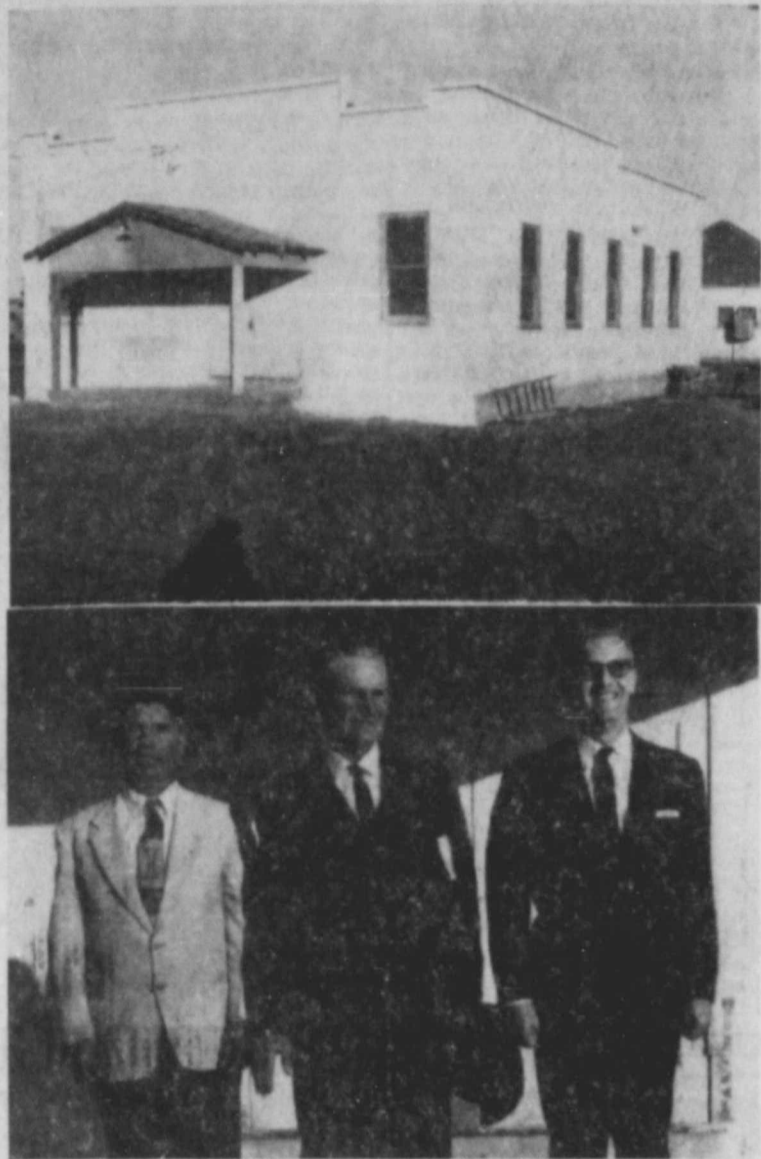

## Holidays Shortened On School Calendar

Last days of school in Floydada, three in all, are to be made up from time formerly allotted to holiday seasons, Superintendent I. T. Graves announced this week. Parents of children in the schools will be interested because it may require a change in some of their plans at Christmas, on New Years Day and at Easter as well. Christmas, Schools will dismiss for Christmas holidays on December 20 as planned, but school work will be resumed on Monday, December 30 and 31. New Years Day, Only one day will be observed as a holiday on New Years day. This will be Wednesday, School will resume work on Thursday and Friday for that week-end. Easter holiday, Easter comes on April 6 next spring. One day will be allowed for this holiday and this will be on the Monday (April 7) immediately following Easter Sunday, Mr. Graves said. The schools lost one day due to stormy weather in November and two days last week Thursday and Friday, following the tragic accident which took the life of Garland C. Foster, high school faculty member.

