





VIEWS AND COMMENT

We like what J. Walter Hammond said in a recent interview wherein he pointed out that the principal source of the farmer's trouble is in the fact that they can produce more than they can sell at a fair price. While labor and industry work on an economy of scarcity the farmer tries to operate in an economy of full production. The two ideas clash at every turn and the farmer is thus forced to subsidize other industries. As for instance American shipping. The farm surplus, sent abroad must travel in American bottoms, and American shipping is hog tied almost as completely as the rails to false standards. One of the results he said, is that while labor and industry are eating higher and higher on the hog the farmer's income continues to slide further downhill. Sounds corny but it isn't corny to say that all major depressions in this country have been "farm-fed and farm-led," and the cards have been stacked in 1955 in almost the identical way that they were stacked in 1929.

However, we lean to the belief that it is the state department the congressional committies should holding hearings on and taking testimony about, not USDA. The state department is the principal villain behind the scene in the farm debacle. Mr. Dulles is promising us out of the cotton, wheat and sheep business about as fast as it can be He has gone far and away past any intent of the congress which has been supplying taxpayers' money for foreign aid. A power-mad State Department has the country in as bad a swivet abroad as a law- making Supreme Court has us at home.

The latter government agency can only point out the probabilities. The TV reporters take it from there. In this part of the world, weather follows no pattern except one of great variableness. A forecaster who tries to tell the public what a cold front in Montana will be like by the time it reaches the Texas Panhandle is in poor business. The radio folk found out about scare reporting, or did they, after they had scared the populace out of its wits a few times, telling them to run for their lives from impending cyclones.

Governor Shivers, Senator Daniel, Sen. Lyndon Johnson, and several congressmen have spearheaded their efforts. They called attention to the enormous public and private expenditures made in the area to serve Hood personnel.

Senator Daniel received a tele-gram from the Secretary of the Army promising Texans a hearing on the subject.

Army dissatisfaction was thought to stem from the refusal of local property owners to permit use of their land for maneuvers without payment.
