The organic matter on the sursoil removal by the forces of water hold more water per foot depth, and also aids in preventing crusting and as protective cover against extreme temperature and keeps the soil open for free movement of air and water

These advantages gained will more than offset time and trouble it may cause in plowing and cultivating Farm machinery has been improved

Under irrigation, some few farmers may want to burn their wheat stubble in order to make double croping easier. Soil fertility goes down rather fast under irrigation with single cropping. Usually the crop yields smaller and the profit is less.

More profit can be made by makng bigger yields from single cropping. When soils are low in organic matter, their porosity is poor and much of the water that should go nto the land drains off. Soils that are low in organic matter do no have the capacity for holding available moisture, and crops will suffer in dry years. Crops residues, propermanaged, will not only help hold the soil in place, but will increase

Without a protective cover of vegetation either dead litter or growing crops, the wind takes its toll of productive soil. Even the wheat soils will blow if permitted to become depleted in organic matter, and are left bare of a protective cover. The most fertile part of soil is organic fertile sand is left behind The time to prepare against eros-

ion is during the growing preceding the blow season and heavy rains. It takes very little effort each year to keep the soil built up, as the crop is taken off, but if it is allowed to become depleted in organic matter it takes a period of several years to restore this essential consent. Under the best management of continuors cropping, thehe is a slight loss of

organic matter. Wheat stubble left on or near the urface is recommended by the chairman of the board of supervisors of the Floyd County District as the best measure against all types of errosion, as well as for maintaining soil fertility.







# Ribbon and Curb-to-Curb Paving **Both Offered in Current Drive**

The streets and highways committee of the Chamber of Commerce stepped up their campaign this week for more paved streets for Floydada. They hope to add a number of blocks to the paving contract which the West Texas Construction company of Lubbock. The Construction company is due in Floydada in July to pave fifth street from Highway 70 toward Ollie Avenue which was contracted by the school board in April.

The construction company offers Floydada citizens a 36-foot wide street with curb and gutter for \$4.00 per side. The paving will be the same quality as the High school compared to six inches with two shots of asphalt and rock added. Strip paving is offered for \$1.25 per square yard.

The city of Floydada recommends the 36-foot street with curb and found a "landing" place part way gutter. A street under 36 feet wide down and got a jeep trail bulldozed says the city street department, does along the approximate route. This not allow for adequate parking on the street.





ium mesh sive. Yolks: Separate eggs. Put in clean bowl. Stir with a fork to break yolks and mix in 1 tr.blespoon sugar, tablespoon honey or syrup; or 1 teaspoon salt. Sive.

Whites: Freeze without stirring and with nothing added. Sive for

uniform texture Packaging: For convenience and to save thawing more eggs than will be used at one time, put just enough in the container for one cake, or for scrambled eggs for one meal. Or just the quantity needed for a favorite recipe. Be sure to label accordingly, tell the date put into the freezer, etc. Package in vapor-moisture proof containers.




