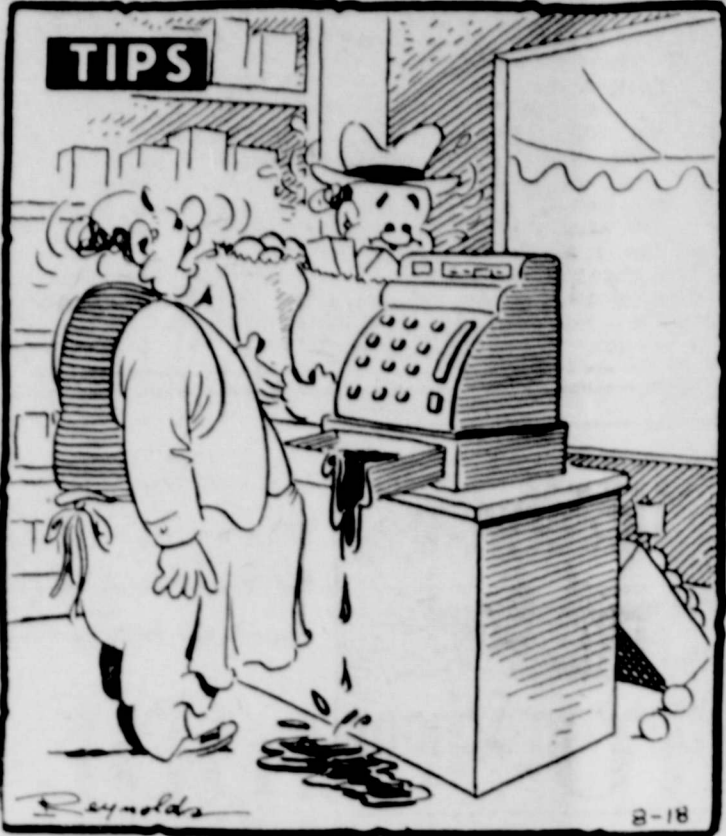

Floydada Country Club is beginning to take on the air of a country club. Aggressive management, with the intent to make the country club a thing of beauty and a joy forever, is getting the backing of the large majority of their members. Some of the members, we suspect, do not get the idea of a country club. They want to save their money, which is all right. But a country club is a spending organization. It spends for recreation. To those who do not feel the need the spending is a waste of money. They, of course, are not too happy over a big clubhouse budget, a big maintenance budget for golf course and greens, and other playgrounds. Fortunately Floydada Country Club has a \$50,000 lead on most clubs in West Texas. This big lead consists of the terrain itself. The rest of it you have to put there with money and work and planning.

Need a Good Rain. Many a Floyd County field of forage feed ought to have a good slow rain this week. Even in the area around Floydada the crop shows the need of moisture. A two and 4-tenths inch rain that falls in 23 minutes doesn't get the job done, unfortunately. It doesn't get a chance to go into the ground. A tremendous feed crop would be much more tremendous-er. Perhaps the word that all the speech makers and story writers are "hipped on" at the moment—"fabulous"—would best describe the kind of a crop that we want. A crop so big that like Mr. Carter's oats, it could not be stacked on the ground it grew upon.

Oh, For 20 Days. That's what the cotton growers are thinking as their cotton loads up with squares and blooms but, snail-like it seems, does not go ahead and put mature bolls on the stalks. Since we had such an untoward spring and the crop has such a late start—enough good exceptions to prove the rule—we need an extra 20 days at the finish of the season. It has been done, Dame Nature is a fickle hussy. Sometimes she is

most kind. Most signs point to a November frost. If the signs prevail it would mean a good cotton crop. If the date is late enough in November it means a big crop. Right now the crop looks like a million dollars as the saying goes. All it needs is time.

The County Budget. Preparation and presentation of the county budget, with a hearing for the public to take part in, duly announced has been the law for a good many years. Since the first budget was prepared in Floyd County in the last term of Judge Howard on into the present time, the files of The Hesperian do not reveal that more than half a dozen citizens in all have appeared for as much as 10 minutes at the date and hour set for the hearing by the Commissioners Court as prescribed by law. As we believe, we haven't had a judge and Commissioners Court yet that has not been regular in every respect as to preparing the budget, putting it on file in the clerk's office and holding the hearing. At the risk of being called a busybody, we suggest that citizens who can should show the court they are interested in well-managed county affairs, and that their job of handling the county's business is looked upon as important to the general welfare. The least most any taxpayer could do would be to go by the clerk's office and take a cursory look at the condensed statement of disbursements last year, what the anticipated income will be this year and what the commissioners anticipate they are going to do with it.

