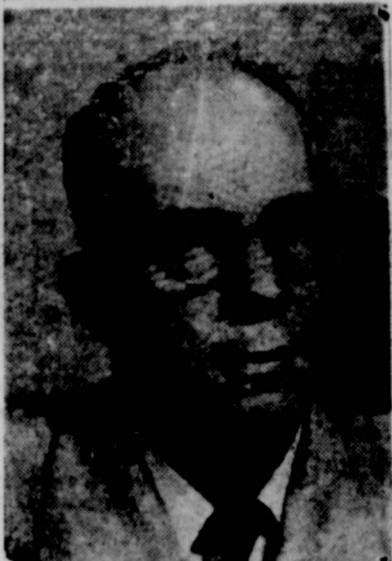

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Extend Service Lines of Water, Sewer System

Allan Meador, construction superintendent for Sherman Machine & Iron Works this week said that completion of the newly authorized extensions of the water and sewer mains under their contract with the city has been temporarily stopped by lack of pipe.

**Income tax paying time now.** No likelihood of any forgetting but there is likelihood or possibility a person will put off from day to day until the deadline arrives.

**Likewise on Monday** the time limit expires on the payment of poll taxes, if you want to vote in any election which may occur during the period to January 31, 1956. Almost surely the road bond is due to bob up again during the year and there are other probabilities, including of interest to residents of incorporated towns, vote for municipal officials. This isn't intended as a lecture. If you don't want to be bothered with voting don't bother with paying your poll tax before January 31. If you don't want to take a chance on being disfranchised for the year, however, the poll tax must be paid before the deadline, which is next Monday night.

**Veterans Land Board** and the mess that has been created by the favoritism which gave big block land operators fast action on their requests for veterans' land purchase certificates while others cooled their heels—all of this is still much in the news, at least much in the minds of the people of the state. Attorney General John Ben Shepperd last weekend told newsmen in Austin that the land board was only one of 24 major duties wished off on the attorney general by the legislature, whereas he had found the attorney general's office alone a man-sized job. Where this type of a committee is created the governors, attorneys-general and the like have simply left carrying out provisions of the law in the hands of the department under which it would gravitate naturally. This has been the rule for two generations or more. This is the first, so far as we are informed, where the custom became a boomerang on the inactive members, who attended occasional sessions of a board or commission for the record.

**People down-state** look askance, some with positive alarm, at the use high plains people are making of the water they pour on their irrigated lands. They view this activity as taking their water for our use. They are cool to the idea of damming up flood water far up on the table land. If any money is spent to build dams they want them built closer to home. Since the most votes and most legislators are in those parts of the state where this alarm is felt their attitude is dangerous for us. Undoubtedly more insistent effort can be expected to "control" the disposition of underground water on the high plains.

**The Canadian River dam** should be made a reality and probably it will later. Right now municipalities which must finance and support the dam are faced with the probability that water rates would have to be increased in their towns unless a cheaper way of financing can be found. Amarillo and Plainview are two towns which have balked until they can take a new look. What their citizens would say to a possible increase in water rates for several years to guarantee the dam and the assured supply of water in the future, as against their present lower rates and their hope that water supply is ample, is the problem authorities in the two cities face. Others may have the same problem.

**Meanwhile big cities** of the area, particularly Lubbock and Amarillo, are buying up underground water rights on huge tracts of land so as to guarantee against future needs so that when and if a plan similar to the Canadian dam project does not go through their towns will not be faced with a shortage of water. What they will do if the wells run dry and they have not taken the opportunity presented by the Canadian River dam project is another angle they would like to know about now instead of two decades hence. Unfortunately you can't play the game that way.

**It appears that people living** on the Colorado River water shed are far ahead of their neighbors on the other major streams of Texas in a program of harnessing their river to make it their servant instead of their master. This one-time rampant stream has been gentled from a point north of Austin about 80 miles to its mouth on the Gulf of Mexico, so that it serves as a major supply of electric current, as a source for irrigation of rice fields in coastal areas and as a fisherman's paradise (six big lakes). From Buchanan dam, 80 miles upstream from Austin on up past Snyder in Scurry county the people are making ready for further control of the big river and there appears to be plenty of water all the way up the stream for their presently-intended purposes. Upstream, of course, the two major purposes will be for municipal water supply and for recreation areas. As a matter of course the dammed up water also will furnish more underground water from seepage, for the people who live in lower altitudes.

