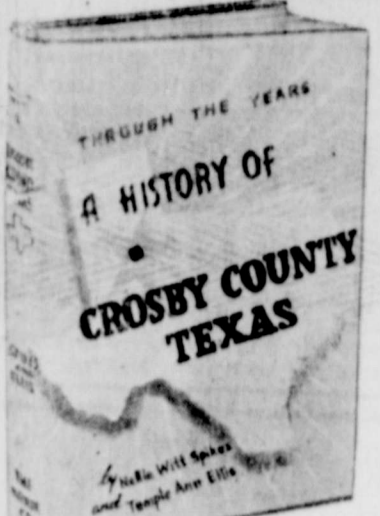

Independent Signs 60-Day Drilling Lease Contract on Jones Quarter

The tract of land belongs to Mr. and Mrs. L. L. Jones and Dr. and Mrs. H. C. Mitchell, the latter of Waco.

The lessee is D. E. Vasser, a Mississippi driller. Who his associates are is not revealed by the records. His lease provides that he will begin to drill a well within 60 days of the date of the lease, July 2.

A price of \$100 an acre is reported to have been paid the lessors, although the consideration is indicated as "\$10 and other considerations."

The lessors are children of the late W. N. Jones and his surviving wife. The land leased is the west 160 acres of Survey 26, A B & M. It is a patented tract. The heirs retain one-eighth royalty. Should the first well drilled fail to locate oil within the depth contract of 8,000 feet, the lessees may retain the lease at \$10 an acre per year for renewal.

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Primary election day is Saturday, July 26. Park Property Cannot be Sold or Exchanged

Neither the commissioners court of Floyd county, nor the city council of the City of Floydada can legally swap Napoleon park in southwest Floydada for the First Methodist church property at Kentucky and Fifth streets, even if the church property were to be dedicated to the use and benefit of the public.

This question was raised in the early spring after the church congregation had started a drive for a new building on the present site, with a view of razing the present edifice when the new one is completed. The alternate plan called for saving the present building to be dedicated to some useful public purpose to become the property of the public, and obtain in its stead Napoleon park on which to build.

In the negotiations it developed that the city of Floydada did not have title to the park property and could not, therefore, be party to such a plan. The title is in Floyd county for the use and benefit of the public.

County Attorney Enos T. Jones reached the conclusion that neither the city nor the county can sell or exchange the park property, but he asked Attorney General Price Daniel to study the question and give an answer. The question was put in the following manner:

Question of Authority

"Where a tract of land was dedicated to Floyd county as a park for the use and benefit of the public as a part of the plat of the town-site of the town of Floydada (Floyd City), and has been so used as a park during most of the time since such dedication, does the city council of the city of Floydada have authority to sell or exchange such park site to the First Methodist church, Floydada, for the old building and grounds in such city, under the provisions of Article 1017, Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas?"

"Or, does either the Commissioners court, acting under the authority of Article 1577, RCS, or the city council and the court acting jointly have such authority?"

"And, if you find that the city and or county have such authority, is it necessary to have the election provided for in Article 1019, RCS?"

The attorney general referred to the recently settled dispute between the City of Tyler and Smith county, Texas, and individual property owners, as to their respective rights in the square in the city of Tyler. In that case it was held that the public square could not be diverted for private use.

Cannot be Diverted

Asst. Atty. Gen. John Reeves, writing the opinion, summed it up this way: "Land dedicated to the public for park purposes cannot be diverted for any other purpose. It must remain for the use of the public for park purposes and cannot therefore be sold or exchanged."

A state supreme court decision this year in a dispute between Smith county and the city of Tyler over ownership of the courthouse square was relied upon by the attorney general in reaching the decision. The court held there that the county could build a new courthouse at some other place, but the square must remain for public use.

The deed dedicating the Floydada property was executed in 1890. It recited that the dedicator granted and conveyed "unto Floyd County for the use of the public the following dedicated property to wit: All the streets, alleys and parks and Court House Square in the town of Floyd City (now Floydada)."