The possible deficiency of "trace minerals" in crop growing soils of Texas has been brought to farmer's attention in recent months. Argicultural chemists believe that most "trace mineral" deficiency symptoms are due rather to poor drainage, nematodes or other soil-borne troubles. Check first before dosing the soil with various chemicals, they advise.

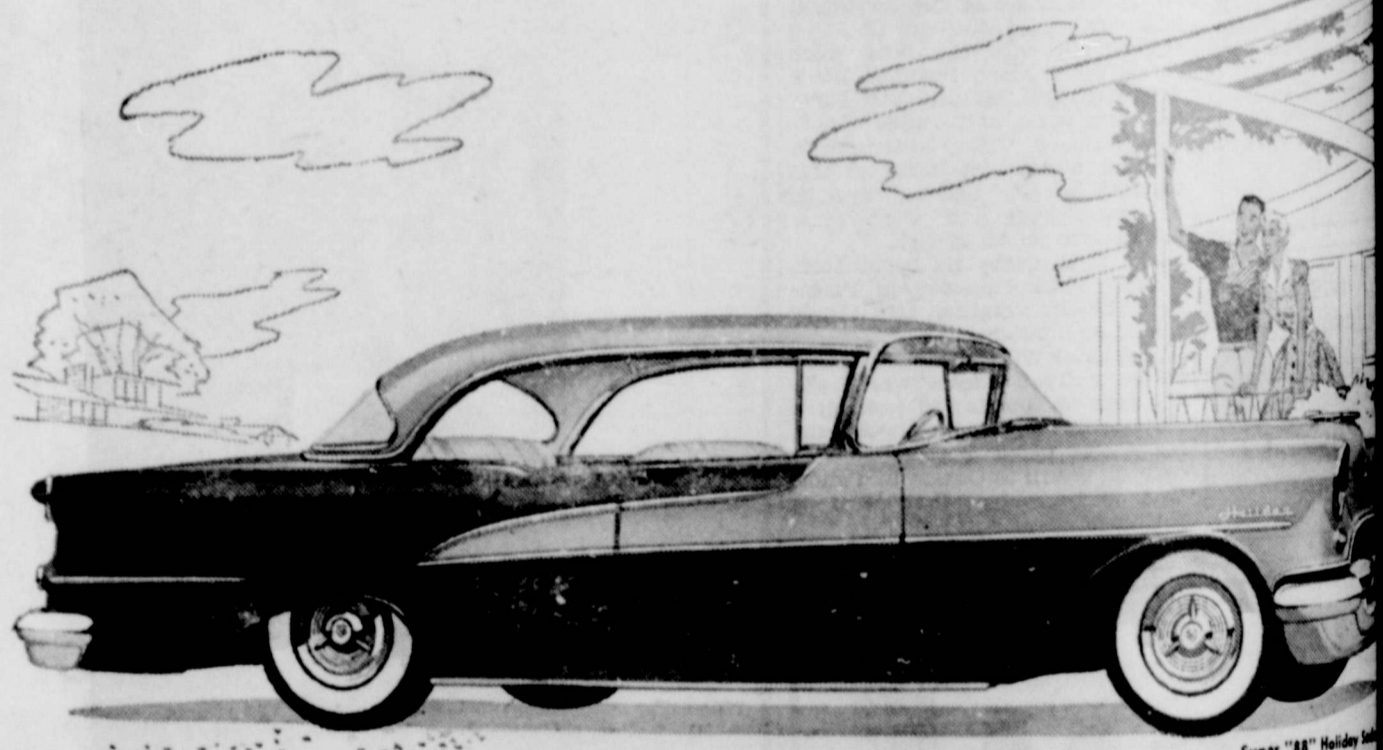

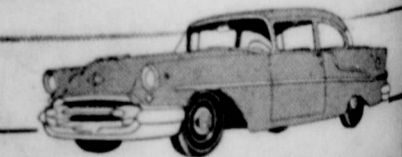

In addition to the extended credit program, assistance will be available through the Farmers Home Administration to both creditors and debtors in effecting voluntary adjustments of existing debts, when necessary, in order that the debt load on the farmer or rancher be held to a point within his ability to repay.

In cases where it is necessary in order to enable the farmer or rancher to continue his operations the Farmers Home Administration may include funds in the loan to refinance his indebtedness.
Eligibles Are Listed
A loan may be made to a farm owner, farm operator, or stockman, including a partnership or corporation, if the applicant:
1. Is an established operator and is primarily engaged in farming or livestock operations.
2. Is unable to obtain the necessary credit elsewhere.
3. Can be expected to carry on farming operations that are consistent with proper land use for the area and will have reasonable prospects of success with the assistance of the loan.

County committees of the Farmers Home Administration will determine the eligibility of applicants.

