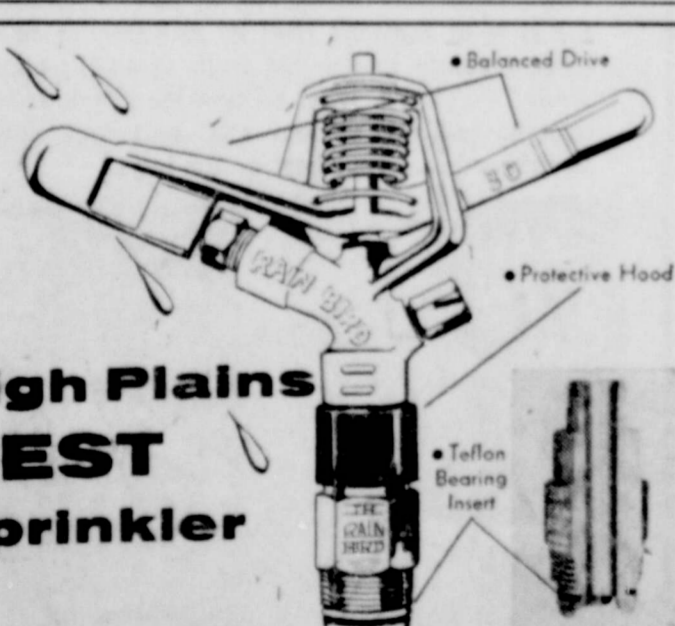

Good soup, when ever and wherever it's found, is just about the best eating there is. Yet, with modern methods of canning, freezing, and drying ready-prepared foods, this rare commodity has almost gone out of existence.

We found some, one cold night last week, in a little restaurant-tearoom place, and realized how poor most of today's substitutes are. It was three-dimensional soup, with a rich, deep flavor that comes from long simmering of good stock, herbs and vegetables.

It reminded us of those long ago days when we'd come in from school on a frosty afternoon and smell soup cooking on the kitchen range. Soup — just soup — was a frequent evening menu when we were kids, probably because it was cheap. But to us it was as tantalizing and satisfying as the most expensive foods. As an aunt who used to visit us would say, "It sticks to your bones." At twelve, we actually wept over poor Oliver Twist in Dickens's novel, whose gruel was always thin!

Although we lay no claim to cooking excellence, even our short-order kitchen can turn out a powerfully good potato soup. The recipe comes from an old cookbook, published long before short cuts became popular. We learned how to make it simply because we love the taste and can't find any ready made. But it practically takes an act of Congress to get us going on the project. The time required, even with a pressure cooker, seems endless, as do the pots and pans that clutter the kitchen before it gets to the table. So, along with most women today, we're guilty of ignoring good soup in meal-planning because we're just plain lazy.

About mousetraps we don't know, but of one thing we're sure — there-

will be a beaten path to the door of anyone who can, and will, serve good old-fashioned soup to all comers.

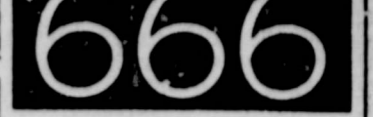

# Caused Five Deaths in Dogs Greatest Threat

Dogs continue to be an imminent danger to rabies, a State Department animal disease although the probability is one of the nation.

Commissioner Henry A. ... control action ... wild and domestic disease.

October-December report shows 71 dog rabies tested and 10 rabies, as were foxes, 16 skunks, 8 unnamed species submitted from 51 hunters to reduce fox and skunk populations, and dog wardens to keep stray dogs under check and to enforce annual vaccinations of owned pets.

Five persons — three of them children — succumbed to rabies during the whole of 1956. Rabid dogs infected the three children and one adult, all of Dallas. The fifth fatality was a State Health Department entomologist, apparently infected by a rabid bat in the course of his work.

Bats now are protected by state law, but pending legislation would change this.

