Sales of electric energy have been soaring, with the demand from homes for lighting and cooling appliances giving the electric department a high 24-hour run one day this week of 25,400 kilowatts. Peak are making plans to assemble and load for the day was 1,400 Kws. J. partment, had set a goal of 24,000 Kws this summer and was greatly pleased to see the demand climb above that figure.

In the water department the city actually billed out 28,303,500 gallons of water, at the rate of nearly a Million gallons of water per day in the month from July 15 to Aug. 15. Charles Horton, the new operations superintendent of the department, said the production run through the master meter, was 31 million gallons.

THE DIFFERENCE between the production and the consumption charged out is accounted for by street work, which is requiring considerable water, fire hydrant use, and the parks, which gobble up water by the thousands of gallons.

Water needs for lawns, for shrubs and for domestic use have mounted steadily. If the city had an adequate water rate the municipality would be making real money. Cities Service Has Geophysics Crew in County

the Cities Service Oil Company began "shooting" in the area last week-end and yesterday had traversed nearly eight miles from a point four and a half miles north of Floydada beginning in the northwest corner of the Cleo Goins tract adjacent to Highway 207 and about 300 vards from the site of the J. M. Massie oil test made in 1954.

Bearing southeastward the line of "shots" at about 1.000-foot intervals crossed the Center highway two miles east of Highway 207 and bore south on a line 3 miles east of Floydada to Highway 70.

There the crew traversed for two miles parallel to Highway 70 where t turned south. Yesterday at noon the tests were being made on southward line approximately six miles southeast of Floydada.





other plants and grasses also cause their share of sneezing misery. There are some bright spots in Amarillo, and other West Texas Riverside Cemetery. towns have been "amazingly low."

From midwinter until early spring susceptible people from Dallas southward will be affected by the pollen of cedar, a profusely growng tree with a bad habit of pollinating in late autumn and winter rather than in spring.

Fall hay fever sufferers probably have the scrub elm to blame for their troubles. A late summer and autumn pollinator, the elm is common over most of the state, but is particularly profuse in the bottomlands of the Guadalupe and Trinity Rivers. The mesquite, a member of the legume family, causes "minor" allergenic trouble in West Texas during May, June, and July, Grass hay fever is possible thro-

ighout spring, summer, and fall over most of Texas, and in the winter in the Rio Grande Valley, Bermuda grass is the chief offender. Rhodes grass is a "potential" hav fever grass n the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

Ragweed pollen is almost as abundant at Dallas and Houston as in the north central states. It is a serous problem as far west as San Antonio and all along the Gulf Coast to Brownsville. In Brownsville, the ragweed season

begins in June or July. The source of the pollen has never been positively determined. Along the rest of not begin before September, a full month later than in the north-central states. Pollination continues into November all along the Gulf.

The National Convention. This week the Democrats of the nation are trying to select a candidate for president and a candidate for vice president. Texas delegates, chosen progressively at precinct, county and state conventions in May, are in the midst of it, with Speaker Sam Rayburn from Bonham the chairman of the convention and Senator Lyndon B. Johnson of Johnson City, leader of the Texas delegation, with 56 votes in his hip pocket. What their strategy will be and what kind of a candidate they can come up with is one of the intangibles at this moment. One thing that appears definite is that a lot of uncompromising-minded delegates have got to come up with a platform and candidate that all can stand for. Looks impossible to us.

Basic Ideologies Conflict. The reason the Democrats of all sections of the country will be hard to get to meet on common ground is that two points of view are in conflict within the party. Of these one, with all good intentions doubtless, is bent on a course that would move the government from the people to the capital. They are Washington minded. It surely has not occurred to them that carrying out their plan will take the government out of the hands of the people and transport it to Washington. Proponents of this movement think of themselves as the "liberals" of the party, the rest of us the conservatives. the "enemies of the people." -0-

The committee is carrying the survey even further -into the store ownership and employeesto find out what they think of themselves and each other. Self-searching is a good thing for the communities as well as individuals. Sometimes the answers to the questions asked leave an uneasy feeling, calculated to get the weaknesses strengthened and make the good better. Sooner or later it is intended to make public the results of the surveys. This will make interesting reading no doubt.

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

Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to authorize needed changes in and revision of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas; providing that this section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 43a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 45a. In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Section 48. 


