Standard Oil Company of Texas has a major oil strike in their Minnie Adams No. 1, P. D. Adams survey No. 32, one-half mile west of Lakeview, 7.62 miles southeast of Floydada. The pool opener gave first proof of its potent ability to re-make the oil map of this region when it unloaded a head of oil from the drill stem while 3960 feet of pipe was still in

the hole. It was on a drill stem test of a lime formation topped at 7,598 feet.

The drill went 24 feet into the formation to 7,622 feet before a coring was made. The tool was open two and one-half hours. There was a good blow throughout the test and gas rose to the surface at 81/2 minutes.

No fluid reached the top while the tool was in the lime but the drill stem began to unload with 44 stands of pipe still in the ground. The flow by heads continued while the pipe was pulled.

A crowd which assembled as the news spread gave a quiet but very cheerful welcome. There was no trace of water. Bottom hole flow pressure was reported at 260 to 960 pounds.

Reports given out last week-end indicated geologists were not fully agreed on the formation. It was termed the Canyon lime, similar to the formation which blew the Scurry couny field wide open. It was also indicated it might be the Cisco lime. Neither of these formations, it is said, require acidizing to pro-

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Views and Comment

It is Pleasant to get away from the amazing merry-go-round of immorality and government centralization at Washington for a refreshing new breath of old-time West Texas boost. Good moisture in the ground, a good wheat crop out in the fields, a good oil boom touched off. That's a combination that has never failed in this part of the Lord's vineyard. We hope it shall never change. But the heavy hand of government will be felt in both the wheat marketing and the oil development. The wheat will have to pass the sharp eyes of federal inspectors before it passes into channels for human consumption. The Food and Drug administration is the agency which now wangles itself into the grain business to make Floyd county farmers offer only food from their fields fit for human consumption, to force grain dealers to put only good wheat into the channels of trade and to require, under penalties of the law, the central elevators and the processors to offer for sale to you only food made from your wheat that is fit for human consumption. Everybody who has any idea that the federal government needs to send out a bunch of new inspectors, taken from the nation's low manpower pool, to protect the public against a Floyd county wheat raiser, a Floyd county grain dealer and a Fort Worth flour mill to make them offer you and me only food fit for human consumption-everybody who has any idea that the government needs to do this is asked to stand on their heads and pause for identification. Are you the guy that has let all of this kind of thing happen to us?

About June 10 is the earliest we heard this week of any probable wheat harvest in Floyd county. As one man expressed it there may be a pet patch or so that the combines will enter before that date. Nobody seems to know for sure whether any wheat will be cut by June 10 but there almost always has been so it is assumed that it will happen again. Also, looking out over the fields the grain appears to be ripening mighty fast and 10 days is a long time when you consider a wheat crop maturing in the field. Seems as though a little later than June 10 will be nearer correct in most fields. A lot depends on the weather as it always does. But, the Lord willing, when the time does get here the harvest is going to be bigger and more generous than in a number of years. It is going to be a big crop and Floyd county is going to repeat as the state's number one wheat producer again this year, it seems quite safe to report. A good many people are going to make a good many dollars out of their wheat this year. They are going to raise one of the best quality crops in all of history. And we will have gimleteyed government men fearlessly after you farmers and elevator men to keep you from doing whatever it is you are planning to do to us with this fine wonderful crop which the Good Lord has vouchsafed to the people.

True, the cotton has not come along too good, despite an ample season in the ground. But around the early part of June things begin to level off for the cotton man and F. The very lands on which oil has been discovered, long considered out of the range of development underirrigation, have water wells on land adjacent. And in other parts of the country new wells are tapping sands which were assumed not to be there. All in all both actual and potential wealth of the section has increased in a decade almost beyond belief. Thus has it come true as was aforesaid by the pioneers. So great is the transformation, though, that none of us yet realize what this thing is that has happened to us. It should be accepted in humility. For after all we must not forget that all of this is a thing which God hath wrought.



