It will be "ring out the old, ring in the new" here Sunday morning at 12:01 a. m. when Floydada's new dial telephone system is put operation by the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

"Ringing out the old" means an end to the manual telephone system which has served the city over 45 years.

"Ringing in the new" heralds the advent of the automatic telephone system - a magnificent milestone in the city's communications history. It makes possible a telephone system capable of making on a second's notice, any one of thousands of inter-communications between Floydada's telephones.

J. C. OAKLEY, local manager for the telephone company, announced that everything is in readiness for the switchover.

As the time for the change to dial approaches early Sunday, a few last calls will be trickling through the present switchboard and the last familiar "Number, please" will be heard. A final check of calls being handled will be made to assure that no emergency calls are involved. Then the cutover order will be passed to telephone men

### Adjustments Add \$140 Per Month To City Pay Roll

Raises and adjustments for upgraded employes of the City of Floydada last Thursday night, voted by the council in special session, amounted to \$140 per month.

With these adjustments the city's pay roll for all departments runs to \$6,225 per month

Of these wages the light plant general fund is to be charged with \$2,992.50 per month and the water works department with \$2,972.50 per month, for a total of \$5,965.

The remaining \$260 is paid the mayor and members of the council and the corporation judge.

The mayor draws \$75 per month, each of five councilmen \$25 per month and Leonard Matsler gets an additional \$25 per month as street commissioner. Judge O. B. Olson draws \$35 to serve as corporation judge.

Among the recent changes at the city hall, Charles Horton has been named to succeed B. V. Carver, resigned as superintendent of the waterworks department, Johnny Bryant has been named headlineman in the electric department and Jeff Hart has been chosen as day fireman to fill the place vacated by the death of Carl Rodgers.

Election Time Again. First primary election day is almost here again. The date is Saturday, July 28. Interest has lagged so much it is difficult at this time to forecast. We'd say, however, interest this week-end will pick up and gather volume with a swoosh by voting day. However, many people are busy in the irrigation fields. We take it as a good political omen for Senator Daniel that he is the main target of all of his opponents. And Judge Yarborough is following the line which defeated him for attorney general and again for governor two years ago. One of Judge Yarborough's weaknesses in this campaign is that he is backed by a highly vocal minority that dreams of taking over the politics of Texas. This minority is organizing in the big centers in the same manner that the bosses organize. This crowd wants a committee of 60 to run the country from the national capital.

The three issues on this year's Democratic ballot were petitioned on them by 153,000 people of the state. Whether they should have petitioned the issues on the ballot is beside the question for us. The state and county committees had a mandate to put the issues up to the Democratic voters. And rightly all of them did except in three or four counties. One hundred fifty three thousand people is a lot of folks. The last time such an action was taken was in the twenties, according to the history books.

\_0\_ The change over in Southwestern Bell's plant from a manual operation to dial, a mark of progress undoubtedly hailed with delight by most of the people of the community, brings changes to several families which will have to learn to live with it. There will be no 'operators" left in the local office a few minutes after midnight Saturday. The fourteen persons who have been working there will be out of jobs unless they are ready to move to other points where their services are needed. Several are moving, one or two selling homes here, others cancelling rental agreements. And in some families, where an operator's job has supplemented the bread winner's salary, they'll take a second look around to see what can be done. Progress brings stresses and strains. Among other things this particular change will take upward of \$20,000 in payroll money out of t e community.

dissolve and be evenly distributed. Remove all scum as it forms. At the end of the sixth week examine cucumbers to see if they are thoroughly cured. This examination is made by cutting a cross section - if any part of the pickle is whitish or opaque it is not com-

pletely cured. After curing the pickles may be left in the brine in the stone jars or barrel for several months or they may be packed into fruit jars. After the pickles are cured in the brine the excess salt must be removed before they are made into

the desired finished product. Removing the salt is known as processing. If salt pickles are desired only a partial processing is required. If, however, they are to be made into sour, sweet, or mixed pickles it is necessary to remove more of the salt,

is the limit for washing time because water soaked fruits result in a disappointing frozen product. Draining fruit is a step that calls for "stepping on it". Immediately after being washed, it is spread on a tray or utility dish covered with several thicknesses of clean absorbent toweling. If possible, tray should be placed in the refrigerator for about one hour to cool and firm the fruit.

To Prevent Discoloring

Be quick about it also when peeling apples, apricots, peaches and pears, Since they all discolor rapidly once the skin is removed, this preventive measure is recommended. Peel and slice these fruits, directly into a solution of 3 tablespoons le mon juice to each gallon of cold water. Fruit should not remain in the solution more than one minute. Afterward it should be rinsed in cold water and drained. Sweetening is a matter of per-

sonal taste, of course, but generally speaking many fruits retain better flavor if sweetened before freezing. Sweetening always comes after
