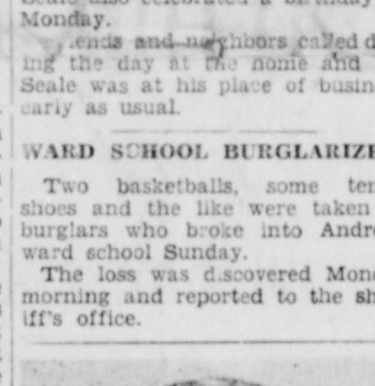

### VIEWS AND COMMENT

A mountain of butter is pointed to by the U. S. Department of Agriculture as one of their immediate problems. How to dispose of it, what to do with it if it is not disposed of, is the problem. This has been put up to congress for a solution. Laymen have been urging that some of the surplus be shipped to countries where we are spending billions—that is that the commodity be sent instead of the money. The government already has the commodity paid for. It would have to raise the money by taxes. Sounds good if there is not something practical in the way. Maybe it is against the Indians' religion to eat butter or some such.

The American farmer doesn't need to feel apologetic for the farm subsidies that have been provided by taxation the past two decades. It was subsidies to other industries that got the farmer in a jackpot to begin with. Selling on a wide open market and buying on a protected market couldn't be kept up even by Standard Oil of New Jersey. Take all the subsidies off and you could take the farmers' subsidies off, too. But they say that would be ruinous. We've got our business tied up in a pretty tight ball and we're having trouble unwinding. When everybody gets special privileges it isn't fun any longer.

Cotton crop income in Floyd county for the season of 1953 was upward of \$12 million, counting the average selling price at 27.5 cents and the average bale at 500 pounds. The ginners reports show 94,270 bales turned out by them for the season of 1953. This is about 200 bales less than for the season of 1952. Despite the fact that the cotton crop cost the producers far and away more than they expected it to cost them to produce, twelve million is a big, round figure. It represents a lot of money changing hands. It also represents a profit to many operators.

Republicans in Texas are talking a "poor man's" election for next summer's primary. The Republican party candidates got more than 200,000 votes last year and the law requires a primary vote, not a primary convention. Of course, a poor man's election can be held. Common school district trustees can tell how. The thing is to get volunteers

to do the job, take their own dinner and go do it. You can do anything you want to do. Things you don't want to do come awful hard. They usually can't be done.

The Post Office Department is needing the newspapers, especially the country newspapers and magazines, who make use of the second class mailing privilege. The department claims the newspapers are soft-pedaling the fact that the annual subsidy for the newspapers represents a greater amount of money than the annual subsidy for carrying on the farm program. It wouldn't be our idea to argue the point with the department. Somebody has the figures doubtless. We do not. However, you'd wonder just how much money it costs the department each week to deliver The Hesperian, and how many hands they could lay off if The Hesperian were to quit riding the gravy train.

The department's claim that it should be self-sustaining is also being backed by arguments before a committee in congress with a request for additional revenue from first class mail. The department would like to raise the charge for a letter out of town to 4 cents, while leaving drop mail at three cents. It already has increases slated for the newspapers under second class effective in April, and further raises down the line. The department costs a lot more to operate than it used to cost.

A County Fair's best asset to a community is its unifying, spiritual force. In that lies the origin of the idea of fairs, or festivals as they were termed, in mid-Europe centuries ago. A fair brings the community together in an amiable mood. In a former day the people joined to dance, laugh, talk and pool their problems. Out of this all came better understanding of the needs of the community. Understanding in a community brings development. As has rightly been said it would be a mistake to judge a county fair by its book-keeping, important as it is to make the budget balance. The biggest asset in modern day is that it brings all the various groups and kinds of people together to plan and develop. Floyd county people may well approach their county fair planning in that spirit.

