Cottonseed burrs and motes, which for many years have been the standby of the small stockfarm operator when feed was high or altogether unobtainable, ought to be made available to him again this season, Without disparagment of the methods of eradication which precludes any use of the burrs by the cattle raisers because the burrs go directly to the burner from the gin stands, we can't believe there isn't a reasonably good way that can be worked out to protect the cotton industry and at the same time put the burrs within reach of starving cattle. No doubt but what the pink bollworm, left uncontrolled will ruin the cotton production business in west Texas in the s ame manner the boll weevil did it in east Texas. At this date the authorities declare they have found no way to destroy the pink bollworm except to burn him, or bury him. Perhaps the farmer could be allowed to haul off burrs for use for feeding during the winter time under some kind of arrangement that any burrs left on the ground would be destroyed before spring planting time. If the authorities do anything like this it will be reluctantly, we imagine, but so far as the cattle business is concerned it is a matter of great emergency and it would be our idea that the authorities ought to go just as far with the cattleman as they possibly can.

Unless the city can find some way out their building plans for the electric light plant expansion are stymied. When the city bond issue was voted by the property owners to pledge revenue bonds for the expansion program the money provided, some \$50,000, would have been ample. But now building matters are so unsettled that not only do the builders scringe when asked to make a selves leeway on every point, afraid to gamble. LEISURELY TUMBLING

The successful tumble finishing of small wood turnings and similar objects calls for the use of thin coats f finishing material and a leisurely tumbling speed so the various items are not whirled together and inadequately finished. The items to be coated are placed in a circular tank on a horizontal axis that is similar to those in which clothes are dried in laundries. The circular tank is then lowered into another tank containing the finishing material and rotated. After it is again raised it is again rotated to drain off excess material. The coated objects are then removed and placed on racks to dry.