To have and hold the above dedicated premises, for the use of the public forever."

Accident Rate Shows Gain on Farms, Homes

COLLEGE STATION, July — Farm and home accidents are creating such a serious problem that President Truman has issued a special proclamation urging farm residents and all persons interested in farm life to serve National Farm Safety week, July 20-26. Estimates just released from the National Safety Council show that 14,500 farm people were accidentally killed last year and 1,250,000 others suffered lost time from injuries.

On Monday, of National Safety Week, programs on home safety will be stressed. Home accidents are costing Americans over \$600,000,000 annually, in lost wages, medical expense and insurance overhead. The safe home, for family members and for children to grow up in, is one where the parents are safety conscious and where hazards are corrected.

Accidents in the home may happen because the homemaker is tired. The home management specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, say its a smart thing to plan devices to save strength and energy. Use the head instead of the feet; don't carry heavy clothes baskets to the line; put the wash in a plastic bag over the shoulder or in a basket on a small cart; save lifting heavy loads and save bending by having work surfaces of the right height.

It's a good idea to make Farm Safety Week last all the way through the National Safety Week. Remember everyone cannot be replaced. The dignity of safety. It is time it takes to make it.

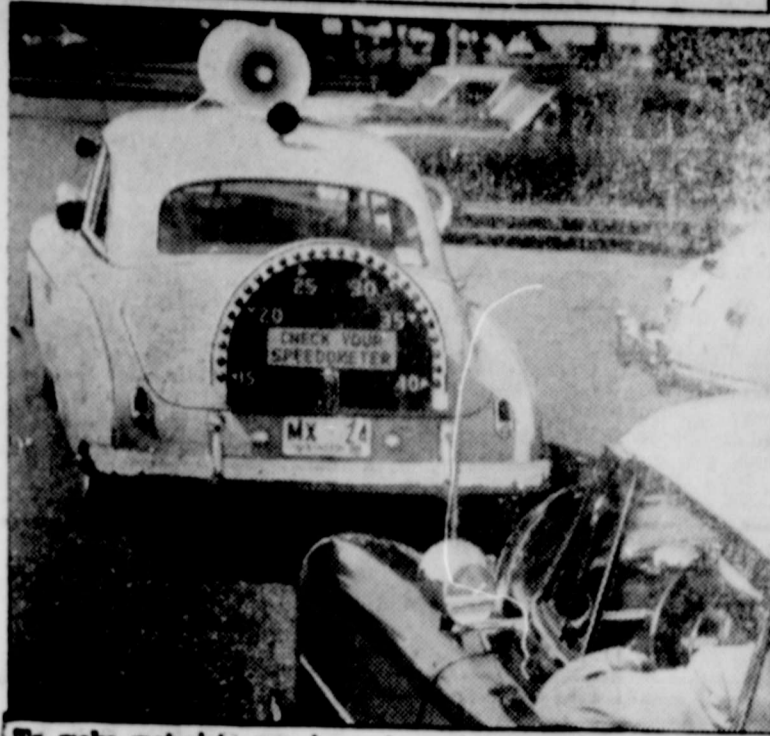

Motley County Officially Dry

MATADOR — Motley county is dry, politically. In fact Motley county is so dry, politically, that it probably set a record in Saturday's local option election, in asserting its position among the arid counties of Texas.

Of the possible 1,400 voters in the county, 932 went to the seven voting boxes and buried "distilled spirits" under an avalanche of 669 dry votes. When all boxes were in it was found that 254 voters designated their ballots to indicate that they were against prohibition.

Observers declare the vote unusually large. Matador's two boxes polled 516 votes, with 350 drys and 166 wets. Roaring Springs was the driest box in the county with the drys polling more than five to one, or 159 for prohibition and 31 wets. One Box Votes Wet

The signal victory is attributed to churches in the county which were united in their campaign to defeat the possibility of the intoxicating beverages being sold legally. The election was called through a petition circulated among church members, when it was disclosed that an appealed liquor violation case might result in the county being declared "wet." An old local option election held in 1893 may be declared illegal because of irregularities when the case is brought before the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals.