## HUGE JOB P O Braces For Big Christmas Mail, Parcels

"The time has passed to talk about mailing early for Christmas," Postmaster Wester said yesterday, but he added that "our local patrons still can help avoid a last-minute pile-up of Christmas mail by sending the rest of their packages and cards now." The Postmaster said he expects to keep local mail moving without serious difficulty, but explained that many large transportation terminals and large post office terminals will be swamped with mail that will exceed their physical capacity in the last days before Christmas. To avoid any such congestion, he urged that all out-of-town mail be placed in the post office this week-end so that it will be assured of delivery next week -- the last week before Christmas. In order to meet local service needs, Postmaster Wester said the stamp and parcel post windows would stay open as late as practicable. The present window hours are 8:30 am to 5:00 pm on week days and 8:30 to 12:00 on Saturdays. Wester said the arrival of packages are increasing daily. It will be the policy of the Floydada Office to deliver all packages the day they arrive, before 6:00 pm. He stated, Special consideration will be given to merchants and to resident patrons, who have a letter from the sender stating the package has been mailed 15 days, provided the order is turned in by 9:00 a. m. so the clerk may catch the package as the sack is being emptied. "Otherwise," he stated, "a Special Delivery Fee must be charged according to regulations, up to 20c. 2-10 lbs. -- 35c; 10-50 lbs. -- 70c. The cooperation so far has been excellent, and I believe that when the rush is over our community will have done its part to prevent mail-handling problems that usually plague the Postal Service at Christmas time," the postmaster said.

## Drillers Swabbing Howard Number 1

Baker-Taylor Drilling Company has a lot more testing to do before they give up on Amarillo Oil Company Howard No. 1 on Section 23, Block GM north of Cedar. The Hesperian was told yesterday, but results to date have not been encouraging. The packer for the swab is stuck 1800 feet high off the formation but this is considered somewhat immaterial. The swab is bringing up some water. This could be because of a faulty cement job. However, should the swab get a flood of water it will be the signal for abandonment, it was said. The formation under test is at the base of the Pennsylvanian below 8800 feet. Whether the well will be acidized and sand fractured is yet to be determined, following further tests. "All indications point to the probability that we have a dry hole," a company representative said.

## Science Teacher Is J. D. Rainer

Supt. I. T. Graves this week announced that the successor to Garland C. Foster as teacher of science subjects in Floydada High School is J. D. Rainer, who comes to Floydada from Shepherd Field, Wichita Falls. Rainer was teacher of science for seven years at Holliday. He resigned his place there to go to work in the class room at Shepherd Field. Recently a part of the field there was closed down and Rainer was one member of the teaching force whose place was declared vacant by the Air Force. Rainer began work in the schools here yesterday.