When you and I were young, Maggie, we heard a lot about the example we were setting. Our classmates, friends, the neighbors' children and even chance acquaintances—to hear our parents tell it—were lurking behind doors and lavender bushes to see what we did so they could imitate us. This made for a very unnatural attitude.

Girls of our day were likely to be one person in the relaxed privacy of the home and quite another at church, at school or at parties. It also added to the already abundant self-consciousness, and maybe a little to the ego, of teen-age daughters. For naturally a girl who already suspected she was the center of attraction was twice as bad about striking poses if convinced by her elders that all the world's a stage and she the principal actor.

We sometimes think, however, that mothers have gone to the opposite extreme with today's "Be yourself" philosophy.

Not long ago we heard some office girls talking about a local doctor's wife. One of them had seen her at the beauty parlor several times—admired her hair, her beauty and her cultured voice. But she observed, "She must be kind of stupid; her little girl is always telling her she already knows the things she asks about."

Maybe she is stupid. Or maybe she needs to inform her teen-age daughter that there's such a thing as setting a bad example—even when there's no one present she particularly wants to impress.

Influence is a subtle thing—and there's nothing so embarrassing as to have someone show up years later, who says, "Do you remember the day you said this-and-so? I've never forgotten it." And you wonder if old-fashioned parents who warned their young ones about setting a good or bad example could have been right.

She called last year for instructions so she said she just thought I might like to know how well pleased they were and that I might like to pass it along to others. Thank you very much, Mrs. Allen, and I'm sure a lot of folks will be enjoying corn-on-the-cob next winter.

CORN-ON-THE-COB: (These are among the varieties recommended as excellent for freezing—Golden Bantam Hybrids, Golden Cross Bantam, Cherokee, DeKalb Hybrid and Ioana).

Scalding time: By boiling water—ears 1 1/2 to 2 inches at base, 8 minutes. Larger ears require 11 minutes.

Select corn with kernels well formed, while milk is thin and sweet. With sharp knife, cut a section about 1/2 inch wide from both ends. Husks will come off easier. Husk corn and remove silk.

If necessary, wash corn. Sort for size. Scald for length of time indicated and cool in ice water the same length of time. Drain. Package in freezer foil or polyethylene bags according to your family's serving needs—with not more than 6 ears to a package. Freeze.

CREAM-STYLE-CORN: Cut kernel tips and scrape milk from cob. To 2 cups of corn add 1/2 cup hot water; Boil 3 minutes stirring constantly. Chill over chipped ice. Pack and freeze immediately.

Highlights And Delights From State Capitol

Vern Sanford Texas Press

Despite "go slow" from top state officials, more Texas schools have announced plans for complete or partial integration.

Allan Shivers, in setting up a state advisory committee, cautioned against "rushing headlong" into integration ahead of legislation.

With the Texas Education Agency making no recommendations on local policies, its file of segregation clippings from over the state shows that about 36 schools have definite plans, either pro or con.

Numerous other districts studied being made by bi-racial committees. Questionnaires are being sent in some areas.

Citizens Councils, similar anti-integration organizations, have sprung up in parts of Texas areas. Dallas and Austin have councils pledged to desegregation by every legal means.

Austin last week was the largest city with a high percentage of Negro students to plan integration this fall. It will begin in the top three grades which are 15 per cent Negro. A liberal transfer policy is expected to ease adjustment.

San Antonio, with 7.7 per cent Negro students, is the largest school system to plan immediate integration. All grades will be included here.

Other towns adopting immediate, across-the-board integration include Corpus Christi, Lubbock, San Angelo, El Paso, Crystal City, Carrizo Springs, LaFeria, Mission and Brownsville.

More popular is partial desegregation policy, such as Austin's. It begins usually on the high school level with a staggered schedule for lower grades.

Cities favoring this include San Marcos, Robstown, Bishop, Port Lavaca, Brownwood, Kerrville, Westlake, Harlingen, Sinton, Amarillo, Kingsville, Friona, Rockport, Aransas Pass, Karnes City, Kenedy and Runge.

When it hears of a school planning to desegregate, the Education Agency writes local officials for a blueprint of the plan. These are made available to undecided school leaders who want to know how others are solving the problem.

Vaccine Shipment Expected

Arrival of 50,838 shots of Salk polio vaccine was expected by the State Health Department this week. This is part of Texas allotment of 1,177,069 shots in addition to the vaccine given free to first and second grade school children.

Under the "volunteer control" plan adopted by the State Polio Vaccine Committee, 83 per cent will be allocated for commercial use, 17 per cent for public agencies.

This week's shipment was to come from the Wyeth Laboratories in Marietta, Pa.