## QB Club Makes Finance Report

Quarterback club president Gayle Mayo announced this week the completed financial statement of the club for the season just past. The figures listed below were prepared by Gene Collins, Jr., treasurer, and show what the club made and where these monies were spent.

In making the statement public Mayo said there had been some criticism of the club in not helping to finance the football banquet. Early obligations pledged by the club for heavy expenditures on the football field last summer drained away most all the income and left a balance of only \$257.41 which the club felt would be needed to feed boys from the rural areas in the early days of practice in August. The two largest items of expense were for the club's share of the new lights and scoreboard and were bigger projects than has been tackled in past years.

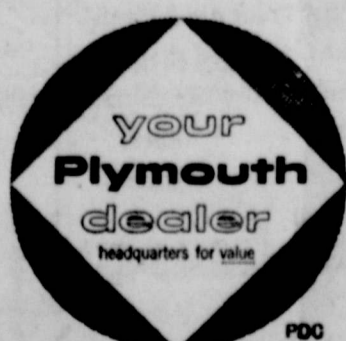

A man in our town is called strange because he doesn't like "parties." Yet taken two or three at a time, he likes people, is a wonderful conversationalist himself. He's really quite strange.

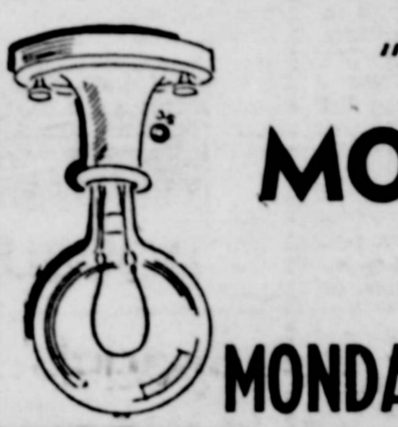

### Cotton Allotment Increase Needed

Texas cotton farmers will be allowed to plant 7,612,779 acres of cotton this season.

The question now arises: Has the pentium swung too far in favor of controlled production?

In Texas, agriculture has been hard-hit by a four-year drought. In many areas, the few acres allowed for cotton under the allotment program failed to produce at all. This brought economic hardship where cotton is the main cash crop.

This year, the cotton farmer needs to make money on his crop. However, price alone, guaranteed by a parity program based on reduced acreage, does not insure farm prosperity. It is price times volume that will determine profits in 1955.

After all, it is what remains in the farmer's pocket after the bills are paid—his net income—that measures whether he has had a good year or a bad one.

Deeper crop cutbacks are ordinarily used as a basis to support the parity program. They act as a temporary restraining force to prevent a burdensome surplus that would break the market price. This has been the practice in former years and in many cases has worked to good advantage.

But these days in Texas, due to the drought, are not ordinary in any sense of the word.

The Texas farmer will need to

plant more cotton this year and still be assured of a good price. Instead, present plans call for cutting last year's acreage back by an additional 16 percent.

At the very minimum, Texas should have at least as much acreage as it had last year, if not more. Now that our farmers are under economic stress, it is no time to bolster the price of cotton by further reducing the acreage.

This year, the farmer needs price plus volume.

COLLEGE STATION, Jan. 24—Thrift-wise homemakers will find a varied choice of plentiful foods at the grocer's in February.

Eggs head the column of abundant foods on the U.S. Department of Agriculture's February plentiful foods list.

Many seafoods, such as shrimp, frozen haddock filets, frozen halibut and canned tuna, are on the list.

Holdings of heavy turkeys remain near record highs, making them a bargain.

Dried beans, mainly pinto and large and baby limas, are in good supply.

Only fruits scored as February plentiful are oranges and grapefruit, both fresh and processed.

Lettuce, carrots, canned green beans and canned corn are more plentiful now than in several months, says U.S.D.A.

Other foods in large supply include rice, raisins, almonds, lard, vegetable fats and oils.