Jim Riddles, with the Motor Vehicle Inspection division of the Department of Public Safety yesterday told The Hesperian that of 5,300 vehicles registered in Floyd county there have been 2,041 inspected to date. This is less than 40 per cent of the cars on the road, Mr. Riddles pointed out.

This means that the 12 authorized service stations in Floyd county are each going to have to inspect a good many cars a day to get all the cars ready for the September beginning date on which the new inspection law becomes operative. Stations authorized to make the reasonably simple inspections are:

Lockney Auto company and Whitey Baccus of Lockney;

Spears Auto company, Sparks auto service, K. Crouch Motor company, Joe Martin, King Tractor & Motor, S. J. Latta Implements company, Bishop Motor company, Oden Chevrolet company, Cline & Rainer and Mayo Motor company Floydada.

Mr. Riddles is spending his time in the territory in an effort to stir up people to the high importance of helping to reduce highway accidents and casualties by elimination of faulty machines on the roads.

They have checked every lead, even working on the theory that he might not have gotten out of the vicinity of Floydada. They doubt the probability that any of the scores of leads they have followed had any too much authenticity.

Son of the Same Opinion

I. J. Ardry, a son who has been here from Highmore, South Dakota, is returning home this mid-week thoroughly mystified. Demands of the harvest are calling him back there temporarily. His place is being taken here by Charles Ardry, another son, of Layton, Arizona, to aid the authorities in any way possible. Other members of the family are in and out as their home affairs will permit. None of them now live in this county.

Sheriff's Posse in Search

Since all likely leads have failed the authorities are now listening for any suggestions and following unlikely theories on "long shot" chances for solution of the disappearance of the missing Floyd county man.

The first of the week the sheriff's posse was impressed into service for a search of the reaches of Blanco canyon. This hunt was cut short by the heavy rains Monday morning, the riders showed up at their usual habitats at noon and afterward very wet with very wet horses and gear. They made two miles of the canyon. The job will be finished at some time later to be designated.

"We the children of R. L. Ardry wish to thank the good citizens of Floyd county for their good help, cooperation and hospitality shown us in trying to find our father, R. L. Ardry who disappeared from Floydada on June 12, 1952.

"Especially we thank Sheriff Leland A. Hart and his staff of deputies for their untiring efforts. Sheriff Hart and his staff have spared neither time nor money, working on the case and have put forth every effort that is humanly possible trying to find our father.

We shall always feel grateful and indebted to all that have helped us in the search, and may God bless you all. The sheriff is still at work on the case and we feel that in due time he will solve the case."

Drew Modest Pension

Mr. Ardry at 86 has been drawing a modest pension from the State Welfare department. Children of the family at first felt that their father might be pointing over the fact that his daughter did not meet him at the bus station in Lubbock when he left to go to her home on

June 12. Mrs. Gilbreath, the daughter, thought the date she would meet him was June 19. However they expected that if he was staying at some camp or boardinghouse close by the date for the receipt of the check from the state would draw him out of hiding. The check has been received at the home of the daughter, I. L. Ardry said Wednesday, indicating their father had notified the department. He had also written I. J. Ardry at Highmore of his intention to go to Level-land.

dropped to as low as 10 pounds the swabber would be started again. For some reason the well has not unloaded all of the black oil that was used to prime it following the acidization. There was slightly less than a thousand barrels of oil in the tanks at 9 o'clock yesterday. The well had unloaded oil steadily through the night at the rate of six to 10 barrels. On the swab the production jumps materially.

For the record, the elevation at the well above sea level is indicated at 3,123 feet. The 7-inch casing was set at 7,600 feet.

The pay section has not yet been officially identified. However, says the Standard application, the zone is in the Pennsylvanian. The reason identification is doubtful is because there are no fossils whatsoever.

The producer is indicated in the application as 1,980 feet from the well line and 700 feet from the north line of Section 32, P. D. Adams survey.

Phillips Takes A Lease
The only major oil company that had not some money spent for leases in Floyd county for several years is Phillips Petroleum company.

