At the same time the national cotton production was fore-cast at 13,115,000 bales.

freezing preparation of vegetables. All research, both for commercial and home freezing methods, shows during frozen storage.

Home freezers will give full satisfaction only if fresh, tender, high-quality foods, prepared and packaged by the methods found best by research, are put in them

The reason for heating vegetables before packing for freezing is that the heat slows or stops the natural process of maturing or aging. If vegetables are not heated enough, the aging continues in frozen storage. Then, the vegetables begin to develop off-flavors, toughness and poor for so that within a few weeks or months they may be unappetiz-

Blanching or preheating takes only a few minutes. For home freezing, the most satisfactory way to heat practically all vegetables is in boiling water. 

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
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

A Texas Egg Law. We welcome the suggestion from the State Commissioner of Agriculture that an attempt is to be made to get the Texas legislature to pass a sensible egg marketing law so that the poultry business can develop in orderly fashion in this state. Texas is claimed to be the dumping place for all the down-graded eggs in the southwest. Our own thoughtless poultry growers are as bad as the worst about forcing low grades on the public, buyer beware basis. The blabbermouth, with axes to grind, have kept such common sense matters from gettinging proper attention for many years. We hope the Department of Agriculture will have better luck this time.

Artificial Rain Making. In Texas artificial rain making is being studied as a possible solution of the problem of parched range lands and serious disruption of the state's agricultural economy. Whether or not this may prove of value to the state remains to be seen. Research has solved man another problem. Possibly research can solve this one. What may be needed is more financing for study of a state-wide plan and for better use of the water that is avail-

Something Else Again. In the papers we read that Texas Farm Bureau is asking an investigation of the Cotton Classing Service in this state. Seems cotton raisers in North Texas are unhappy, pointing to classing one to two grades below the grades which have been accepted in the trade for years. Cost to the farmer ranges from \$10 to \$20 per bale. Presumably this is a forecast of what is to happen on the plains when cotton begins to move. We recall how urgently we all sought the passage of the Smith Doxey Act. Under its provisions our cotton grading problems were all to be over. For two years now plains cotton grading men have been howling to no avail, and making all kinds of manuevers to get from under the domination of the Lubbock cotton classing office. Getting a government agency to take over things, it seems, does not solve all the problems. People who want to turn public education over to the federal government might ponder this.

Maize in the Fields. It may turn out this year that farmers will make some money out of their maize crops, after all. Bad luck in all parts of the southwest on the dry land crop this year has lessened the supply of the grain. Added to this is a slow period in the trucking business.
