Bumper Row Crop Result of Rains

The bountiful rains and occasional showers that have visited the Friona country during the past three weeks, have been of almost inestimable benefit to the farmers and their growing crops.

Much of the row crop of the territory was in a fair way to mature, owing to the long continued drought and excessively hot weather, but the rains are giving them another lease on life, and with warm weather continuing for some three weeks longer, it appears that practically all of these crops will mature.

Farmers were also handicapped on account of the drought, owing to the fact that there had not been moisture to sprout and bring up the volunteer wheat which always follows a season when there has been hail. Following the rains, though this volunteer has come up unusually thick on the ground and farmers have the opportunity of destroying it to have it out of the way of planting the next crop. Many farmers are already busy both night and day seeding their wheat land, for which the soil is in prime condition.

Large acreages of sudan are already in the shock and some early plantings of other forage and grain crops that escaped the heavy rains of early spring, re also in the shock.

That's the "secret" part. The stalks must be tapped just right: hard enough to knock off the grain, but not hard enough to bruise the stalks and thus kill next year's crop. Even though there is a reputed scarcity of fruits such as apples, peaches, pears and grapes, Friona has been pretty well suplied with these varieties of fruits ever since the season set in.

A truck load of grapes sold on the streets here last week at \$5.00 per bushel and seemed to find a ready sale. Peachessome of them not too nicehave sold readily at \$4.50 to \$5.00 per bushel from trucks, and are being retailed-just as fine as those that were sold from the trucks - at \$4.50 and \$5.00 a bushel.

Apparently most of peaches are being bought by farmers and not much said about the price. This may be attributed to the fact that most of the farmers had a large wheat crop and got a good price for it and thus have lots of money, so that they can buy high-priced fruits and other commodities and will scarcely notice these prices. 



News of the Deaf Smith County Wind Erosion District

More farmers are practicing contour farming this year than ever before in the history of Deaf Smith County. Approximately 100 farmers cooperating with the Deaf Smith County Wind Erosion District are engaged in some type of contour

Since the maximum benefits from this practice are realized over a period of years, maintenance of contour lines is an important factor. After the lines are established care should be marked every year before starting to plow

The most satisfactory thod of marking is with oneway plow, by plowing on opposite sides of the original contour guide line and throwing the dirt to the center. A small ridge or terrace will be formed which can be followed

Operation of the Deaf Smith County Wind Erosion District heavy equipment for leveling terraces, hummocks and fence row drifts will be started this week for farmers requesting assistance in this type of work.

The district supervisors have secured operators for this equipment and plan to keep the machinery working at a rapid pace in order that service may be rendered as many farmers as







Since the maximum benefits from this practice are realized over a period of years, maintenance of contour lines is an important factor. After the ines are established care should be marked every year before starting to plow.

The most satisfactory thod of marking is with oneway plow, by plowing on pposite sides of the original contour guide line and throwing the dirt to the center. A small ridge or terrace will be formed which can be followed

Operation of the Deaf Smith County Wind Erosion District heavy equipment for leveling terraces, hummocks and fence row drifts will be started this week for farmers requesting assistance in this type of work.

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
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

More Consumer Goods Under Price Control

Coverage of the price regulation for used consumer durable goods has been broadened to include a large number of additional items, the Price Division of the District OPA has anmounced.

All sales either by retail sel-lers or by householders selling equipment bought for sale or rental purposes are covered by the regulation. Dealers must display a poster listing selling prices somewhere in their place of business.

Articles included in this amendment include items listed as equipment and supplies, housewares, hand tools and hardware, household appliances. wheel goods, personal and household accessories, canoes and small boats, athletic equipment and sporting goods (except apparel), optical goods, radios (except automobile radios sold as part of an automobile), toys and games, industrial safety equipment and health supplies.

Backing the Attack! Protein Feed to be Rationed Again as Stocks Still Limited

The protein feed shortage, a severe handicap to ranchers and stockmen in this territory last winter, will continue into the 1944-45 winter feeding season and a rationing system on protein meal purchases went into effect on Sept. 1, according to an announcement made this Smiley Burnette, Judith Allen week at the Deaf Smith County AAA office.

In order to assure equitable RITA HAYWORTH and supplies, buyers must now obtain certificates of need from their county AAA committee before purchasing protein meal from any processor in Oklahoma, Texas or New Mexico. Under an order issued by the War Fod Administration on Aug. 7, processors are required to secure certificates of need from each person, including feeders, who buys more than 500 pounds of protein meal within any 30day period. The certificate is presented prior to or at the time of purchase.

Within a 30 day period, total purchases of 500 pounds or less can be made by any buyer without a certificate.

According to the local AAA office, this order assures that protein meal will be fairly distributed and at the same time the order should be effective in keeping down any black market in protein meal supplies.


