Turnip Sowing Time. Assuming we haven't waited too long to get in a lick for fall rutabagas before the August-end shower, this is to remind our readers that it is a must for this week-end to get turnip seed dusted into the ground. Pick you out a likely place in the field and sow a pound or half pound Should the shower be just a shower and not enough to bring them up you haven't lost anything but a few turnip seed. Should the rain be sufficient to make them sprout perhaps a little coolness and disturbance incident to the September solstice will take care of them and you'll go into the fall bragging about your wonderful turnips and turnip greens. Every man ought to have a turnip patch to brag about. We urge that you plant turnips Saturday morning and vote for Price Daniel Saturday afternoon. You will have than any others. done your full duty for that day.

Speaking of voting, we have to report that the board on which we ring up the returns on primary election night and majority primary election night has had only one teeny weeny sprinkle on it, not nearly enough to discourage even the white chalk marks on it. In disgust we rubbed the board clean the next day, much discouraged. And discouraged we have been until this week when we caught up with our chores and looked at the calendar. POLIO ON THE RUN (A Contributed Editorial)

The most tragic aspect of Chicago's polio outbreak is that it came at a time when the long fight against the crippling disease was almost won. The scientific genius of Dr. Jonas Salk and other researchers, coupled with the tremendous production effort of the nation's pharmaceutical manufacturers, have at long last given mankind an inexpensive, plentiful vaccine that promises to end for all time the ravages of paralytic poliomyelitis.

Whether mankind will take advantage of this golden opportunity remains to be seen. The Chicago Board of Health reports that no one who received the full three-shot series of Salk inoculations contracted paralytic polio during the outbreak. Yet at the same time, it deplored the fact that "lethargic and indifferent parents" were not! seeing to it that their children received their second and third shots of the vaccine. The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis also has expressed concern over the drop-off in inoculations. Of the 31 million American children most susceptible to polio, it reported, less than half have sought Salk protect-

The lesson to be drawn form this seems clear: the noble labors of Dr. Salk, plus the dedicated effort behind the production of over 80 million doses of vaccine by the nation's pharmaceutical houses in the last 16 months, as reported by the Health News Institute, will have gone for naught unless all those who need the vaccine's protection get it. In the Salk vaccine, mankind has a powerful weapon that may insure final victory over paralytic polio. But the weapon must be used if the battle is to be won.
