COLLEGE STATION, February-Careful timing of automatic clothes dryers to prevent over-drying will save both fuel and fabric, says Bernice Claytor, extension home man-

agement specialist. Overdrying — leaving clothes in dryers after all moisture is removed — adds materially to the cost of operating the appliance and may be hard on fabrics. Yet, Mrs. Claytor says, it is a common mistake of new owners of dryers. The specialist adds that table linens especially, if left too long in a dryer, come out so

items. Mrs. Claytor says as the housewife becomes familiar with her dryer, she can work out exact Shirts, sheets and pillow cases,

table linens or other items to be ironed should come out of the dryer while still damp. Bath towels, chenille spreads, bath mats, cotton rugs and corduroys, however, can be fully dried and will come out

When the guy wire came lose it sagged into the 69,000 volt line and fire flew in every direction. 