### Dodge Contest Announced For February-March

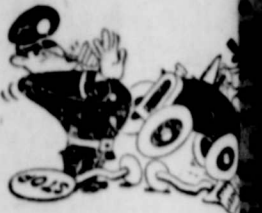

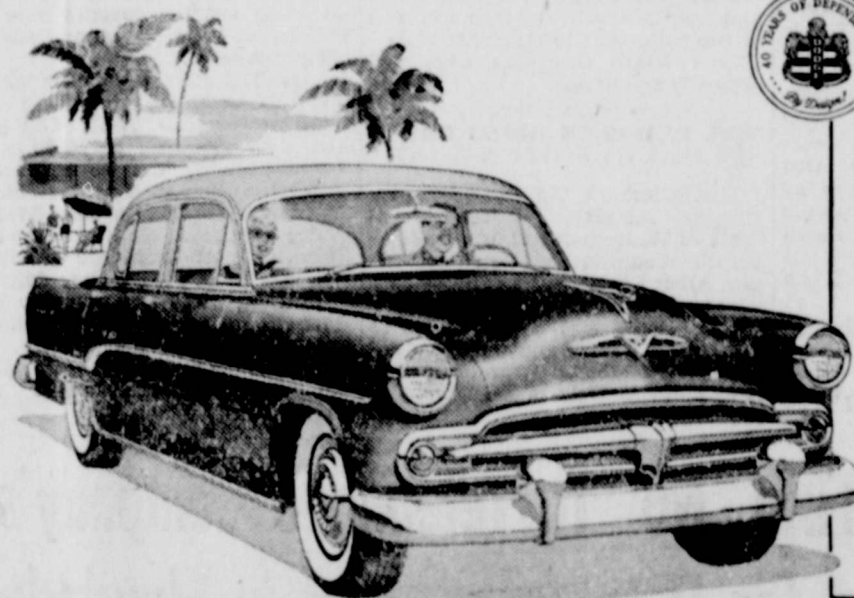

desirable qualities needed for top production.

Another claim being investigated is on seed reportedly treated with a "secret" chemical guaranteed to kill all cotton pests. It is doubtful that such a "miracle" chemical exists. Research laboratories have been trying to develop one but positive results have not been announced.

The farmer's best bet is to buy cotton seed which has been certified by the Texas Department of Agriculture. It is also important to know the dealer from whom the purchase is made.

Every bag of seed offered for sale in Texas must bear either a Texas "Tested Seed" label, a "certified" label or a "registered" tag. These labels are not guarantees of top production, but they do tell the buyer what he can expect in germination quality and bag content.

More than \$15 million worth of cotton seed will be bought and sold in Texas this year. That kind of money is sure-fire bait for attracting unscrupulous operators.

It is especially important in this year of controlled cotton production that the farmer plant good seed. He must take full advantage of every measure that will help him raise more cotton on his reduced acreage. Poor seed is not worth the risk.

There is no such thing as "bargain basement" seed. You will have to pay the price for good seed but the results will be worth it.

**Timing Dryers Saves Fabrics Fuel as Well**

COLLEGE STATION, February—Careful timing of automatic clothes dryers to prevent over-drying will save both fuel and fabric, says Bernice Claytor, extension home management specialist.

Overdrying — leaving clothes in dryers after all moisture is removed — adds materially to the cost of operating the appliance and may be hard on fabrics. Yet, Mrs. Claytor says, it is a common mistake of new owners of dryers. The specialist adds that table linens especially, if left too long in a dryer, come out so limp it is difficult to restore their crispness without moistening them over again before ironing.

An instruction manual usually comes with new dryers and contains a timing guide for different items. Mrs. Claytor says as the housewife becomes familiar with her dryer, she can work out exact timings for various laundry pieces.

Shirts, sheets and pillow cases, table linens or other items to be ironed should come out of the dryer while still damp. Bath towels, chenille spreads, bath mats, cotton rugs and corduroys, however, can be fully dried and will come out fluffy and ready for use.

Once a load is dry, she continues, it's economical to take it from the dryer promptly. It's also efficiency when more than one load of clothes is to be washed and dried. The dryer should be ready to receive the new load as soon as the washer has finished with it.

## Dessert No Problem... When You Have Home-Canned Peaches

How about next winter's deserts when the fresh luscious fruits you're seeing in the market these days have vanished? A supply of your own home-canned peaches, for one thing, will solve the dessert problem for many a meal and solve it with economy!

A sherbet glass of home-canned peach halves topped with whipped cream makes a delightful dessert and adds the touch of out-of-season luxury.

Also there are variations, such as Peach Upside Down Cake, Peach Pie, Peach Cobbler, Peach Melba, Peach Tarts. Dozens of dessert recipes call for canned peaches. Salads, too, are something special when peach halves add to their color and flavor.

When you're canning peaches you'll want to make some Peach Jam, Butter, Preserves or Conserve. These are most welcome at the breakfast table to spread on toast or to use on hot rolls and biscuits at company meals.

