

# Burglars Take Guns, Jewelry in \$3,000 Raid

## Grocery Store Also Pilfered

Burglars broke into three Floydada retail stores Sunday night, looted \$600 worth of merchandise from one, \$2,500 from another, and did minor damage to the safe in the third.

Glass in the door of a fourth store was broken but the burglars left the scene without making an entry.

Victims of the crime were White Auto Store, where W. E. Garrett counted missing guns, knives and other small items worth \$600 wholesale.

Bradford Jewelry, where the loss in watches and rings was \$2,500 or more.

And Wester & Son Grocery, where desk and cash register were rifled but nothing taken, apparently. Damage was done to the locked panel door of the safe on the combination had been left open.

Hull & McBrien Grocery was the fourth store where there was a break in. A. T. Hull said the burglars did not come inside the store there.

All three of the stores where the burglars operated have back entrances concealed or partially concealed from the street.

Sheriff W. D. Hollums said he thought at least two persons were involved in the successive crimes. He did not make a guess on the time when the burglaries were perpetrated.

The break in at Westers was the first to be discovered. There the proprietor and L. T. Hickerson found the safe panel door jammed. Tools found in the store including a butcher's cleaver had been used on the panel. Most anybody could have gone on into the safe, Mr. Wester said.

Hickerson went up the alley to White's to get a screw driver and file to undo the jammed door. He walked into the open back door. None of Garrett's force were there and he realized that he was in another burglarized place of business. He called Garrett and the sheriff.

The sheriff had just come in off of an all-night hunt for a thief who had taken a car from its parking place on west side.

Entry into the White Auto Store was made through a small window but the loot had been carried out at the back door which the burglars opened. Garrett said they evidently knew what they could dispose of after they passed up considerably more valuable small items than the guns and the knives.

Bradford's loss included some quite valuable watches and some good rings. They were taken from his show counters. No fixtures were molested apparently. The burglars did not attempt to open his storage vault, so far as could be told.

City officer Horace Cage and the Sheriff's department have been working together on the case. On Friday night the sheriff ran into a piece of good luck while out on the trail of a pick-up thief. Jesus Garcia, 18, admitted to a double pick-up theft the same night. First he took a machine belonging to Junior Simpson left at the onion shed. It ran out of gas on North Main, convenient to the King Tractor & Motor lot where he took a second pick-up.

He was started to a dance at Hale Center, Sheriff Hollums quoted him as saying. But on the way he was given a ticket by patrolmen for driving without a license. He told them the pick-up was his father's and he was driving with his permission.

The boy got scared after he got to Plainview and decided to bring the pick-up back. A passer-by saw him abandon the machine there and got in touch with Sheriff Hollums.

## School Board Budgets Outlay Of \$440,000 For Year, 1957-58

Budget of Floydada Independent School District for the year of 1957-1958, adopted last week by the Board of Education, puts the estimated total cost of operation of the schools from September 1 to August 31, at \$440,105.

Of this amount the biggest single item will be instructional costs which are put at \$256,501.

Administration expense, including salaries, secretarial and clerical aid, is estimated at \$18,064. Other school services including expense of health service personnel, salaries of transportation personnel, supplies, maintenance, operation expense and replacement, transportation insurance, food service, will run \$52,732.

Operational costs of the school plant including salaries of custodians, fuel, water, light, power, telephone, are estimated at \$30,200. Total maintenance of the plant costs are expected to be \$9,000, property insurance \$6,500.

For improvements, furniture and equipment and transportation equipment the school board expects the outlay to be \$18,600.

For debt service, including redemption of bonds, redemption of time warrants and interest on serial bonds the outlay in the year will be \$49,608.

Income to meet the expenses of the school is due to come: From federal funds for school lunches \$6,000;

From state funds, including per capita apportionment, foundation fund salary and operation, foundation fund transportation and vocational education, \$223,257.

From county funds \$2,907. From local funds, including taxes \$128,000.

Figures compiled by the board indicate the body expects to have on hand August 31 \$1,244 in the local fund, \$36,593.92 in the interest and sinking funds, \$13,751.53 in the building fund.

The school district will begin the school year on September 1 with a bonded debt of \$859,500, and outstanding warrants of \$8,112, for a total of \$860,311.20.

No taxpayers or other citizens showed up at the budget hearing, Mrs. Lorin Leibfried, school secretary, said.