### Your Income Tax Return for 1954

#### How to File Your 1954 Return

Who must file: Every citizen or resident of the United States, whether an adult or minor, who had \$600.00 (\$1200.00 if 65 years of age or over) or more of gross income in 1954 must file an income tax return on Form 1040 or 1040A.

Most of your tax is withheld from your wages every payday or paid on Declaration of estimated tax every quarter. However, the law requires you to file an annual return to determine whether you owe more or you should get a refund.

When to File: Your income tax return should be filed between January 1 and April 15, 1955, and not later than the last-minute rush. Those few individuals who keep books on a fiscal-year basis, must file by the fifteenth day of the fourth month after the close of their taxable years.

How to Pay: Any balance of tax shown to be due in Item 13, Page 1, of your return on Form 1040 must be paid in full with your return. You may pay cash or by check or money order. Checks or money orders should be made payable to "District Director, Internal Revenue Service."

How to Sign: You have not filed a legal return unless you sign it. If you and your wife are filing a joint return, both of you must sign the

return. You do not need to have your return notarized since your signature has the same legal effect as swearing to the truthfulness of your return.

Where to Get Forms and Help: As far as practical, the District Director mails forms directly to taxpayers. If you need additional forms, you can get them from your District Director's office, and also at most banks and post offices. Many employers also keep forms for the convenience of employees.

The address of your district director of Internal Revenue is 2101 Pacific Avenue, Dallas, Texas. The address of the nearest office is Room 203, U. S. Postoffice Building, Plainview. The telephone number is 4-5915. Office hours for current income tax information are 8:30 a. m. to 12:30 p. m., Mondays only thru January. After reading the instructions, you should be able to prepare your own return, unless you have

complicated problems. If you do need help, you can get it at your District Director's office. A more detailed publication entitled, "Your Federal Income Tax" may be obtained for 25 cents from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C.