Indicative of the serious import animal rabies holds for humans is the fact that the health department last year furnished 2064 boxes of rabies vaccine to exposed persons, each box containing sufficient vaccine for one complete series of 14 injections.

Foxes, skunks, and other species of wildlife are known to be the principal reservoirs of rabies in Texas, and the abundance of wild life makes the problem rank in seriousness with the situations in New York and California, department officials say.

"Since there are no natural boundaries to wildlife movements in this state, the only feasible means of breaking the chain of infection is through the work of professional hunters permanently employed by the various counties," Dr. Hollis said.

Tom Green County farmers and ranchers are vaccinating large animals, indicating an awareness of widespread fox rabies in the western section. And Jeff Davis County is poised to take emergency action against the disease, under authority of the state rabies control law.

Upton, Cameron, Hidalgo, Presidio, Brewster, Schleicher, Kinney, Starr, and Dallas Counties have staged similar emergency programs in recent months.

# Newly Covered Self-Employed Making Reports

Virtually all self-employed people are now covered by social security except doctors of medicine, according to John G. Hutton, Manager of the Lubbock social security office.

With the passage of the 1956 Amendment to the Social Security Act, the Nation's social security system will now protect practically every self-employed person affected by this change.

Self-employed lawyers, dentists, osteopaths, chiropractors, veterinarians, naturopaths and optometrists are now building old age and survivors insurance protection for themselves and their families. Net earnings for 1956, if they are as much as \$400, will count toward social security insurance.

Floyd County Hesperian, Floydada Texas, Thursday, February 7, 1957

The law requires self-employed persons in these groups to report their earnings up to a total of \$4200 a year for taxable years ending after 1955. In most cases, first reports will be filed with 1956 income tax returns early in 1957. This applies whether the work is in individual practice or in a partnership.

Mr. Hutton said that lawyers make up the largest number of newly covered self-employed professionals. He pointed out that social security is not new to lawyers. Many are already familiar with the insurance provisions of social security, and have had occasion to observe and study it in connection with the affairs of clients. Also, some lawyers and other professional people already have social security credits earned in military service in World War II, or while working for wages.

The 1956 Amendments also cover additional farm operators, landlords who substantially assist in or manage production of a crop or livestock on land farmed by renters or sharecroppers must report their farm income for social security if they had a net profit of \$400 or more in 1956.

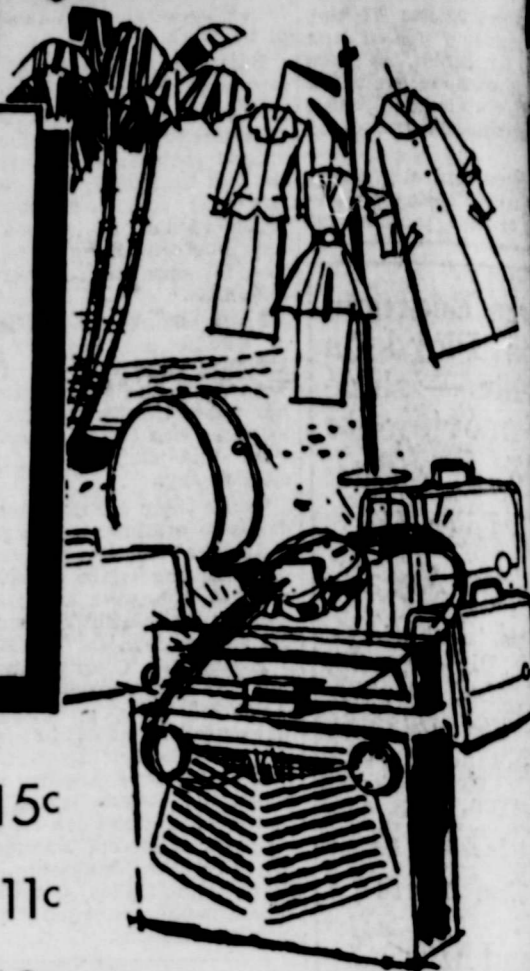