The district is required to file a copy of their budget with the county clerk and a copy with the State Board of Education.

# Smith, Battey, Fortenberry, Irwin, Hale, on Weed Board

The matter of the selection of directors had been studied and discussed by the commissioners for some time, but the actual choice of the board's personnel took only a few minutes of the court's time Monday.

Provisions of the Texas weed control law, adopted by vote are patterned in large part after a Kansas statute.

The new board is autonomous and is authorized to assess and collect 3 cents per acre on farm land for administrative purposes and is designed to prevent spread of noxious weeds.

The board will be exploring a new field in local government. None of its members were available for comment yesterday.

In other action the Commissioners Court went through the formalities of a public hearing on the county budget, and the budget as made up, almost a facsimile of the 1957 budget, was adopted.

Also the bid of Plains Machinery Company for the sale to the county of a new heavy duty motor grader was accepted. Their bid was the lowest of four opened by the court Monday of last week. The price set was \$13,390 plus one used Caterpillar. The new machine is known as a Gallon Model 118 Heavy Duty Motor Grader. John B. Fowler, Commissioner of Precinct One, still put the new machine into service.

Disposition to get early action on the paved gap in the Farm to Market Highway to Quitaque was indicated by the court. W. C. Plumlee, Commissioner of Precinct No. 3, and Judge J. D. McBrien, spent an afternoon at Quitaque looking into the business of getting easements on the proposed route. Orin Stark of Quitaque promised the judge and commissioner prompt beginning on acquiring the right-of-way, Judge McBrien said.

Members of the Commissioners Court and a volunteer delegation of Floyd County citizens spent two hours or so in conference with Highway Commissioner Marshall Formby in the afternoon, when the knotty problem of highway construction in Floyd County was talked over. Besides the members of the court there were present at the conference James H. Word, Mitchell Parrish, O. M. Watson Sr., and O. M. Watson Jr., of Floydada, Claude Holley, J. R. Belt Jr., and Edgar Hays of Lockney.

Consideration was given to a new proposal from the State Highway Department for cardinal road construction in this county. The new proposal in brief is:

Construction of a four-lane highway Floydada to the Hale County line.

Construction of a four-lane facility Floydada to F. M. 579, and high type two lane facility from that to the Crosby County line.

The court was advised by Mr. Formby that Highways 62 and 70 east from Floydada does not have program status at this time but when it is programmed it will be added to the event. Tentative committees announced by Mitchell Parrish, president of the Chamber of Commerce include program, John Stapleton; Tour, Frank Sherman; and Guy Ginn chairman of the agriculture committee and agriculture industry committee; seating, Mrs. Dorris Jones, chairman of the civic improvements committee; cantaloupe feast and clean up, Parnell Powell and Dan Haggood, chairman of the industry committee and retail trade committee.

Mayor Jim Willison Jr., will formally welcome visitors in the city for the event.

### Thousands Buy Right to Fish

The great outdoors fever has hit Texas along with the rest of the nation. This will be the biggest year in all history for those who like to be outdoorsy water. Fishermen and boat owners will vie for top billing in the use of the scores of fine man-made lakes in Texas in 1937. Since most of the boat owners are fishermen and most of the fishing is done in boats, there's a happy combination. In the first place, Texas is blessed with many good lakes, and literally thousands of small lakes, built within recent years. The rivers that used to run out of banks after hard rains now have dams that hold back this flood water. Almost every section of Texas has a new dam, with the exception of the Panhandle, and one is proposed across the Canadian near Berger, north of Amarillo. Even West Texas has been getting lakes, such as the J. B. Thomas Lake on the upper reaches of the Colorado, near Snyder. Then there is the Colorado City Lake on Morgan Creek. At San Angelo another dam has been thrown across the North Concho. Sweetwater has a new lake on Oak Creek. In addition to three old lakes in the Abilene vicinity, a new lake has been built near Haskell. Wichita Falls has its Chickpea Creek and Kemp Lakes, and on down the Red River in the vicinity of Gainesville, Sherman and Denison there is the Texoma, a fabulous body of fishing water. Lake Dallas is still there, with Garza-Little Elm, and Laron, all close to Dallas. Near Fort Worth is Grapevine, Eagle Mountain, Bridgeport, Lake Worth and Benbrook. Further into Central Texas are Lake Whitney, which lies on the Brazos below Pecos Kingdom. Near Belton is the new Belton Lake, which right now is a fine fishing spot. Numerous other smaller private and industrial lakes also have been built in this area, with many more proposed. In East Texas there are many fine lakes, such as Cherokee Lone Star, Tyler, a new lake near Texarkana, Koon Creek and scores of others. This is not forgetting Caddo, near Marshall, which is one of the best fishing spots in the United States. The Sabine, the Neches and the Red River also furnish good fishing, with many smaller dams on their tributaries. Near Jasper, Dam B on the Neches backs up water for many miles in very picturesque country for both fishing and boating. The city of Houston also has completed another lake for its water supply, which will furnish a wonderful spot, in addition to all kinds of boating. There also are a number