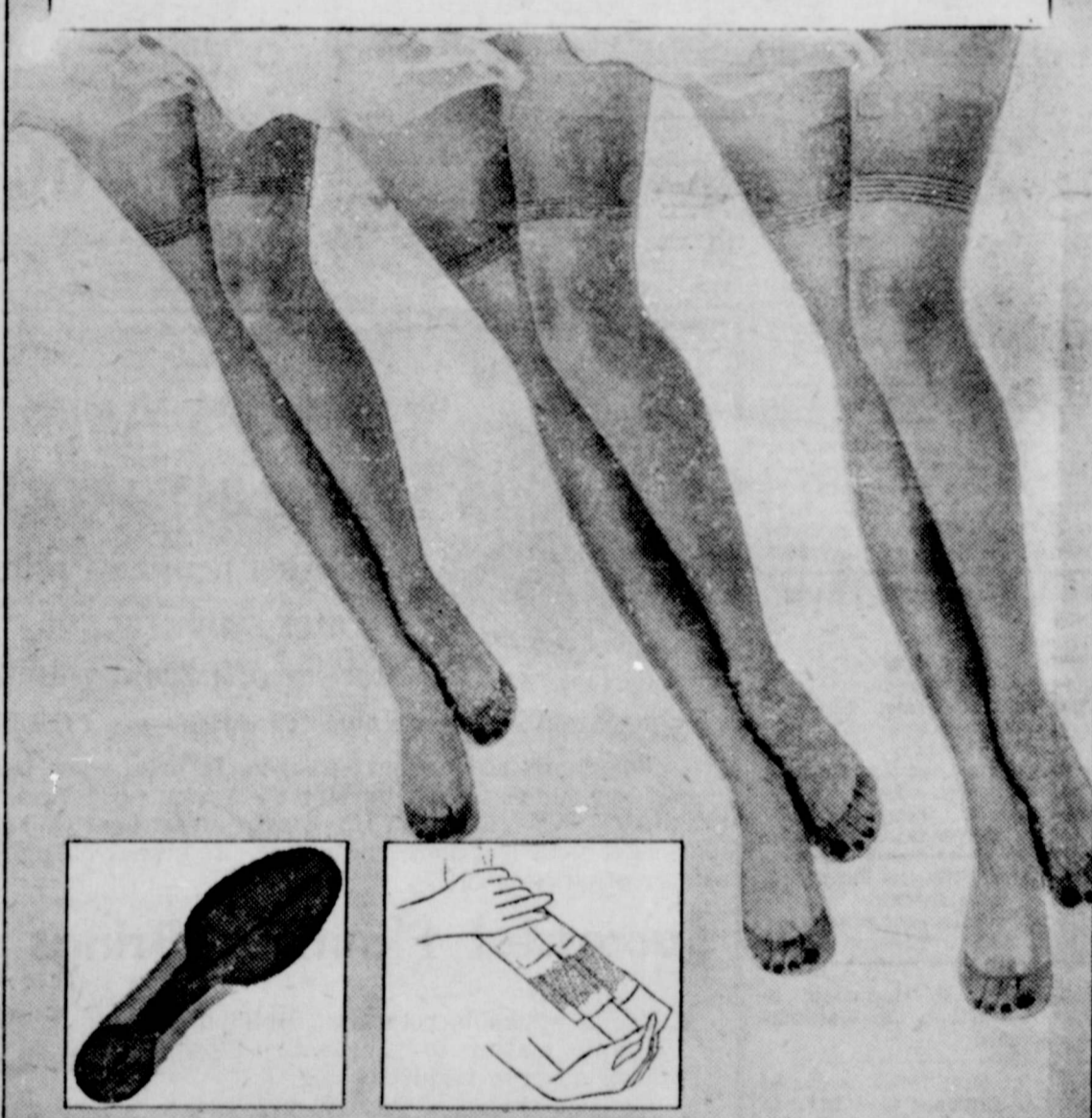

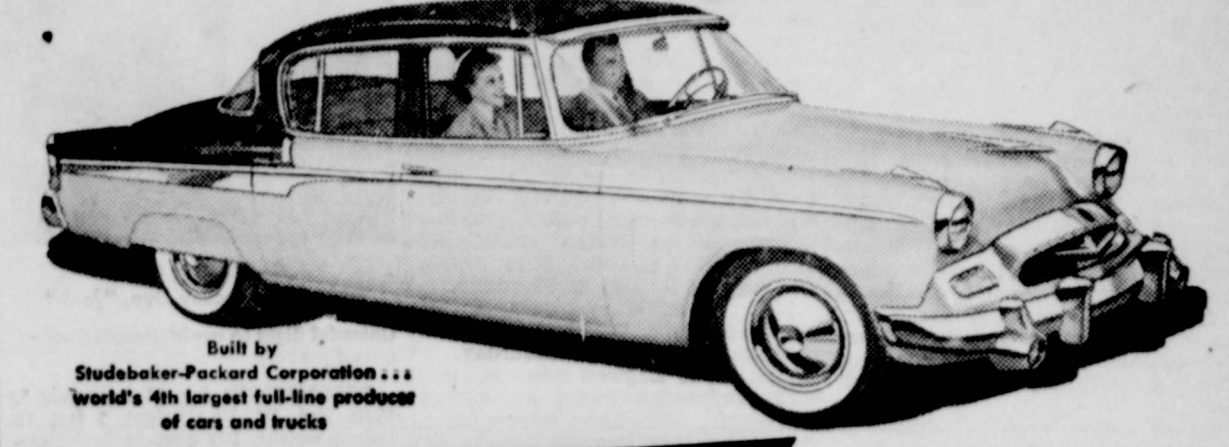

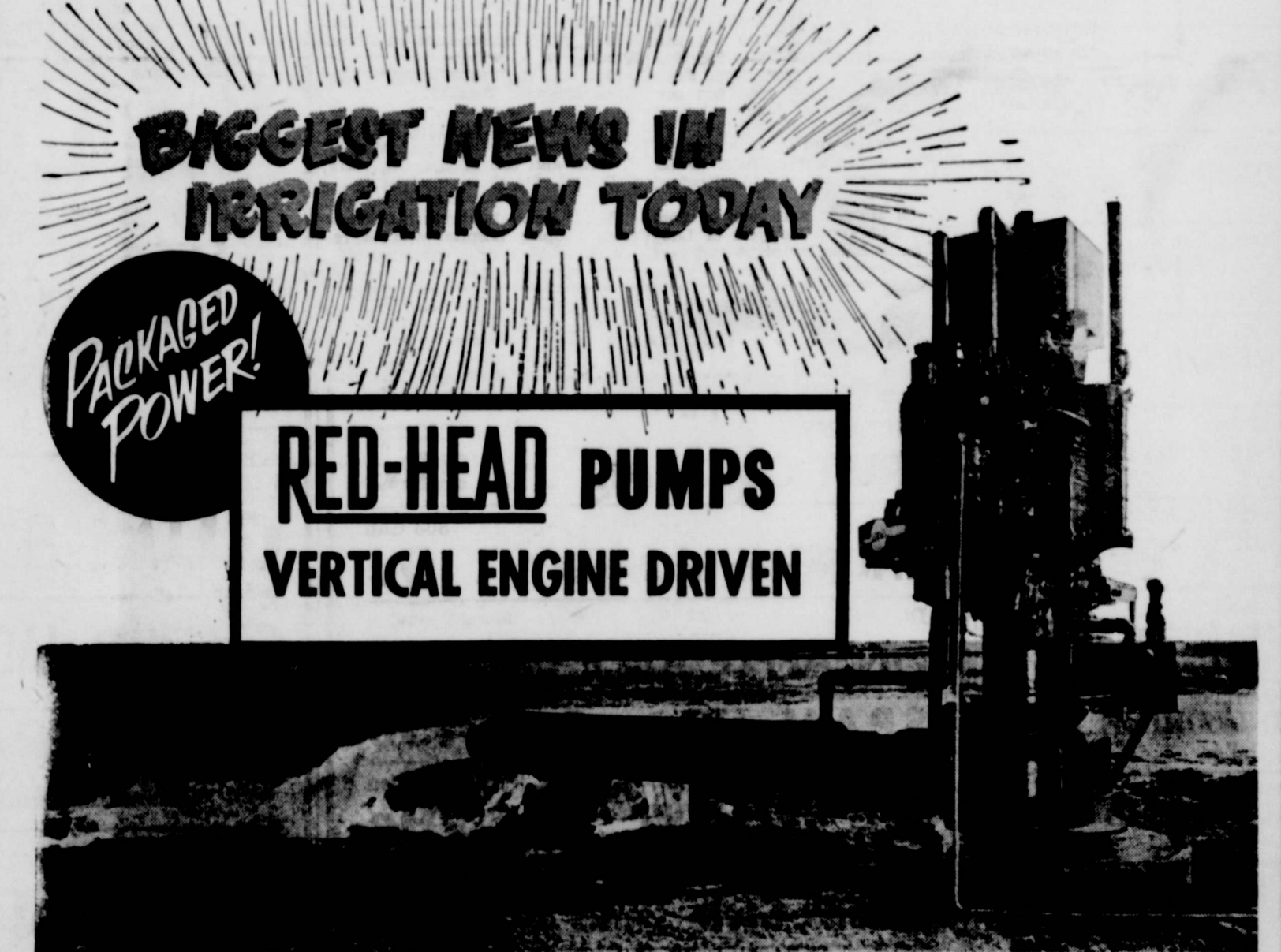

## The Laundry Pin-Up Girl

(By Nancy Morckel)

Have you ever stopped to think of the work involved in doing laundry pin-up girl, as compared with the lady with an electric clothes dryer?

Let's join the lady without a dryer during her typical wash day. The first load is just out of the washer. She lifts the 30 to 40 pounds of wet laundry waist high, pin-ups, stagers and stomps through the snow and slush sometimes on the clothesline. Then she begins to stoop, pick up a garment, stretch it on the line, stoop, pick up a garment, stretch, pin it on the line, stoop, thirty or forty times. Her fingers are wet and numb and cold but she has two or three baskets of clothes to hang out. At last she is done, she has carried out more than 100 pounds of clothes - over 2 1/2 tons a year the same as carrying the tractor around the yard each year.

