

"Sitters in great numbers and from farther away every week are flocking to Comanche and sitting centers continue to spread," Mr Green said: Centers are opening as far away as DeLeon and Gustine.

Dirt in that area is testing from .025 to .065, according to the analy. is from the Les Ripley farm two miles east of Comanche.

The sitting fever hit the Comanche country six months ago when a traveler stopped at a dairy farm and asked permission to sit in the dirt there.

The farm owner, over-run by sitters within a few weeks finally sold his dairy herd in self-defense. He guarantees nothing and makes no

Fall To Be Early? Migratory fowls which come to Texas to spend their winters and song birds which travel through the state and on into even warmer climes to get away from snow and cold, are telling a different story to the one that is seen and talked about on the high plains. We mean as regards the time that fall weather will hit. A report from the Texas Game and Fish Commission says the preliminary migration of southward bound birdlife seems a little ahead of schedule. The first cool spell reached the fringe of the Gulf Coast about 10 days early, says this report and had its proportionate effect on the birds. Ducks, blue wing teals and pintails, arrived on average time and in normal numbers but green wing teal came in in unusual numbers. Assorted songbirds moved in, bunched up and got ready for further southward movement. Live oak acorns began falling 10 days early and buck deer began rubbing off the velvet from their horns 14 days early.
