Follow Safety Rules at Home Christmas Tree

Speaking from his Austin office, J. O. "Jim" Musick, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association. as issued a word of caution to Texans regarding Christmas treedecorating safety.

"Accidents at Christmas time always seem so much more tragic," Musick said. "And this is especially true if the accident results in a fire that costs a family their home; maybe serious injury to one of the

Musick pointed out that most of this type of accident is easily preventable, if only a few common sense precautions are taken. As an example he listed the following eight rules which he considers "musts"

2. Place tree away from all heat-

Use non-flammable decorations. Never use candles near tree. Make sure lights, sockets and

wiring are in good condition. 6. Anchor tree, at top, with wire to prevent it from falling.
7. Turn off tree lights at bedtime

or when away from home. 8. Dispose of tree safely; never

burn in fireplace. "Remember." he concluded. "It takes less than 60 seconds for the average tree to burn up completely so make your Christmas a bright one, but with happiness - not with





VIEWS AND COMMENT

This Is Beef Week in Texas. Beef week emphasizes what every Texan is asked to do the year around-eat more beef. The economy of beef cuts, especially those often neglected but at the same time delicious portions, is coming to be realized. Cattle people have taken their whipping "like a little man," and the result can be noted at the table and on the grocery bill.

Floyd County cotton growers in their good fortune this year have about overcome the heavy blows they had from the hails of 1955. Most of them have "gotten well" and those who were not in last year's hail streaks have really been able to "go to town." A good deal of this year's crop will not go on the market until after the new year for tax reasons, but others are taking a great deal of delight in getting their disastrous debts of the former year behind them.

The road problem is moving up to the boundaries of Floyd County again, this time from the south. Since a steadfast minority blocked the fourlane road from the Hale County line to the Motley County line and the widening of 207 south from Floydada to the Crosby County line the Highway Department has not been insistent on any action by local authorities. Either the department must take the initiative soon for more right-of-way from the Crosby line to Floydada and from here east to Motley or be content with the narrow worn out pavement now existing and turn their efforts elsewhere. If the Commissioners Court is making any plans to meet the imminent problem we are not aware

Floyd County should have a booming cardinal road construction job well under way at this time, with a four-lane job completed to the Hale County from Floydada and crews shaping up for the jobs east and south. As it is nothing is being done. The opposition to the road building program last year and the year before dealt Floyd County economy a terrific blow, and didn't save any tax money by so doing.