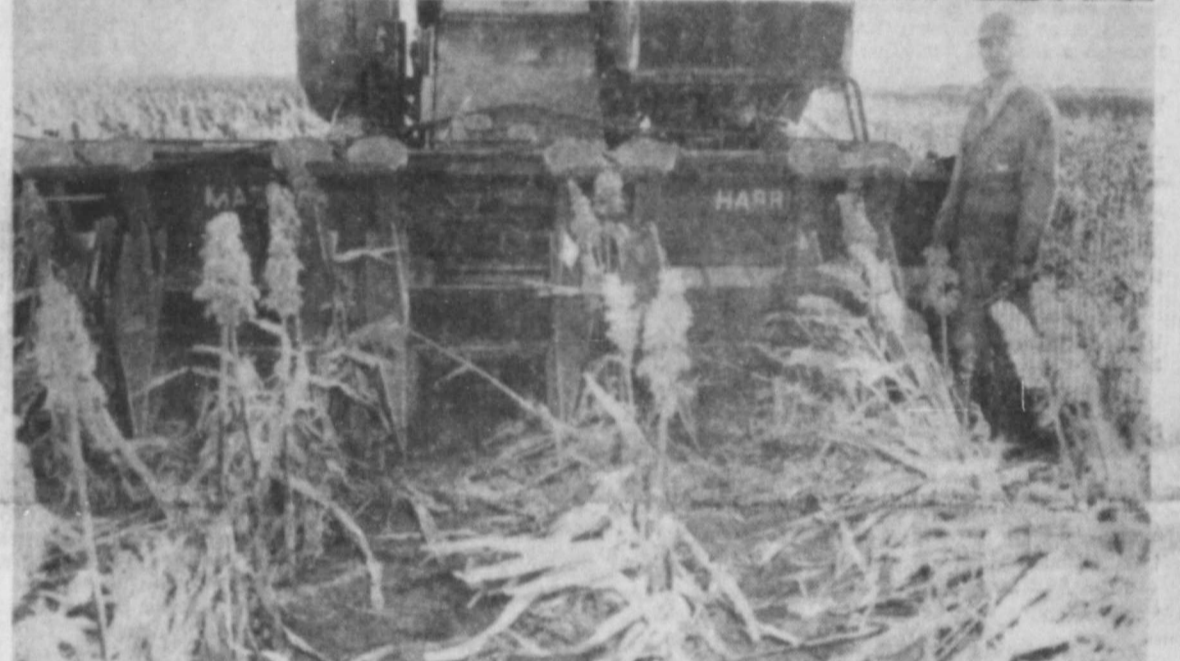
## LIONS CLUB TO ENTERTAIN CUB SCOUTS AND BOY SCOUTS

# Lashing North Winds Whip Up Stubborn Fires At Gins

## Firemen Spend Hectic Tuesday

Strong, whipping north winds plagued ginners again on Tuesday of this week, following a previous fire alert Saturday night, when high winds struck about 6 o'clock, causing considerable damage to trailers and the loss of cotton and bagging. Davis Gin in East Floydada and the Lakeview Gin have been hardest hit, both with fire on Saturday night and again on Tuesday. Volunteer fire fighters in the Lakeview area met at the gin when winds started and were prepared for the fire on Tuesday. Floydada fire department's equipment was at the Davis Gin fighting fire there.



The Harvest Story this fall and some of its problems are reflected in the top picture by this track mounted combine operated by Bill Colston who is pictured with his machine. Colston borrowed an idea from south Texas Rice farmers mounting a tractor track on a self-propelled combine. He cut his grain while the ground was still sloppy and has continued to cut out with the rig which handles well on muddy or soft ground. There are still plenty of boggy spots in fields.

Heston Type Pick-up (below) attachments have been in very short supply this fall as farmers looked for a way to save fallen grain. Here Lee Burton has stopped to tighten belts on his rig as he cuts grain in the Fairview community. This patch of dry land maize cut 2400 pounds per acre after many of the stalks were blown down by high winds. ## Farmers Attack Vexing Harvest Problems With Ingenious Devices To Salvage Crops

Harvest this fall has been a problem and it has brought many new wrinkles to the local farming scene. Maize growers seemingly took the lead in their efforts to save the crop's big grain crop. Faced with fields too soft and muddy to enter with their machines and with the crop blowing down farmers were coming up with all sorts of ideas during the past weeks. Bill Colston at Dougherty had his combine rigged with tracks which gave him crawling power to get in his muddy field. Colston used the idea of south Texas rice growers who mount these on their tractors. Outfitting his self-propelled machine Colston mounted a bracing framework and an idler wheel some four feet to the rear of the big drive wheel on the machine. The steel tracks were placed over the two wheels giving him nearly four feet of grip and supporting area 20 inches wide on the soft ground. Colston got going in his field when it was still sloppy and had harvested his crop before the ground was even close to dry. Since that time he has been cutting out for neighbors. Gene Hopper at South Plains got about the same result with over size airplane tires. These giant balloon tires standing some 56 inches carry a low eight pounds of pressure. Under load they spread out and give some 22 inches of traction the width of the tire. Mud chains were put on over the tires on the first days of operation to give extra push. Many machines in the area had dual tires mounted in the rear to help carry the load and keep these small wheels from sticking. Machines without these added aids were delayed a few days in getting going, but many of these were running early in the mornings on frozen ground until they found footing to hold them up in the day.