The hot pack method is preferred for canning peaches, because the fruit is less likely to float in the jar. Sort sound, fresh, firm-ripe peaches for size, color and ripeness. Wash, drain and peel. If evenly ripened, most varieties of free stone peaches can be peeled easily after blanching. Do this by placing enough peaches to fill one or two jars in a wire basket or square of cheese cloth, lower them into boiling water from 1/2 to one minute, then dip into cold water.

Now drain the peaches, cut them in halves and remove the pit and skin. Drop the fruit into vinegar-salt water (2 tablespoons vinegar and a like amount of salt to 4 quarts of water) for not more than 20 minutes. Rinse and drain, then cook in sirup made of one part sugar to one or two of water until hot through. Do not cook until soft. Or add dry sugar to suit taste and cook until sugar dissolves and peaches are hot.

Pack the halves into hot jars pit side down in overlapping layers and add hot sirup to cover fruit. Put Dome Lid on jar and screw band tight. Process 20 minutes in boiling water bath.

Peach Butter is a snap to make. You simply wash the peaches, and rub them with a cloth to remove fuzz. Discard the stones. Cook peaches until soft in just enough water to prevent sticking. Pass through sieve or food mill. Add from 1/2 to 3/4 cup sugar for each cup of pulp. Boil rapidly until thick. Pour into hot jars. Put Dome Lid on jar and screw band tight. Process 10 minutes in boiling water bath.

## PEOPLE'S FORUM Commends Idea Of Re-Charging Water Sources

The Floyd County Hesperian

While visiting during the Christmas holidays, and browsing through a stack of The Hesperians I ran across an article in the October 15, 1953 issue, which to me stood out in front of all the other news and articles. This article was headed "Re-Charge Test on Water Sands" and stated that the Hi-Plains Under-ground Water Association has put down a well in a twenty acre lake on the Allmon farm Southwest of the McNeill gin for the purpose of recharging the water sands that furnish irrigation water for this area.

The Hi-Plains Under-ground Water Association is to be commended on its project, and we who are interested in the area, should hope that this is only the first of many such wells to be drilled.

I do not know the exact number of lakes there are along the traverses of the old ice age Brazos River watershed but each and everyone should have a water injection well drilled in or nearby and put that water which accumulates there, back into the water sands of the area. If the water does not enter through gravity feed, it should be

pumped into the water sands.

The water sands of the Llano Estacadas or High Plains were deposited by one of three great ice age river systems which were fed by waters from the great ice cap which covered the northern part of the United States and extended along a line across the Northwest corner of the Texas Panhandle, the Westernmost part of the Oklahoma Panhandle and swung Northeast up into Kansas. The river system which deposited these water sands is called the Brazos River system in geological literature. The course of the ice age Brazos has been mapped in detail, with grade elevations run from where it pronged away from the terminal moraine or end of the Pecos Valley Glacier at Fort Sumner, New Mexico, eastward to Muleshoe, Texas, and through the plains area, then swung southeast and has been mapped as far south as Hearsho, Texas. It was a giant as rivers go. The gradient of the stream averages ten feet per mile and has an overall average of five miles across. Near Waco the gradient has flattened to three feet per mile and averages twelve miles across. The sands of the ice age Brazos are very clean, gravelly sands and had to be of headwater material, as they contain no wash material from the bordering grand prairies. The character of the sands and gravels indicates that the ice age Brazos stream flowed across a barren desert land.

As for that portion of the ice age Brazos streams whose sands serve as water aquifers for the Plains area, it has been covered by deposition of later sediments and the only place where it is on the surface and can be re-charged is in the area of Muleshoe and Earth, Texas. The sand dunes near Muleshoe, Texas will absorb all of the water of a big rain as fast as it falls, but it would have to rain a lot to refill the sands which are fast becoming empty.

Using the water for irrigation is good for this generation and makes some wonderful crops, but the next generation is one which will suffer, if there could be a water injection well drilled by each of the lakes on the plains and the water which accumulates there, was placed back into the sands it would help to retard the time when the sands become dry. If it could be so regulated that the input and the take out of the water were somewhere near the same volumes the time could be retarded still further, but if the rate of take out continues and there is no put back, the bank of water will eventually run dry and the lands can return to the barren deserts it was when these water sands were deposited.

Of course, the annual rain fall will produce some crops but they will not be good every year, as we have noticed in the recent drought years.

