### VIEWS AND COMMENT

**City of Floydada**, in the announcement last week that garbage disposal rates are going up is in line, we think, with the attitude the city should be taking, namely that the services which the community gets from the city should be spread out in the places where the services are rendered. The city, according to the books, has been taking a \$500 loss every month in sanitary disposal. Prizing the rates will get almost that much and leave the sanitation department running at a figure only slightly below cost of operations. We were for the raise in the water rates and are on record in favor of an increase in electric rates as well, a raise to get the city's charges in line with their competition. Competition is an old head at selling electric service. He probably knows better than the city knows what the price ought to be.

**The City has been** and is being called on to do more and more things for the people of the community. After all, the city is the same as the people in it. Taking the money from them for the things they want provided out of the collective pot can be taken more painlessly through water, sanitation and light charges than any other way. The citizens are urging a get things done program. It takes money to get things done. You can't build a town on a something for less plan.

**Forage grain movement** to the markets continues to grow in volume, a bit more every day than the day before. No telling how many million pounds on the broad irrigated prairies of the high plains, where the magic touch of water has been added. Is the drought far in to the corn belt and to the east of the Mississippi a real one or is it on paper and in the conversations? Everyone trying to tell the biggest story? It is the kind of situation that makes you want to buy some high-priced grain and get rich waiting for the rise. Then, perhaps, jump out of a high window sometime next spring. At least, a person who has maize could go along with the talk far enough to put his crop in the loan and watch developments.

**Storage won't be** the booger this fall that was expected in the early summer, when it was predicted the maize crop would be stored on the ground. When USDA "took steps" to see that more storage was built the department got action in a big way. Millions in storage space, non-existent only months ago, are ready for grain or will be early in October, all over the country. Now, storage men are wondering if they'll fill all the space they want filled with grain. Operators big and little doubt that there will be any difficulty finding a place to put the maize crop.

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### Savings Bonds Vital Part in Economy Told

A "Put-Texas-Over-The-Top 1954 Savings Bonds Drive" during the remainder of the year will be carried out vigorously in an effort to reach the state's 1954 quota of \$199,300,000, according to Brac Biggers, Floydada, Floyd County Savings Bonds chairman.

Biggers has been newly named Floyd county savings bond chairman.

"While purchases of Savings Bonds have increased so far this year, the rate of increase during the past 8 months has not been sufficient to reach the goal and an all-out effort is needed during the remainder of 1954," Chairman Biggers said. "Texas always does its part and needs to do it again this year. Floyd County's quota for 1954 is \$306,031."

Importance of the Savings Bonds program to each individual, every community, the state and the nation is being stressed by the volunteer Texas Advisory Committee for U. S. Savings Bonds, the chairman emphasized. Governor Allan Shivers is honorary chairman State Chairman

is Nathan ADAMS, dean of Texas banks and honorary Board Chairman, First National Bank of Dallas, while the co-chairman is Ed Gossett, Dallas, prominent attorney and former Texas congressman.

"Savings Bonds now have a most vital place in our country's sound money and financial program," the county chairman said. "They are an investment that is absolutely safe and one which guarantees the full principal plus 3 per cent interest compounded semi-annually when held to maturity. They can readily be converted to cash anytime to meet an emergency or for some planned project. Each individual is permitted to buy up to \$30,000 Series E and \$20,000 Series S Bonds per year."

The county deal was urged that everyone buy more Savings Bonds during October, November and December to help "Put-Texas-Over-The-Top" in 1954.

# Football Review

## Winds Down Quanah Tribe Rugged Defensive Duel

Whirlwinds struck the first quarter to score on a pass from Chapman for a 6-0 lead. Last Friday night, the three and a half quarters to a bruising defensive fight with threatening, but springing for the night.

Opening the game Keith Hodo of the Indians kicked-off to Floydada and the Winds took the ball on the 15 returning to their 28 yard line before going down. A few short gainers were turned in before Laron Fulton was broken into the clear and went 49 yards to the shadows of the Indians goal posts.

The Winds running game was bottled up momentarily and George Chapman dropped back and hit end Jack Womack in the end zone for the lone score of the evening. Chapman holding for Gordon Joiner failed when the kick was wide and the score, Floydada 6 - Quanah 0.

Following the Winds scoring drive Gene Swanner kicked-off to Quanah and Jackie Preston took the ball on his 15 returning to the 32 before going down. The Indians were able to gain first down yardage and drove in to the Floydada 46 before being forced to punt. Hodo kicked the ball dead on the Floydada 12 where they took over first and 10 yards to go.

The Winds found the going rough and had to call on their kicker Wando Baxter who punted from the 13 to the 24 - the kick being partially blocked.

**Punts and Fumbles**

The Winds were unable to go and the Whirlwind stout defensive play took over on the Floydada 21.

The second quarter found neither club able to muster a sustained offensive drive and the ball changed hands on punts and an occasional fumble as the bruising tackling began to take its toll on the ball carriers. Heavy penalties throughout the game showed the desperate efforts put forth by the two ball clubs and usually favored the defensive team and slowed the game somewhat.

Opening the third period Swanner kicked to George Boynton on the Quanah 10 and he returned but 2 yards before going down. From this point the Indians put the ball in play and were able to gain fairly consistent yardage on their line backs. Penalties and misques kept them in trouble but they controlled the ball most of the third period.

**Carry To Floydada Four**

Going in to the final quarter the two clubs were battling near mid-field and exchanged fumbles before the Indians got possession on the Floydada 33 when Jackie Preston recovered a misque by Jackie Jarrett.