Following his official welcome, Santa made his appearance south of the court house in the old Penney building where he visited with the girls and boys the rest of the afternoon, and joined in with them at the "Fun Fair". Olin Watson was Master of ceremonies during the affair. The party house was filled with games to play, soft drinks and plenty to eat, sponsored by the Parent-Teacher Association of Andrews Ward, the Floyd County Home Demonstration Club and the Sand Hill Home Demonstration Club. Mrs. W. R. Daniel, PTA president, was in charge of games. The Floyd County Home Demonstration Club had their annual club bazaar. Displays included baked goods, canned goods, items of clothing and homemade gifts for sale. The Sand Hill Demonstration Club prepared hot dogs, hamburgers, cakes, pies and drinks. As A Farm Woman Thinks

(By Nelle Witt Spikes) A Prairie Indian Summer When summer ends on prairies in the fall the winds are soft; with their caress the whispered promise of new fallen snow.

Friday, December 6, was spent at the home economics department of the Plainview High school giving candy demonstrations for the different classes.

Mrs. Lee Rushing was hostess for her Study Club on Thursday last week at a candy demonstration in the Lighthouse Kitchen.

Mrs. Homer Steen called our attention recently to a recipe for bread that appeared in one of our daily papers. It is most delicious. Here it is if you would like to try it for the holidays.

Holiday Confetti Bread 2 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour. 4 teaspoons baking powder 3/4 teaspoon salt 3/4 cup chopped Brazil nuts 1 1/2 cups mixed diced candied fruits 1/3 cup raisins 1/2 cup shortening 3/4 cup sugar 3 eggs 1/2 cup mashed banana 1/2 cup orange juice

Mix and sift flour, baking powder and salt. Stir in chopped nuts, candied fruits and raisins. Cream shortening and add sugar; beat until light and fluffy. Add eggs one at a time, beating after each addition. Combine mashed banana and orange juice; add to creamed mixture alternately with flour mixture, beginning and ending with dry ingredients. Turn into waxed paper-lined and greased 9 inch-x-5 inch-x-3 inch loaf pan.

Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) 1 hour. Let bread cool in pan half an hour before turning out on cake rack.

We appreciate Mrs. Steen telling us about this bread. It certainly is handy to have around during this busy season of the year. It is delicious "as is", or it may be spread with butter - or butter and jam. It may be toasted and served golden-brown and hot - or it may be sliced thin and made into dainty sandwiches.

It also freezes nicely - so it is no problem to have a few loaves on hand and ready for any occasion.

"I want some two-watt bulbs." "For what?" "No, two." "Two what?" "Yes." "Try the drug store!"

Fruitcake Pointers - that might be of help at this time: Cook fruitcakes in pans, then turn out. If baked in foilware pans or pans that are part of a gift, leave as is, and wrap gaily - when thoroughly cooled.

Store fruit cakes in aluminum foil moisture-vapour-proof cellophane, saran wrapping, or an airtight container. Keep in a cool place. Keep fruitcakes at least a week before eating - flavors will blend and they will become mellow and good.

Be sure to Chill Before Slicing. They will not crumble and it is easier to get thinner and more perfect slices.

Make fruit cakes ahead of the time you plan to use them. They will be at their best and you'll avoid the holiday rush.

Fruit cake freezes nicely - will keep indefinitely if frozen.

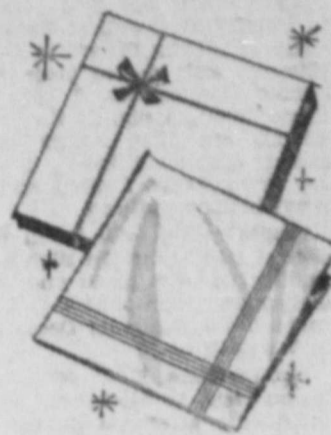

# Student Victims of Explosion Rapidly Recovering, Is Report

The two members of the science class of Floydada High School most seriously injured in the explosion of last Wednesday, were reported this week to be in satisfactory condition in Methodist Hospital in Lubbock.