### Speed, Beauty Built Into '57 Boats, Motors

More boats and motors will be sold in Texas this year than ever before, in the opinion of manufacturers. The same is true of trailers. Most of the motors will be for fishing boats, but running a close second will be de luxe boats, with fast motors, steering wheels and six-ton facilities. Manufacturers also have gone to colors. This year's models represent all colors of the spectrum, and many of these are combinations. Many fishermen in the past have used 12-foot boats, with three and five hp. motors. Within the past few years they have stretched the boats to 14 feet, with motors from 7 1/2 to 15 hp. Today they are looking for 16 to 18 foot boats, capable of carrying two motors in excess of 25 hp each. With limited facilities on the lakes and streams for leaving boats where they are used, owners are having to turn to trailers. ## SAYS CALIFORNIA MAYOR, Canning and Processing Plants Would Swell Floydada Payrolls

A Californian, who believes that Floyd County has unlimited possibilities in the development of a vegetable and berry industry, is in Floydada this week.

He is R. A. Coverdale, mayor of Beaumont, a thriving little city about the size of Floydada, whose town has developed into a food processing center on the edge of the desert.

He says what we may be overlooking now are canning and processing plants that would bring stable jobs for many during the spring and summer months.

"Beaumont has a canning plant that operates about five months in the year, beginning in the spring with asparagus, then corn, followed by fruits and then the winter vegetables. It employs about 100 people and they are as busy as they can be for the period of the season," Mr. Coverdale said. "They have a storage plant and every thing that goes with handling the crops they process."

In addition Beaumont boasts a processing plant that handles cantaloupes and honey dew melons. This plant employs about 90 people during the season. They wrap and freeze their products and ship them to all parts of the country," Mr. Coverdale reports.

"With all this water and fertile land you have this section is bound to be a natural for vegetable and produce operations," Coverdale said. Elected mayor of his city three successive times, Mr. Coverdale has no fear of his official action hurting his personal business, such as the fear that often dogs an official in a small city. "What I do in California is not going to hurt my farming operations in Texas," he pointed out.

Mr. Coverdale is one of the children of R. A. Coverdale, the Coffeyville, Kansas, rancher and cattle feeder, who joined N. A. Armstrong in Floyd County, Texas, cattle operations nearly 50 years ago.

The Coverdale family still have cattle and ranching interests in Kansas and Oklahoma, managed by a brother of R. A.

Mr. Coverdale was a career school administrator until he severed his relations with the Beaumont schools a few years ago. He has been visiting Floyd County for a number of years since his father's death. R. C. Bullock has been operating the farms here for several years. Irrigation on the farms was introduced four or five years ago.

Palm Springs, the fabulous resort colony on the desert is or was in the same school district with Beaumont. "My family and I used to spend an occasional week vacationing on the site, never dreaming of the fabulous price the desert land would some time bring," Mr. Coverdale said. "This land could have been bought for \$2 an acre. In fact I think two sections that now has a fabulous value once sold for taxes while it was valued at about \$2."

And while he was on the matter of taxes Mr. Coverdale pointed out that canning and processing plants brought with them more values and added materially to tax values in a community.

He plans to have a more leisurely visit here this year than formerly. In prior years he has cut trips to Texas short to hurry back home to an ailing wife. Mrs. Coverdale succumbed in December, friends of the family have learned. The surviving spouse is having to learn a new routine of life, and is going more deeply into business and official affairs to keep himself busy and interested in the things around him.

## Wheat Reserve Acreage Offer Opens August 26

Despite the fact that Floyd County farm land has a good season under it and that signs point to favorable conditions at wheat seeding time, Thos. J. Hutchins, secretary of the Floyd County ACO committee, thinks there will be considerable wheat acreage signed up in the reserve for 1938.

