The story of an expanding business community with increased facilities and strengthened capital investments are strongly borne out by a recap of the building activities of local business interests.


No new major outside investments have been recorded in the year but local business interests have invested more than \$300,000 in new buildings and modernization.



VIEWS AND COMMENT

NOT NEW AT ALL

(Editorial from the Progressive Farmer)

On of the most persistent fallacies that seems to be in the minds of many people is that farm surpluses are something new and that our farm price problem has developed only during the years that we have had a federal farm program.

These people are either too young to remember or too lazy to find out. It should be apparent to anyone that there never would have been a federal farm program in the first place if farmers hadn't been in a desperate situation.

There is nothing political about the farm problem. The Republicans claim that farm prices were already on the way down when they took over in 1953. That is true. But when they say the farm price problem developed while the Democrats were in power, they are conveniently forgetting what happened to farm people during the long years they ran the Government. It was the loss of farms and the failure of rural banks in the twenties that had a vital part in the total collapse of our national economy in the early thirties. The situation for farm people was unfavorable in the twenties and became so desperate in 1933 that there had to be a federal farm program . . . or else.

We had periodic cotton surpluses prior to 1933. Anyone who was farming in 1914, 1920, 1926, or 1932 knows what surpluses did to cotton prices in those years. The only difference between now and then is that now farmers have some protection. They don't lose everything they own when by the grace of God and good farming they make extrabig crops. They are no longer penalized so heavily for producing abundantly. And that is the way it should be. Abundant production is a good thing for a nation, even though it is sometimes expensive. If you don't think so, take a good look at Russia . . . or even Great Britain, where a good part of what the nation makes on world trade goes out of the country to pay for the food and fiber its people must have.

No White Christmas. Floyd County had no white Christmas again in 1955, repeating a long sequence of years with no snow at Christmas time. Cattle and farming interests, of course, would have welcomed a deep snow and rejoiced in it, as would most of us. But to the destitute and desperately poor the balmy weather was a blessing beyond measure. At midnight Christmas Eve Santa Claus was operating in the open air in his shirt sleeves.

Hybrid Seeds May Increase Sidelights From Grain Sorghum Profits

(GUEST EDITORIAL)

An event which did not receive the notice that perhaps it should have received was the announcement by the U.S. Department of Agriculture a few weeks ago that a new type of hybrid grain sorghum had been successfully developed.

The development of this new hybrid seed may mean a drastic change in the farming operations of this area. It will increase yields from 20 to 40 per cent and the experts say that in a normal moisture year, yields of 110 to 125 bushels per acre will not be uncom-

This area has long been a grain sorghum area, and the acreage has grown rapidly in recent years with the development of improved varieties of combine milo. Now the stage is set for more acreage devoted to grain sorghum and reduction in wheat acreage.

The new hybrid seed, which is a dwarf type stock will require less moisture and less soil food than any varieties now being grown. Some enthusiastic observers think grain sorghums may even push wheat out of the number one spot in our agriculture picture.

The agriculture department at Texas Tech has long worked on developing grain sorghums in the same position in this area as corn occupies in the middle west.

Experts have long contended that the best use of agriculture in the Plains area is as a in U. S. Trust. livestock feeding center, using grain sorghums in place of corn. With proper development, this area could supplant the middle west feeder territory as the nation's major supplier of grain fed beef.

With the development of new grain sorghum varieties, we may see that day arrive.



record of the farm, the applicant's ability and experience, farm plans and similar factors are used to determine the repayment ability of the applicant. A land capability map will be prepared by the Soil Conservation Service for the farm or ranch to be operated with the proceeds

Each loan applicant is expected to carry out farming practices that will make proper use of his land and to take part in all programs designed to develop a sound agricultural economy. However, whether or not a loan is made depends upon whether it finances the type of farming that will enable the borrower to repay the funds advanced.

needed adjustment in farming practices are to be made a detailed farm and home plan will be prepared and management guidance will be provided by the county supervisors of the Farmers Home Administration to the extent needed. When credit is required only to finance annual operating expenses only a minimum of planning is required and farm management guidance will not accompany the loan. The credit provided by the Farmers Home Administration will be used only to supplement credit available from private and cooperative

Loans are made for the purchase of livestock, farm equipment, seed fertilizer, feed, insecticides, farm supplies, and other farm and home operating needs. Loans are also made to finance soil conservation measures, development of domestic and irrigation water systems, repair Hill. of existing farm buildings, and when necessary, the purchase of additional land needed to provide an economic unit. In cases where it is necessary, to enable the farmer or rancher to continue his operations loans may include funds to refinance certain chattel indebtedness.

applicant (1) is an established operator and is primarily engaged in farming or livestock operations; (2) is unable to obtain the necessary credit elsewhere; (3) will have reasonable prospects of success with the assistance of the loan; and (4) will own or have available under satisafctory tenure arrangements a farm suitable for carrying on sucessful farming operations.

Wash and Iron **New Materials Different Way**

ialist of Lighthouse Electric Cooperative, has made the following suggestions relative to washing the new so-called miracle Fabrics.-Ed.

Here are some suggestions on how to wash the new miracle fabrics: Today we cannot rely on grandmother's way of washing clothes because clothing then was woven in four natural fibers - cotton, linen, silk and wool. In this day and age our clothes can be made of those plus many man-made fibers which can be washed in the washing machine but require special care as to water temperature and the use of chemicals.

The handsome and long-wearing fabrics made from these fibers have many amazing qualities, never before thought feasible - warm though light in weight, they can be washed and dried in a jiffy; they shed wrinkles and keep their shape over long periods; they require little or no ironing; and they are completely unaffected by moths and mildew.

But, to get the most out of them. takes a little know-how. If you follow a few simple rules in their laundering, their "right from the store look" can be made to last for years, and they'll wear like iron.

Check Fabrics First

First of all, as with all fabrics. check whether a garment made of new synthetic is actually washable There is only one safe way look at the label. And don't forget to check the lining, trimming, but tons and belt for washability

In general, when laundering these miracle fabrics, it is a good policy to separate light from dark garments avoid long soakings and be wary of using strong chlorine bleaches.

Nylon is a versatile and wearresistant fabric. It is washable but dyes, finishes and trim on nylon garments may not be, so judge the construction first. White nylon has an attraction for even fast colors so wash it only with other white clothing - not even the palest pastels. Bluing, not bleach, is the remedy if you err.

Orlon is rapidly becoming available in a wide variety of garments and household furnishings. They are wonderfully wrinkle resistant If properly woven, these garments are thoroughly washable when made of 100 percent orlon. Blends of the orlon-wool, orlon-cotton and other familiar fibers are also washable However, when laundering any syn-thetic blended with familiar fibers also washable, check percentage of synthetic - it must be more than the fiber it's blended with to retain easy-washing, quick-drying characteristics of synthetics.

that can be tossed into the washing machine with confidence is dynel which is extremely resistant to acids, soaps, and strong detergents. This has made it especially popular for blankets, underwear, and children's and infant's sleepwear. Dynel blankets should be washed like wool in lukewarm water (120 degrees). It is sensitive to excessive heat. Like wool, 100 percent dynel should never be brought direct in contact with heated metal surfaces if temperature is over 240 degrees. Prolonged heating could discolor and stiffen such articles. Blends of dynel and natural fabrics, however, can be ironed at normal "rayon" setting on the electric iron like other synthetics. 