FOOD AND DRUG ADMINISTRATION PROGRAM POSES SERIOUS PROBLEM FOR GRAIN PRODUCERS AND DEALERS

The grain buyers of this area are faced with a problem of enforcement by the Pure Food and Drug Administration, which will mean that Producers, too, will have to watch the grain they deliver to the elevators to be sure it does not contain too much moisture and that it is free from rat and bird infestation.

A WARNING BY THE FOOD AND DRUG ADMINISTRATION

says that inspectors are going to be stationed at the terminal elevators who are going to check grain to see if it is fit for human consumption. Penalties are going to be severe on the grain man who shipped the grain. This means, in turn, that he must be strict in grading of grain that comes over his scales at the elevator before it goes into the bins or into the railroad car.

The grain dealers are under stiff regulations which carry heavy penalties in case of violation. The penalty for a first offense is not more

The Food and Drug Administration say they are going to enforce this regulation, which has been on the books for a number of years.

We are forced to warn our customers that contaminated grain, or grain that is too wet to keep for human consumption is going to have to be turned down at the elevator, also grain containing trash will be subject to dock.

Watch out for grain with too much moisture content. Don't let your custom harvest man cut your grain until you protect yourself with a sample that will pass the moisture content test.

The reason we are going to have to turn this kind of grain down is because we can't sell it and if we offer it for sale at a primary market we will be subject to severe penalties.

We want to warn our customers now, so you won't be offended later when we have to protect our own market and your market by offering only good merchantable grain to the public.

> When cleaning out your bins of last year's crop watch out for rat pellets, bird droppings and weevil infestations. We can't afford for contaminated grain to be offered for public consumption through our elevators.

We will be glad to talk this matter over with our customers, meanwhile. But we know what we are up against and want to give you this advance warning so we can all work together, grain dealers and grain producers alike.

Law Gives New Voters a Break on Time Limit

If you are a new resident of the State of Texas and the County of Floyd, having moved here since January 1, 1951, or having become of age since that time, you get a break provided you have lived in the state for one year and in the county for six months.

The break you get is in the time limit for getting your certificate of exemption from paying a poll tax in order to vote. You now can get a certificate of exemption any time up to within 30 days of the time of any election at which you wish to vote.

Formerly this certificate had to be obtained on or before January 31 of the current year. Thus, if you wish to take part in the Democratic primary on July 26 you can still obtain your certificate of exemption any time up to June 25. The governing date is January 1, 1951 (for which current poll tax receipts were issued) No charge for the issuance of these certificates of exemption is provided for.

The new law will be a boon to new residents of Texas, who meet the other usual requirements for voting. The would-be voter must fill out an application which identifies him as to age, residence status, place of residence, and so forth.

ing are that the person offering to vote shall be at least 21 years old on the day of the election;

The service man must not be member on active duty of the regular or permanent military establishment. A member of the reserve, selective service draftees, members of the National Guard, whether or not on active duty, and persons retired from the regular or permanent military establishment are qualified to vote.

The rule pointed out by the district attorney for absentee voting by Texas servicemen during this year is that the armed services personnel who are qualified to vote and are on extended active duty may vote during 1952 without paying their poll tax and without obtaining an exemption certificate

Any person who at the time of the election or within 18 months prior to the date of the election, was on extended active duty in the service may vote without regard to payment or non-payment of the poll tax. A serviceman must, however, have been on extended active service duty and not merely active duty for a weekend or a few weeks in the summer. Servicemen who are qualified to vote are entitled to vote although their names do not appear on the precinct lists, or exemption lists. The tax collector is neither required nor authorized to include in the certified list of voters the names of servicemen who have not paid a poll

tax. In view of the fact that a considerable number of new residents in the state and county may want to vote and also a considerable number of persons who have attained the age of 21 since January 1, 1951, and furthermore since a considerable number of Floyd county boys are in extended active service, a rundown on the new law's provision is of more than passing interest.