The drilling of the first well is a sign of progress, and the Hi-Plains Under-ground Water Association is to be congratulated on its desire to conserve these valuable resources of water which is present in their area.

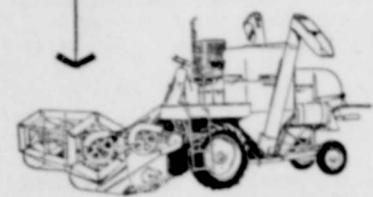

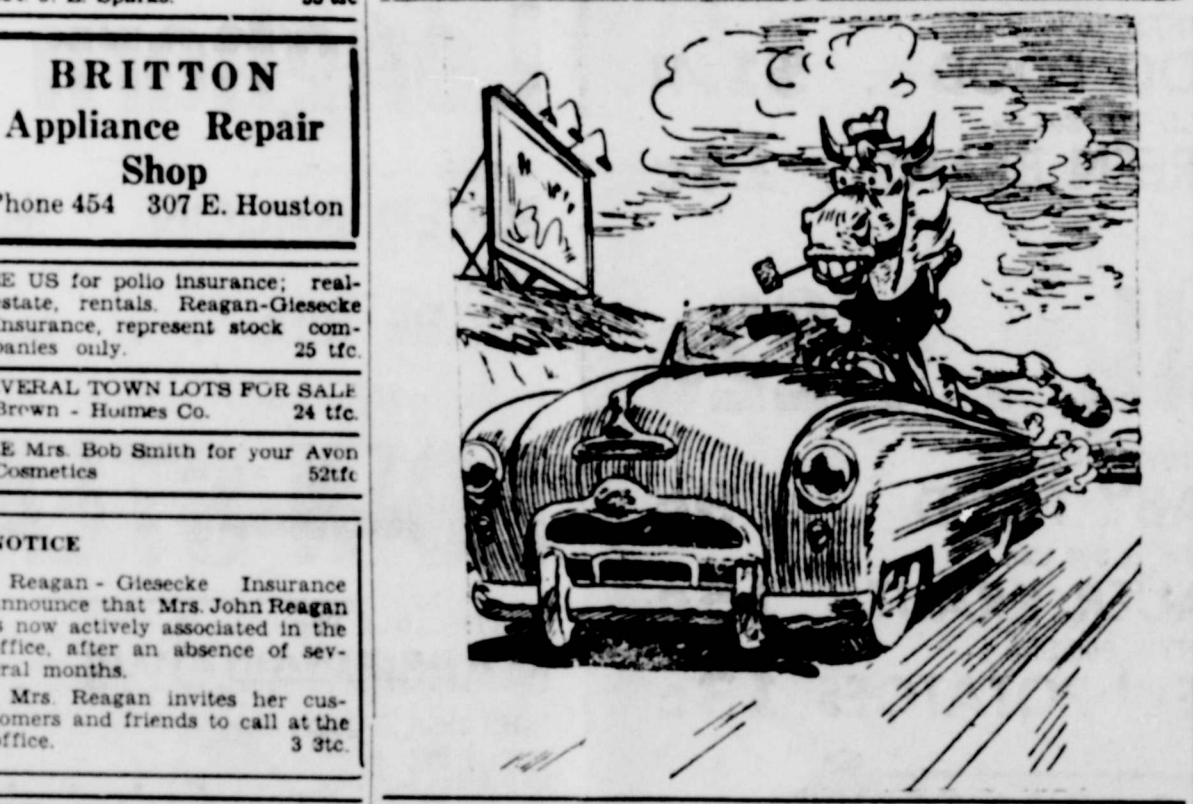

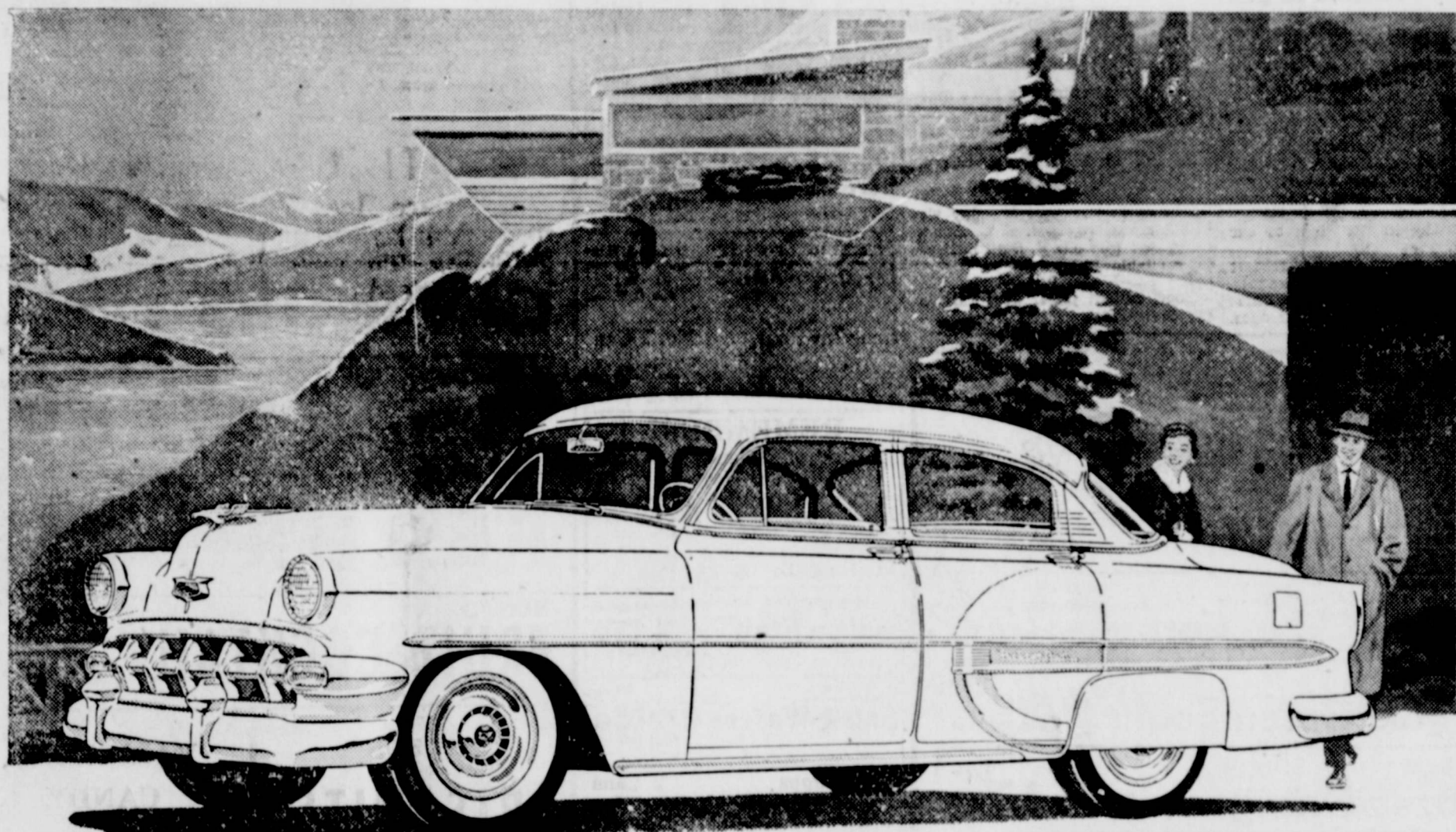

COLLEGE STATION, February—A wide variety of foods—more than 20 in all—are noted for penny-wise shoppers on the USDA's February plentiful foods list.

For the first time in many months supplies of pinto beans, lettuce, fresh and processed oranges and cranberry sauce are large enough to rate a place on the list, says J. J. Slaughter of the Agricultural Marketing Service.

Winter peas, Irish potatoes, broilers and fryers have been singled out for special attention during the month because supplies are unusually large.

Expecting pecans and frozen fish, plentiful foods carried from January on to the February list are eggs, beef, large dry lima beans, fresh and processed grapefruit, cabbage, onions, raisins, dairy products, peanuts and peanut butter and food fats and oils.

Total cost	\$87.71

We are very glad that it cost the cooperative \$87.71 instead of costing the member's wife \$1,000 for a funeral!

**Don't Disconnect That Guy Wire! It May Kill You.**

At 10:20 a.m. on the beautiful quiet, sunny morning of October 28, the co-op office telephone began ringing constantly from member's calls telling us that their power was off. In a few minutes it was discovered that the entire system north of the Canadian River served by the 69,000 volt transmission line was without service and all the line crews were dispatched to find the trouble.

