





Most Potent Tranquilizer. The best treatment for raw nerves of Floyd County people is a good rain. Nothing like a season at planting time to make a farm operator easy to get along with. A good rain also helps that sick at the stomach feeling when you're down at the bank.

Residents of Floydada are discovering this week where some of the deep ditches were dug in the terrain to accomodate the water and sewer lines three years ago. There was not enough moisture in the ground to make these ditches apparent then, but there is now. The boys with the wreckers ought to get several calls.

Rest For Wells. They say the best treatment for an irrigation well is a good rest. For recharging purposes perhaps good rains further west would have been better. They may come yet. But the re-charge at the surface lakes has been tremendous in the past five days since the rains. Note how the lakes were a lot bigger on Sunday than only two days later Evaporation has had little chance to get in its work. The underground sands are getting a free re-charge.

What About Wheat? A surprisingly large number of Floyd County people are wondering if the wheat that came through in January and February is going to make a late crop. Stranger things have happened. It often happens that there are no hot winds in June and this may be one of those years. Some used rotary hoes in March to kill weeds, others are using or will use poison spray before cotton comes up to be endangered by the synthetic compound that grows weeds to death.

We should know where all the frogs came from after the big rains but we don't However, we had rather just wonder than to have anything scientific on the matter, if anyone in the know contemplates a letter to the editor. After five years you'd think all the frogs had dried up and shrunk to nothingness. But within two hours after Saturday's big rain fell the surface lakes were full of the croakers singing away, a million to every lake, judging from the noise.