Mayes re-entered the game at this point and the Indians put on their chief threat of the night when they carried in to the Floydada 4 on a series of bruising plays. The Winds rose to the occasion, however, and had thrown the invaders back to the 11 before they decided to take to the air.

J. E. Waller pulled down the Indian pass near his own goal line and was downed on the 4 yard line. The Whirlwinds then showed they still had a running attack when they called on their full back Jackie Jarrett who showed some of his best form of the season in bringing the pigskin back out of dangerous territory.

The Whirlwinds were forced to punt after they had reached their 21 and Baxter booted to the Quanah 45. The Floydada boys had to stave off one more offensive effort by Quanah before the game ended but were able to keep control of the situation and owned the ball on their 40-yard line when the whistle blew.

**Quanah Leads in Downs**

In the statistics Floydada gained 8 first downs to 9 for the visitors. Floydada was penalized 60 yards to 50 for Quanah. The Winds gained a net of 165 yards rushing and the Indians rolled up 143 yards net rushing in the passing department. Floydada completed 2 of 8 for 28 yards while Quanah hit 3 of 15 for 27 yards. Baxter punted 5 times for a 26 yard average (one was partially blocked). Quanah kickers punted four times for a 30.5 yard average.

Individual yardage rushing found Fulton of the Winds with 94 yards on 11 runs for 8.5 yard average. Jarrett with 46 yards was second

## Deadline Date For Training of Vets Extended

The WW II GI Bill (PL 346), which did provide an income ceiling that applied to veterans taking all types of training—institutional, on the job, and on the farm training (Institutional Training meaning college or university training). The Korean War Bill (PL 550) does have a ceiling, which is for on-the-job trainees only. It does not apply to veterans in the class room—college or school, and even this on-the-job training ceiling imposes no limit on how much a veteran may earn. Instead, when a veteran's on-the-job training wages, plus his GI allowance, exceeds \$310.00 per month, the VA scales down the allowance accordingly, to bring the total within the \$310.00.

Starting allowance rates for Korean on the job trainees are: \$70.00 per month, with no dependents; \$85.00 per month, for one dependent; \$105.00 per month for more than one dependent, and under the law, these rates are reduced at 4-month intervals as training progresses, and the Veteran's earning ability increases.

## Debt-Free Church To Be Dedicated

Bishop W. C. Martin of Dallas will participate in dedication services for the Lockney Methodist church sanctuary, set for 3 p. m. September 26, it was announced last week by the pastor, Rev. Burgin Watkins. Entire indebtedness on the structure, completed some two years ago, has been paid, the pastor said. The day of September 26 has also been set aside for a homecoming for former members and friends of the church. Plans are being announced this week, Rev. Watkins said.

## Beef and Cheese -- October Plentiful

COLLEGE STATION — Beef and cheese take the spotlight on the U. S. Department of Agriculture's plentiful foods list.

Here's why, says U.S.D.A. Cattle slaughter is running ahead of last year's all time high and stocks of cheddar cheese are the largest in history.

With supplies of these two essential commodities so large, prices should be attractive enough to push consumption to the highest peaks ever reached, believes John L. Slaughter of the Agricultural Marketing Service.

Stocks of many foods which were heavy a month ago have increased, and still are listed as plentiful. These include broilers and fryers, chicken hens and turkeys, milk and other dairy products, rice, salad oils and vegetable shortenings.

We have been emphasizing medium and small eggs, but now all eggs are plentiful and seasonally cheap, says Slaughter. Also, there are two newcomers to October's list shrimp and frozen haddock.

## Electrolytic Action

Public Law 610, 83rd Congress, approved August 29, 1951, extends the deadline date for Korean war veterans for 1-year, or three years from date of discharge. This extension means nothing to veterans discharged before August 29, 1951, as they were cut out of the bill.

The law now gives eligible veterans a flat three years from date of discharge to start training and eight years to finish, instead of seven years, as it has been. (Under Public Law 550, all eligible Veterans had until two years from date of discharge to start school, or until August 29, 1954, whichever was later.) This new extension will save training entitlement for many veterans discharged before August 29, 1952, who have still not made use of their eligibility, and will have until the third anniversary of their release from service, in which to start schooling.

This new law still leaves Korean veterans one year short of the time allowed World War II veterans, as World War II veterans had four years to start schooling, and nine to finish.

In addition to the one-year extension for starting and completing their training, the new law gives disabled veterans of World War II thirteen (13) years to complete vocational rehabilitation training in cases where they have been delayed by long periods in the hospital, or by a dishonorable discharge later corrected to give them veterans benefits.

## No Ceiling On Earnings

The VA has reminded veterans going to school under the Korean GI Bill (PL 550), that the money they earn in after-school jobs, will have no effect on GI allowances paid to them by the VA. Their monthly checks will remain the same, regardless of outside earnings. In fact, these earnings need not be reported.

The VA explains that some Veterans have been confusing the new GI Bill for Korean Veterans with

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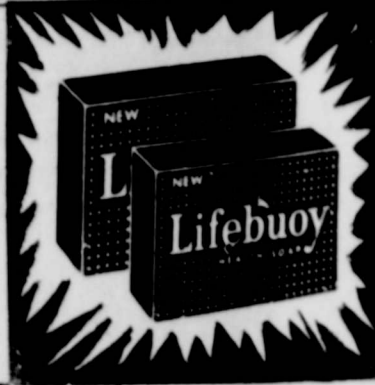
