Pioneer's Feeder Lines .- Story and drawing showing the big outlay that Pioneer Gas Company has made to bring their product to the farmers of Floyd county, tells what is probably one of the most important economic events that has transpired in the county in many a day. No books in the desks, no hats and coats on the wall, no dinner still and silent. But not for long down, the little schoolhouse was flung to the winds only a few planks are hereby notified to be present. ever being seen.





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