This week they broke over and contracted to spend some money here. According to B. L. Breed, he has leased his east 320-acre tract, lying almost due north of the Adams half where the Standard strike was made to Phillips. The land's legal description is the east half of Section 34, GW T & T Ry Co. The contract is for a straight commercial 5-year lease.

Breed did not indicate the price, but it is reported to be \$60 an acre cash and \$100 an acre in oil, when and if production is obtained. The lease has a dollar an acre renewal clause.

The west half of the same section, owned by D. H. Widener, is leased to Standard Oil Company of Texas.

M. Poff, and Brinsmere Oil company abandoned their H. A. Krause test, 12 miles southwest of Floydada Sunday, after drilling to 7835 feet.

The lessees were salvaging some 2,200 feet of primary casing from the test Sunday. There were no shows of oil or gas.

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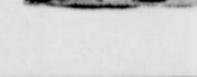

TAXES: I propose taking steps to place a ceiling on federal income taxes. We are paying too much for too many things we don't need and don't want.

INSPECTION: I favor a repeal of the present Texas vehicle inspection law. It is the drivers of cars and not the cars themselves that cause accidents.

HIGHWAYS: I favor a reasonable and stable extension of our highway system with equal contribution to expressways, main highways, and farm to market roads.

WATER: I oppose and will fight any attempt of the federal or state government to assume ownership or control of our underground water.

ISLANDS: I favor Texas regaining clear and absolute title to our off-shore lands, by whatever means necessary.

CIVIL RIGHTS: I favor the states taking back from Washington some of the powers they have handed over. Let Texas build its own highways, its own schools, develop its own waterways, handle its own welfare problems — and then keep its own tax money. Remember there is no such thing as Federal Aid. It can only be a partial return of your tax dollar.

Views and Comment

Likelihood is that the steel strike will have somewhat to do with the developments in the oil production business in Floyd county as well as in other counties of the nation. The government has made itself so dominant in the big row between the management and the unions that the whole trouble is going to be hard to smooth out. Whatever other "oughts" there may be in the titanic struggle for place and power there "ought" not to be a rule that would make you and me join something before we can take a job from a man to hoe cotton or to work in a steel mill. The right to be even a fool should not be abridged. The public ought to insist on that and be willing to let the hide go with the hair now if need be. But this means, among other things, no steel for the new automobile you have set your mind's eye upon. It also means slow down in the oil fields and in construction, and every way you turn.

But while persons of small vision view the situation with alarm, men who operate in the big field of business foresee no calamity. Their viewpoint is reflected in the stock market, where the pulse is still strong. Stock and bond prices are based on the prospect for profits. Money is wholly impersonal and takes no sides, although the men who handle it sometimes lose their balance. So the talent, one should be led to believe, does not anticipate the struggle in the steel industry to be disastrous.

The Republicans now have themselves a nominee for president and a nominee for vice-president. In the bright new dawn of their ascendancy, amid the business of kicking out the Old Guard and changing the faces on the windows, they are talking about how they are going to make Texas a two-party state. We often have wondered why the republicans are so anxious to make Texas a two-party state but they never mention Vermont. Is there anything bad about one party being all-powerful on the gulf coast that couldn't also be true of another part of the world?

Dwight D. Eisenhower is the Republican presidential candidate and his partner, as second man on the ticket, is Senator Nixon of California. Mr. Eisenhower will find himself working for the Old Guard in the not too-distant future. The Old Guard believes in the kind of free enterprise that leaves the right folks all their special privileges while the others give theirs up to save the country.

In political vein still, it will be interesting to have a report that the "practical politician" has rented a floor in the right hotel for the Chicago convention of the Democrats.

Mr. Shivers and the other rebellious souls, who are going to try the break the political backs of the bosses in the Democratic party will have to be astute to get the job done. Mr. Truman will be in Chicago to see that they don't accomplish their purpose. He has the machine well-oiled and the bosses have plenty of money and more where that came from. Goliath believes David will be an easy one to slay.