Meanwhile, Health Department

figures showed polio on the increase. Forty-five new cases were reported during the past week, bringing the 1955 total to 939.

Of the victims 45 had received Salk vaccine.

Crop Prospects Improve

August predictions for 1955 Texas farm production, through improved since early summer, fell below 1954 figures.

U. S. Department of Agriculture forecasts showed a probable cotton crop of 3.9 million bales—one per cent lower than 1954.

But the prospective 278-pound yield per acre is the highest since 1866. Improved soil moisture, irrigation and new yield-increasing practices by growers are credited for the high figure.

Texas cotton acreage is nearly one million acres less than for 1954.

Widespread summer rains have upped the estimated wheat crop by more than two million bushels. In June the USDA forecast a total of 11,883,000 bushels; by August the figure was raised to 14,212,000.

Even with the improved outlook the 1955 crop will be less than half that in 1954.

High yields of hay also were forecast as a result of showers. Sorghum, corn and peanuts were aided. On the unfavorable side, rains delayed insect control programs and created a critical problem in cotton fields.

Book Lists Mailed

A list of 318 proposed public school textbooks has been mailed out to county and district superintendents.

Dr. J. W. Edgar, state commissioner of education, urged they be made available for public inspection.

Petitions and suggestions will be heard by the 15-member state textbook committee between Sept. 15 and Oct. 1. Its recommendations will be drawn up Oct. 3-8.

Actual adoption will be by the commissioner and State Board of Education. Texts chosen will be for use in September, 1956.

Schools Satisfy Parents

Seven out of eight parents either are satisfied with Texas public schools or are too uninformed to have an opinion.

That conclusion was drawn from study of 16,788 "parent reactionnaires" circulated in 59 school districts by the Texas Association of School Administrators.

Survey results were announced last week in Austin by Dr. Kenneth E. McIntyre who coordinated tabulation.

Criticism, he said, was aimed more at high schools than lower grades. Also some parents felt the school fell short in developing "good behavior."

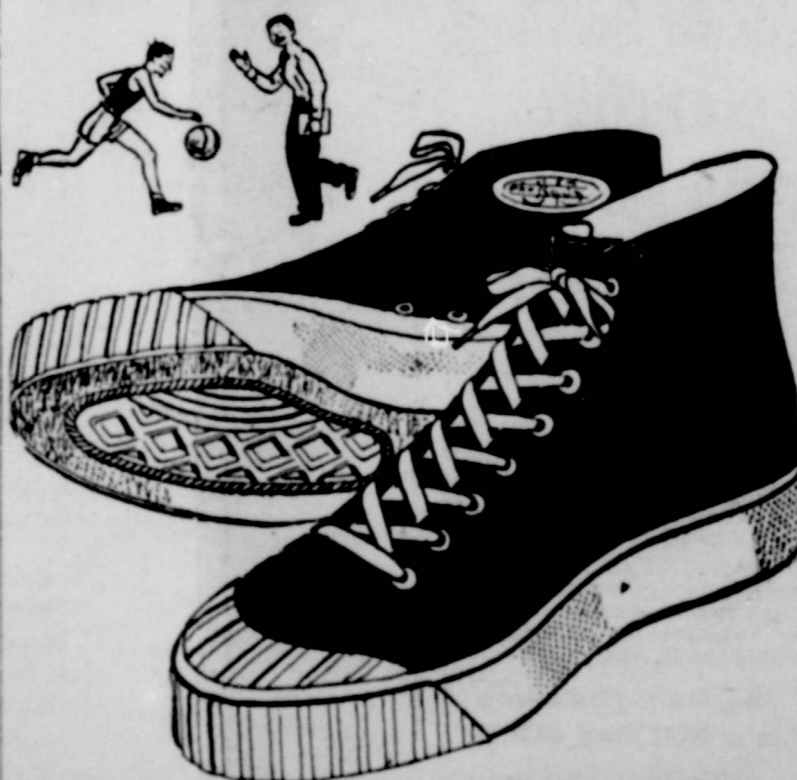

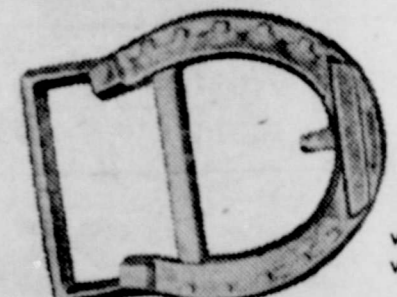

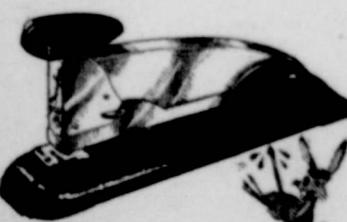
