favorable to their growth, and there they establish themselves at the expense of the person infested and produce their harmful effects."

Dr. Cox warned that dysentery affects young children more often and more seriously than adults, frequently resulting fatally; however, he said, it may occur at any age. It is more prevalent during the summer season, and the great number of cases now being reported are unusual for spring.

"The germ is always expelled with the excreta of persons sick with dysentery and may continue to be expelled for some time after the patient recovers from the disease. These persons who will still discharge the germs after they recover are called carriers, and they occur more frequently in this disease than in the majority of other infectious diseases.

"Food protection and adequate sanitary measures are more urgently needed now than ever before if we control the potential possibilities of epidemic dysentery in this State."

Seventh Grade Pupil Has New Math Solution

AUSTIN — When a seventh grade arithmetic student invents something new in mathematics, that's news. Gary Lynn Nichols of Kenedy, just 13, has turned that trick. His invention or discovery is an application, to problems involving fractions, of the "casting out nines" methods of checking arithmetical answers.

Since 1946, this quick method for determining accuracy of answers for problems in multiplication and division of whole numbers and decimals has been approved by officially adopted texts used in Texas public schools. But the texts did not offer a method of checking addition and subtraction by the means of using this system for checking fractions.

Mrs. Thelma G. Gregory, teacher of arithmetic at Kenedy, began, in 1946, to throw out the challenge to her students to find a way to use the "casting out nines" system on types of problems not yet covered. Almost immediately a student, James Kolinek, then an eighth grader and now a senior in Kenedy High, took up the challenge and worked out a method of checking addition and subtraction problems. But until December, 1961, no one came near a solution for checking fractions. At that time Gary Lynn came forward with a method for checking multiplication of fractions, by casting out nines. Mrs. Gregory explains that the method is, in part, a carry through of the approved method as applied to whole numbers. But it has been revised enough to make it work against the fraction problem answers.

In essence, the system devised by Gary Lynn will, if correct, work as follows: The multiplicand is multiplied by the multiplier. The divisor times the check number equals the check number. The multiplier times 1/9, gives 10 2/9. The multiplier times 2/9 is also 2; this means 2/9 (9/9) check number. The divisor (5) times the check number (7 4/9) equals 35 28/9. This is 39 2/9. Gary Lynn is the son of B. and Leone Kenedy. He was born Dec. 1, 1938. When he was in second grade he became interested in chemistry. He began then and later to a mounted collection which is very complete. It has been viewed by students in the field and is rare.

When he heard of interest in chemistry, he gave him a small set for the following year he was set. By 1950, his name was in a small laboratory for works in it most of his life's work. His mathematics grew out of a made some time ago. Mrs. Gregory says of her student's discovery. "I always introduce our ninth grade, and have not used it immediately. We are glad that we use this quick way of work. Gary Lynn's method tends the usefulness of and it has worked out in which it has been tested."