All the others injured and admitted to hospitals for treatment have returned home and most of them are back in their classes.

There were 13 members in the class at the time the experimental rocket exploded.

Keith Hollums, 17, a senior and son of Mr. and Mrs. T. C. Hollums, received serious injuries from the blast that killed the science teacher, Garland Foster. Keith was administered first aid at Peoples Hospital, and taken by Harmon ambulance to Lubbock Methodist where he received surgery for a torn tongue, a leg injury, neck injury and the loss of six upper teeth. Keith received six transfusions due to the loss of blood when a big vein was cut by flying steel.

Walter Hollums, Floydada sheriff and uncle of the injured boy, said Tuesday that Keith was steadily improving and that the family had hopes of transferring him to a closer hospital soon.

Jerry Crawford, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Russell Crawford, also received surgery at the Methodist hospital, after first aid at Peoples. His injuries consisted of lacerations on side of head and face and a torn ear. Jerry was able to visit with Keith on Sunday, friends said.

Others receiving injuries included:

Genetia Price, 16, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Price, only girl in the class, cuts and lacerations, steel removed from leg. Released from Peoples Friday.

Those reported at the experiment, but not injured, included Weldon Kirk, Dennis Whitfill, Kenneth Barker and Gary Hukabay.

All members of the class suffered temporary deafness from the explosion.

The rocket, made by the class, was also being made by classes in various other schools in other states. This was the first one, however, to explode, it was said.

Made of powdered sugar ground from granulated sugar, mixed with sulphur and potassium chlorate, the mixture was packed in a 3-quarter inch pipe, capped at both ends, with a hole in one end for the fuse. The rocket was then mounted onto a roller skate with a weighing device to register the amount of pull.

The experiment took place in the archway at the north side of the school building. Pieces of steel flew everywhere, students said. One window on an upper tier was broken, I. T. Graves, superintendent said.

It was reported Tuesday that most of the students were back in school, with the exception of those with leg injuries.

time. Maize which was blown over presented another problem, and no one found a way to save anything like all of it. However, many have been doing a good job in getting a big part of this down crop. Heston type pick-ups seem to be the most popular, but have been in short supply. These row binder type noses are put on the front of the machine instead of the conventional reel.

With these belt driven pullers many of the leaning stalks are lifted and guided over the sickle and the grain saved.

Pick-up fingers have been another method used to slide under the down stalks and lift them up where they can be cut. All of these have met with some success and have been a big help. Stalks which fell directly away from direction of travel seemed to be almost impossible to save according to most reports.

Moisture content of grain continues to be high, and most of what has come in to the elevators will have to go through dryers before it can go into storage.

The dryer at Producers Elevator in Floydada arrived last week and has been process of assembly since that time. Manager Roe Jones says it will be operated around the clock to dry grain that has been coming in too wet. Most elevator men feel the grain will not damage during cold weather, but must be dried before being placed in permanent storage or before it starts to get warm.

What the county's loss to wind and weather amounted to may never be known, but from the mountains of grain piling up at elevators the harvest would have been a record one and may still be.

### VIEWS AND COMMENT

**Still Feeling Pinch.** Although the constitutional amendment was passed on favorably by the people of the state to give old age needy a boost of \$2 per month (and that is a positive move that will help to that extent, plus whatever it adds from the federal government) the aged will still feel the pinch of the high cost of living. Texans are reminded that this state is below the average nationally in old age benefits. As more and more people reach the retirement age with social security cards the number of persons on the old age list will be reduced. The people should take seriously the matter of another raise—another \$15 or so. Milk and bread and a little meat, plus something for the inevitable medicine bill, surely is not too much.