The best season you can imagine in the early part of July is a bit unusual for the high plains. The big rains which came last week and this to some portions of Floyd and adjoining counties were a bit heavy but almost ideal over most of the other communities which go to make up what is sometimes called the east plains. The heavy rain in this month means that all types of farming will proceed under excellent conditions, that cotton will boom and that the wheat man will have all of his weeds and volunteer wheat up ready for the second plowing. It also means the very great likelihood that there will be ample moisture for properly tilled fields when wheat sowing time comes. Only danger to cotton that can be foreseen for the early future is the possibility that it will grow too rank and that the cotton man will have to battle with the bugs.

Good Argument for paving are the mud holes which freely dot a good many important residential streets of the community. Heavy rains during the week have accented some of these holes the citizen drives his fine new automobile through in low while he saves his \$200 and a dime. Time is flying, the contractor is getting on the job late and still has to deal with the weather, which can be cantankerous in this latitude. On Highway 70 the state highway department's plan's have been made more ambitious, after study of the situation. The department wants to redo the street through the length of its nearly two miles inside the corporate limits. The work can't possibly be done this year. But the property owners are offered a bargain by the city and state to join in with curb and gutter next spring. Floydada is a pretty hard looker to the man driving through for the first time. His impression doesn't improve as he views the other streets with many good looking homes completely surrounded by mud or dust.

CONFUSION IN SEED LABELS

Judging from inquiries and complaints which have reached the Texas Department of Agriculture in Austin, many farmers are confused as to the purpose of the Tested Seed label which is required on each bag of seed sold in the state.

There are three tags which can be found on seed bags, all issued by the department—the tested seed label, the Certified seed tag, and the Registered seed tag. Unless the purchaser is familiar with each of them, he can easily become confused and believe he is buying seed guaranteed by the department.

The cream-colored Tested Seed label does not guarantee that the seed is of high quality. The department of Agriculture issues the tags and requires the dealer to supply information on the tag as to bag contents.

seed, its germination qualities, the purity, amount of inert matter, weeds seeds, date tested, weight of bag and origin of contents. This is the responsibility of the dealer, and if he falsifies this information, he violates the Texas Seed Law.

Many farmers are mistaking this tag for the Certified Seed Label and the Registered tag. Both of these do guarantee, to a certain extent, a high quality of contents. The Certified tag is pale blue in color, and the Registered tag, which is backed by even higher test standards, is light purple. They are plainly marked "Certified" and "Registered." They also carry the name of the seed grower, variety of crop, weight per container, year of production, and a serial number. Field inspectors have determined qualities of the seed before either tag is issued.

Some unscrupulous operators have been known to attach these two quality tags to inferior seeds, since it would be impossible for the Texas Department of Agriculture to employ enough men to personally

tag each bag. Any such practice is a direct and serious violation of the law and should be reported to the department at once.

It is a good practice for each farmer to save a generous sample of seed from each bag he purchases, and keep the tag with the sample. If the seed fails to meet his expectations, the sample can be sent along with the tag to the Department of Agriculture for test purposes to be used as a guide in determining if the dealer is misleading his seed. Cooperation between purchasers and the Department of Agriculture will go a long way towards elimination of "seed rackets."

Conservation District News

Technicians assigned to the Floyd County Soil Conservation district made two irrigation well locations for Robin Fortenberry of Cedar Hill. Thomas Chatham made 43 bushels of wheat per acre on land that he had applied anhydrous ammonia on. He figured the fertilizer increased his yield 15 bushels over his wheat that he did not apply the fertilizer on.

H. R. Patterson, west of Floydada, applied anhydrous ammonia to his wheat and got a good increase in yield. He remarked that it helped his wheat yield a lot but was not as good for his land as alfalfa. Alfalfa is the best soil builder, in his book. The fertilizer is used to supplement the area that did not have hay on it.

Contour guide lines have been run on wheat stubble land for Gilbert L. Pawver of the Lakeview community. He expects to chisel his wheat land on the contour and have the ground ready to take the summer rains.
