





SS Amendment **Important** For Farm Landlord

farm landlords in this area was provided in the 1956 amendments to the Social Security Act recently passed by Congress, according to John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock district office of the Social Security Administration.

"This provision effective for this year," Hutton said, "makes possible the coverage of both tenant and landlord. The landlord is now covered if he can show that he "materially participates" in the production or management of farm commodi-

Material participation means generally that a landlord furnish advice periodically and consultation as to the production of commodities.

If the landlord furnishes a substantial portion of the machinery and implements or assumes financial responsibility for the growing of the crop other than labor expense he may be able to show "material participation

New Way To Launder White Nylon



White nylon lingerie and blouses are "basic" in almost every homemaker's wardrobe today-but it has been only recently that scientists have found a way to keep white nylon garments from

getting a gray or yellow cast after repeated launderings.

Research by Dr. Elaine Weaver, of Ohio State University, has developed this three-step method for restoring the sparkling whiteness of lingeric and blouses:

First, wash the garment thoroughly in hot water and a controlled suds detergent. Let. Weaver's tests showed that even the most fragile nylon garments could be automatically laundered with this method. Next, add two tablespoons of a liquid chlorine bleach and two tablespoons of the controlled suds detergent to a gallon of water. Immerse the garment and soak for 30 minutes.

Last, rinse the garment thoroughly in warm water until the odor of the bleach is removed.

This three-step method will eliminate any dullness which has Instituted from inadequate washing, lukewarm water or poor rinsing.

If discoloration remains from dye transference (white nylon garments should always be washed separately from colored items), one additional step will remove the remaining color. Dissolve one package of commercial color remover in one gallon of hot water (160 degrees) in an enamel container. Stir the garment gently for 30 to 60 minutes at the maintained 160-degree temperature. Rinse thoroughly in hot

water until no odor of the color remover remains.

Thanks to Dr. Weaver's practical-minded research, white nylon garments may now retain their original white freshress.







During the summer months, because of the trend toward carefree easy meals, certain foods find general use. Among those foods bought by most homemakers are cold cuts and cheese, because they offer such variety and are convenient to use. To stand at the cases in the supermarket and look at the number of varieties of each of these foods is a revelation. Displays are enticing and usually we buy more

During hot weather, when most home refrigerators are stocked with both cheese and cold cuts, care must be given in storing these foods to keep optimum quality. Special care must be given the cold meats especially, as they are usually sliced and lose quality quickly if not properly wrapped and stored.

For a wrap, the transparent plastic household film is ideal. It molds itself around the cheese or meat, keeping air out and moist goodness in. For the opened packages of sliced meat, make certain that the slices are placed one on top of another compactly before wrapping with saran. Sliced cheese, too, should be handled the same way. Other advantages of using this transparent plastic film for wrapping such foods as meat and cheese are: the odor of strong cheese and

garlic in some meats will not be absorbed by other foods in the refrigerator; and due to the "see-through" quality of the wrap, there will be no difficulty in finding the type of meat or cheese that you want because each can be readily identified through the film.





The Purdue workers figured cost of harvesting the silage at \$3 a ton and added cost of drying the ears. That made a charge of \$6.25 against each ton of silage, or \$50 an acre. The way Walter Brothers and other producers figure, that's way too high.

Beeson and Perry, who cooperated with C. H. Nickel, manager of Lynnwood Farm, and D. A. Webb, its research leader, ensiled the green stover Sept. 15-22-when corn was judged at the right stage for corn silage. Ted Funk, McLean county, Illinois, feeds green stover silage to beef cows in combination with grass silage, ground cobs, and molasses. He says the mixture makes a cheap wintering ration.

A big trench silo is filled half full of grass silage in summer. Early in fall, stover silage that will settle to equal depth is stored on top of it. The silage is combed off the end of the pile with a special loader made for trench silos. Each cow gets about 30 pounds of silage daily. It's about half stover, half grass.

The silage is elevated into a mixer wagon equipped with conveyor to put it into feed bunks as the wagon is driven alongside. Enough ground cobs and molasses are blended into each load to give each animal 5 pounds of cobs and 2 pounds of