"The rental rate has been increased somewhat on wheat reserve land and a farmer who wants to put the same land back into the Soil Bank also gets an additional 10 per cent. This makes the proposition more attractive in a good year case. Several farm operators have already been in to talk the matter over," Mr. Hutchins said this week.

Sign up period for 1938 wheat land opens on Monday and the last day is October 4.

The Acreage Reserve is an "annual" program. Payments are earned by taking out of production for one year, a specified number of acres from the farm wheat allotment. An important provision favoring the wheat grower is that the farm does not lose "production history" in the move.

By legislative action the payments to any individual for 1938 acreage reserve is limited to \$3,000.

## Crape Myrtles In Full Flower

Crape Myrtles are being noticed and remarked about around town. They catch a person's eye with their array of blossoms. Some are heavy blossomed and from three to four feet high.

Some of the bushes got a late start, while others took to root fast and have kept growing. The good rains have contributed to their progress.

Floydada Chamber of Commerce reported approximately 1200 bushes were sold to well-to-do here in the city and 300 more to the rural areas.

Very little if any insect trouble is being noticed on the plants here in town, but some are infesting those in the farming areas.

Some ladies now enjoying lovely bouquets of the crape myrtle, seem to think that it will eventually be a Floydada flower to grace any festivity or yard.

Mrs. A. E. Prizzell, of 528 West Virginia, set out 19 bushes in the spring of 1965 and all are up at least three and one-half feet in height. Mrs. Prizzell plans to transplant several of the crape myrtles to her back yard in the fall.

Mrs. Everett Miller of Harmony community, said she lost two of her bushes, but felt it was due to her negligence. However the ones she has are around 24 inches in height and in full blossom. She reported they are having lots of bug and grasshopper trouble.

The crape myrtles at the County Court House are believed to be the tallest in Floydada. The bushes stand from seven to eight feet tall at their highest point.







## USDA Names 31 Wheat Varieties As Undesirable

College Station, August—Because of their inferior milling or baking qualities, 31 wheat varieties have been listed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture as undesirable. They will be discounted 20 cents a bushel in price support rates on the 1958 wheat crop.

According to Extension Agronomist R. J. Hodges, several varieties of hard red winter wheats, the type most commonly grown in Texas, are on the list. They are Blue Jacket, Chief, Early Blackhull, Kan-king, Redchief and Red Jacket. Others listed are soft red winter, hard red spring, drum and white wheat varieties. Local county agents, adds Hodges, have a complete list of the undesirable varieties.

The designated varieties were found to be undesirable for commercial food use. The discount was adopted three years ago in the support operation to discourage the planting of undesirable wheat varieties and lessen the possibility of U. S. wheat of inferior quality getting into domestic and export channels. Representatives of crop improvement associations have strongly urged the action to help improve the quality of the nation's wheat crop.

The price-support regulations for 1958 will provide for producer certification regarding the undesirable varieties. Because these varieties are difficult to determine from three samples of wheat, it will be the producer's responsibility, based on his knowledge of varieties seeded and harvested, to identify the variety going under the price support program.

Hodges points out that some of the undesirable varieties might have protein content high enough for a premium but no protein premiums will apply in determining loan rates. The agronomist suggests a visit with the local county agent for information on the best variety for the area.

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### VIEWS AND COMMENT

**The New Egg Law.** Rigid requirements and penalties under the new Texas Egg Law, which becomes effective on August 22, are coming in for much study in the produce trade this month. Grocery dealers, egg candlers, truckers and producers all are in on the study. The new law cannot be put into operation at once. It may be weeks, even months, before it becomes effective. How nearly it will come to being what the public wanted and needed is yet to be learned. People oppose change — we all do — and a Texas Egg Law which clamps rigid control over eggs that are offered for human consumption certainly will be a big change from the buyer beware plan that has been followed from time immemorial in our state. Texans who have migrated to western states have jumped right in and helped make many new kinds of laws, including egg marketing laws, that have presumably been beneficial. But we that have stayed in the state buck up mightily against anything that would change the ways from those that grandfather practiced.