During the next few hours clothes will dry - if the sun is out - if the temperature stays above the wind doesn't get too strong to blow them down. Upon removal the clothes from the line, she finds they are too dry for ironing, she has to spend the next few minutes dampening and rolling clothes they can be ironed. Our laundry pin-up girl is lucky if she is through with her washing by 5:00 time to get supper. She'll have iron tomorrow.

By contrast, the lady with an electric clothes dryer merely removes clothes from the washer, pins them in the drier and in a few minutes they are ready for ironing - all without lifting and bending the elements. And her clothes are nicer than if she had line clothes under the most ideal conditions, smelling fresh and clean, and with colored clothes brighter than sun-dried laundries could ever be.

Legislative Budget Board members have presented their recommended general fund appropriations for the next two years.

Senate chairmanships announced by Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey include Sen. Crawford Martin of Hillsboro for Finance; Sen. Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo for State Affairs; Sen. Johnnie B. Rogers of Austin for Insurance; and Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas for Labor.

**Smith Makes History**  
Rep. Max Smith, of San Marcos made history when House Speaker Jim Lindsey appointed him chairman of the House Appropriations Committee.

Representative Smith is the second man in Texas history to be twice named head of this all-important committee and the only man to serve consecutive terms as a chairman.

Rep. Travis Henderson from Lamar County served as Finance Committee chairman (now called the Appropriations Committee) in 1893 and again in 1899.

## State Jobs

More than 60 appointments to state positions by Gov. Shivers, will soon be due.

Included is the naming of a new secretary of state, a highway commission member, two members to the State Board of Public Welfare, one member to the State Board of Control, three new University of Texas regents and three A&M College directors.

Shivers is expected to reappoint Major General K. L. Berry as adjutant general and Mark Wentz as State Fire Insurance Commissioner.

## Insurance

Bills to give Texas insurance company policy holders and investors better protection are pouring into the House and Senate.

Primarily, they are asking for higher capital requirements for new companies, stricter examinations and licensing laws, and placement of insurance stock sales under state regulation.

**Labor Control Bills**  
Three labor control bills, all by Sen. Parkhouse of Dallas, have been introduced in the senate. One house labor bill has been sponsored.

**1. Stop unemployment compensation payments to persons on strike or idle from a strike by a union that they belong to.**  
**2. Ban picketing of an establishment if the union does not represent a majority of the firm's employees.**  
**3. Assess fines from \$25 to \$500 and a six-month jail sentence for violation of the law.**

The House bill would set up state supervised elections to determine whether employees want union representation. It would also create a state Industrial Commission as a dispute mediator.

**Whooping Cranes**  
A permanent Texas winter home for rare whooping cranes would be provided by a House bill.

Sponsored by Rep. Charles L. Sandahl Jr. of Austin, the bill would provide islands and marshland areas on the Gulf Coast for the Audubon Society, which looks after the birds.

**Land Board**  
The Veterans Land Board has tightened up on approval of state loans for veterans wanting to buy land.

Applications for loans showing relationship between the buyer and seller are being held up. Appraisers have been asked to submit full information on all applications submitted to the board.

Meanwhile, a Travis County grand jury investigation of land sales started. District Attorney Les Procter announced a list of 22 witnesses called for the investigation.

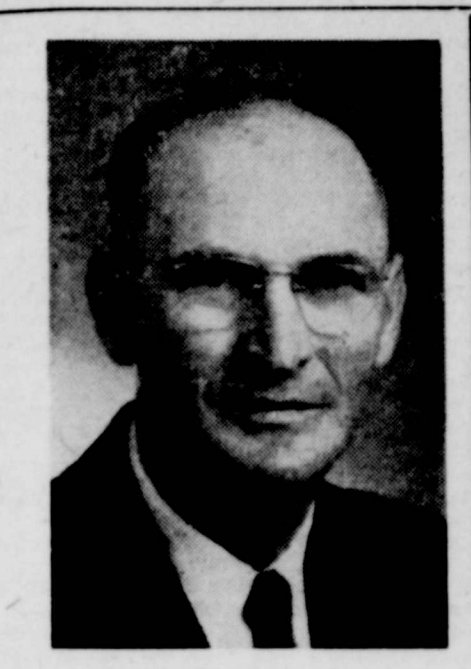
