

WHO'LL BUILD YOUR TOWN?

(A Contributed Editorial)

Reports of progress made by Texas towns on new factories, housing developments, business firms, paving projects, and industrial expansion make people of neighboring communities say, "Look what that town is doing", or "Why doesn't an industry like that come to our town?"

At the bottom of the progress and growth of a thriving town will be found the people of that town itself.

Strangers seldom invest large sums of money in small communities. Whatever progress is made in that community is made by the people who live there. It is their own money invested in their home town which furnishes factory sites, backs new farming enterprises, builds industrial buildings, streets, opens new residential areas, and constructs modern shopping centers.

Growing communities have not been touched by the good fairy with a magic wand. The people, themselves, furnish the magic by putting their faith in the future of their area and then following that faith with aggressive action, using their own money, their own land, and their own hard work.

From the consumers' viewpoint the prices of of feeds, especially cotton seed hulls, peanut hulls, sorghum bundles and the like that are available, varies without rhyme or reason. When business is dull in the feed line the roughages go down but the minute there appears to be some demand the price skyrockets before a consumer can get to the mills. Cotton seed mills, especially, will have trouble this year justifying any increase in prices for cottonseed hulls. There are few cattle left in the county and the supply of hulls is going to be mighty little shy of that of previous years. Hard up cattle owners say the price goes up immediately that mills learn of a "hay program" being opened up. The mills simply pocket the herdsmen's savings and leave them dangling on the brink as before. We bring this allegation out into the open, now that Floyd County is again "on the list." We leave it to the mills to disprove it.

These black blights, unnoticed in the ginning process, are collected among freshly gathered cotton either through use of asphalt-coated pick sacks or by carrying cotton to market over freshly tarred roads.





Social Security Amendments Are Important To All

A representative of the Lubbock Social Security Office will be in Floydada on Sept. 25 at 2:30 p. m. at the Courthouse, Room 106 and will be glad to assist in all matters pertaining to Social Security.

Congress deliberated for almost two years before making changes in the Social Security Act which became law when President Eisenhower signed the bill on August 1,

The far-reaching changes in the law will affect every American family. This article is intended to give you information that will enable you to determine the importance of the Amendments of 1956, to you and your family.

Retirement and family insurance payments will be payable beginning with November of this year to women at age 62. The benefits for workers and the wives of retired workers will be at a reduced rate before age 65. Payments to widows and the dependent mothers of deceased workers will be paid at age 62 without a reduction.

Another important change in the provides for the payment of disability insurance at age 50 to those who become unable to work Patrick of Floydada Leon Williams | because of extended sickness or accident. These payments will first be paid for July, 1957, to those over age 50, who have had extensive social security coverage.