About two hours later a crew found a guy on the transmission line about four miles west of Lipscomb substation, disconnected from the anchor and hanging loosely against one of the conductors of the high voltage line, effectively grounding the line. A little investigation brought out the fact that a member had been drilling out the corner of his field and had failed to turn quickly enough thereby running his drill into the guy wire. Since he could not back up the drill he decided the next best thing to do would be to disconnect the guy wire from the anchor, move the drill and then replace the wire. Accordingly he got busy with his wrench and unbolted the clamp holding the guy wire in place.

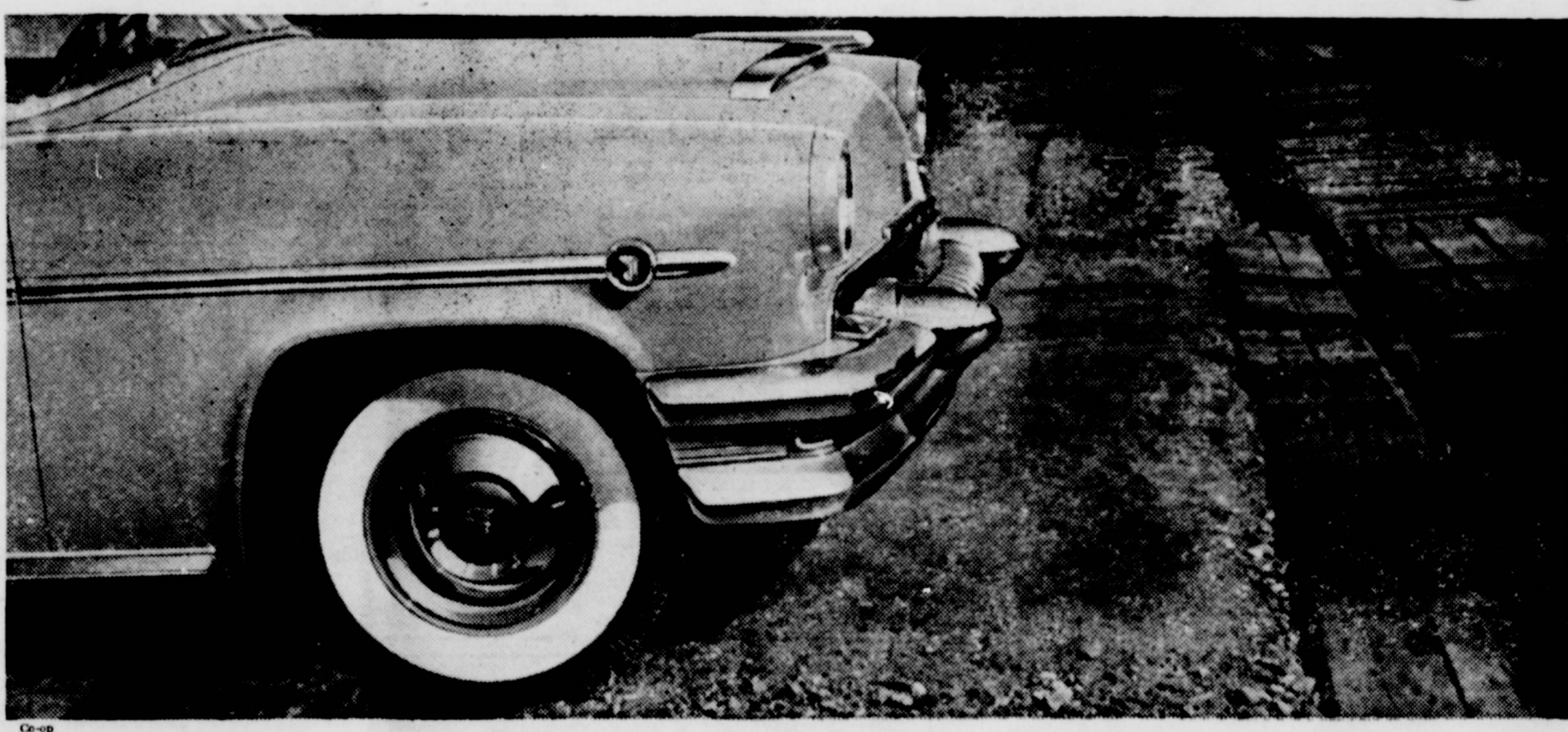