**Use Garbage Containers.** Small matters become big ones. A few pieces of trash scattered over the streets become piles of trash if all contribute to it. Now that we have a town full of migrants some of whom haven't had training in cleanliness it might be well for the rest of us to set a good example, as well as talk a good example, in keeping public streets and sidewalks clean. Paper cups, gum wrappers, hot dog napkins, paper bags and whatnot thoughtlessly pitched out Saturday afternoon and Sunday are terrible looking Monday before the street cleaner gets around.

**Growing Blackeye Peas.** A surprising number of families around over Floyd County are growing a few acres or a few square feet of blackeye peas as a lift to their mid-summer income, between planting and harvesting time for their usual cash crops. The fact is so many are doing it that a processing plant might be a good investment in Floydada. The blackeyes and other edible cowpeas are now going to plants at a distance, but even at that the farm family is finding it practical and worth while to grow more than they need for home consumption and let the processors have them.

**Potatoes and Onions.** Potatoes and onions have been a drug on the local market since the wholesale market went to pieces. Two or three lessons can be learned from this experience. One of these, somebody will make a lot of money—not necessarily unfair at all—off of storage of both onions and potatoes in the next 100 days. Another is that it is not the production of vegetables on the plains, it is

the marketing, that will have to be worried about. (As a sidelight a grocer said this past week the grocery stores in Floydada hadn't sold enough of either potatoes or onions to know they are grocery items. Onions have gone begging at a dollar a 50-pound sack and potatoes by the thousands of pounds have been fed to cattle and hogs.) Note the processor has made his usual profit and the worker his wage.

**About Watering Cotton.** The national debt, the multiplying troubles around the world, infiltration of the Reds into Syria, civil rights problem, are important, of course. But they are far away. The problem of whether to water or not to water cotton is right on the farm with the cotton man and he has been worrying and watering during August. More are at it still than not. Public officials having to do with agricultural matters, oil mill people and the like, have been arguing against the practice in this year's cotton crop. The dry land man is saved this worry that his irrigated farmer neighbor is having. The latter's cotton stalk is loaded to the top—more cotton than he can possibly mature without more water. Last year it paid to water even into mid-September. On the other hand, should it begin to rain in late August like it sometimes does and he goes into the edge of October with his cotton full of sap his cotton sample will be poor, he knows. So it is "dogged if you do, dogged if you don't." As a result the cotton grower works on the theory that doing something is better than doing nothing. So he waters. It will take October to tell him whether he made a mistake or did not.

**Crape Myrtle Town.** Nobody todate has found anything wrong with crape myrtle for lawn borders and public grounds hereabouts. Looks as though the civic-minded persons who suggested their possibilities locally hit the jackpot. Crape myrtles blossom in the heat of mid-summer, they stay pretty a long, long time. See them all around in Floydada. Your own grounds might be beautified a bit by a touch of them here and there. They might even take the place of a border plant, with which you could be disgusted.

**The Circus Rose.** Peculiar thing about the circus rose, trial plantings of which were made two years ago. Some have had great success with them. Other gardeners are disappointed. One thing appears to be certain. Roses must get different treatment in the kind of soil we have than they get in some gardens. This may be the key to general rose success in Floyd County.

### Heart Ailment Claims Claude Tatum, Lubbock

Claude Tatum, 72, a former resident of Floyd County, died Friday morning, August 16, at his home in Lubbock. He had been ill with a coronary heart ailment for two years.

The exact time of his death was not known. His wife discovered him dead in bed about 5:30 a. m., and a physician said indications were that he had died shortly after midnight. Funeral rites were read in the Broadway Church of Christ, at Lubbock, with John T. Smith, director of the Lubbock Children's Home, and Horace Coffman, music minister of the Broadway church officiating. Burial was in the City of Lubbock Cemetery under the direction of Sanders Funeral Home.

Mr. Tatum and his family moved to Lubbock in 1925, where he founded Economy Mills, since operated by himself and his sons. Since he had been in Lubbock he had added to his farming interests and owned several business rental properties there. He was a member of the Downtown Kiwanis club.

Previously Mr. Tatum had lived in Floyd County in 1918. He had extensive farming interests. From here, the family moved to McKinney. Born in San Antonio, Mr. Tatum married the late Mrs. Julia Newman in Collin county in 1905. She preceded him in death at Lubbock in 1944. In 1946, he was married to Mrs. Leola Welch, then of Floydada. Mrs. Welch was owner of Miladies



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

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
