At Floydada rain gauges registered from 68-hundredths to 85-hundredths. Other reports vary from 7-tenths to 1.05 inches over the county. But there was no indication ate vesterday that the storm period is due to bring this county the soaking rainfall so badly needed.

First appreciable fall came Sunday night as a giant umbrella of rain clouds covered south and southwest Texas to pour out the greatest February rain those areas had had in 30 years. The big rains moved up to within 150 miles of the high plains, and the overcast with some moisture spilled over into this area. Drizzle, fog and overcast have continued throughout the four days since, but despite Weather Bureau predictions the additional rains that would mean a good season have failed to develop

If the usual pattern is followed Lockney at 9:30 tomorrow (Frida,) the rain clouds should clear within 24 or 36 hours and sunshine prevail. It would be worth a million dollars in irrigation money saved if the usual pattern is not followed and big rains should fall.

> Dry land farmers, who devoutly hope for more rain at this time are joined by irrigation farmers, many of whom have deep-plowed ground which needs five inches of rain fall. The rainfall in portions of west and southwest has been the most generous of many years, especially for the month of February. Edwards Plateau, the Davis Mountains and a wide stretch of country lying north of these areas and west

> of the Brazos River, got big rains. Likewise the Big Bend and the Rio Grande Valley had rains which

Ample rain has been falling east of the Brazos for several weeks since the beginning of the new year.

The rains which fell throughout the Abilene and the San Angelo farm and range country have had marked effect on the level of the waters of the Brazos water shed. # Adopt A "Shop Early' Policy On Inspections

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, prevailed upon Texas automobile owners to "do their shopping early" this year in an effort to reduce the last minute rush for inspection stickers at the close of the 1957 motor vehicle inspection period. The deadline is April 15.

On information received from George W. Busby, chief of the department's Motor Vehicle Inspection Division, the state police director said only one-third of the state's four million vehicle owners have obtained their 1957 inspection stickers to date. He urged motorists to have their cars and trucks inspected now as a means of saving time for themselves and to avoid a last minute congestion at inspection stations throughout Texas.

Last year, as was true in most preceeding years, vehicles overcrowded inspection stations during th last week of the inspection period. More than a million automobiles were caught in the last minute rush, resulting in a loss of even more millions of manhours for the owners of those vehicles.