**Only The Professionals.** You have to be in the business for a livelihood, not just an in and out to make money trading in stocks on the exchanges. The last few weeks have made this fact stand out like a sore thumb for amateurs who thought they knew when and what to do speculating in stocks. The shake-down has been rather thorough. They bet stocks up, they went down, bet them down, they went up. Peculiar fact, so the financial writers tell us, is that when the general public, which means the odd lots buyer and the amateur who thinks he has it figured out, gets into the market in volume either on the short or the long side, the men inside the exchanges take it as a signal to get on the sidelines. It has not failed yet as a sure prediction. The amateur is always wrong. This is spoken of as having been fleeced. True, probably, but he fleeced himself.

**Stocks and bonds** get a black eye as investments for the average little man when heavy fluctuations take place in the stock market. This is not to say that the brokers and stock market players who do it for a livelihood are not sharp. They are. But it is to say that buying good, substantial stocks in reasonable amounts, is good practice for the little man. But just like buying land, stocks and bonds can be bought too high. Own them at a figure that their reasonably expected dividends will give a fair return on the investment and one does not have to worry about whether the market goes high or low—until he wants to buy again. All stocks of any value have a "history" that can be checked to see when they are high and when too low. Like land or cattle. And there is this advantage. When and if you have to cash out there is a market of some sort, a cash market.

"A Citizen" has written the newspaper in civic vein, particularly bemoaning street conditions, lack of drainage and street markers, also indicating unhappiness over the manner in which garbage disposal is handled. We do not see anything wrong with the article, since it seems to be written in constructive vein. Except for one thing. It is not signed. We can't use articles, the source of which is unknown.

### CAPITAL NEWS

**Pleas Mounting For Release Of Bascom Giles**

(By Vern Sanford Texas Press Association)

AUSTIN—Pleas for Bascom Giles' release are mounting. Latest activity is a petition signed by 103 Austin citizens, filed with the State Board of Pardons and Paroles. Earle Ed Burkhalter, member of the Travis County Parole Board for the past five years, submitted the request.

Burkhalter said that he is hopeful that Giles can be home for Christmas.

Giles is serving a 6-year sentence in Huntsville, for his part in the veterans land scandal. He was eligible for parole last April. However, the Pardons Board contended that his release "would not meet with community acceptance." Burkhalter's petition is the result of that statement.

Burkhalter said that he knew Giles only casually and had not consulted any of Giles' friends or relatives when he started the petition. He did say, however, that he felt that Giles' wife and family were being punished beyond the intent of the law.

"Mr. Giles has taken his medicine without purging the generally accepted course of taking advantage of all the technicalities of the law," Burkhalter commented. "He made restitution in civil proceedings of all the money that was asked of him by the state's Attorney General."

In commenting on the petition for release, Rogan Giles, son of the former Land Commissioner, stated that the petition "confirms reports we have been receiving from all over the state, that Dad should be treated just like anyone else and be paroled."

Three of the nine members of the corrections board, the policy-making group for the prison system, recently said that Giles should be paroled. They praised his spotless prison record and termed him an "excellent risk" to society. One member, Lewis Nordyke of Amarillo, described Giles as a "political prisoner."

Giles entered the Huntsville prison on Jan. 10, 1956. As a trusty he earns double time. Therefore, without parole, he will be discharged Jan. 21, 1959. Also he has made several blood donations, each of which entitles him to a 30-day commutation.

In view of these earnings Giles already has completed the three-year sentence given him in his jury trial. The balance of his time is the result of a guilty plea that followed the jury trial.

Prison officials state that he has been a model prisoner.

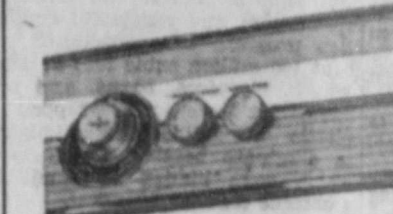

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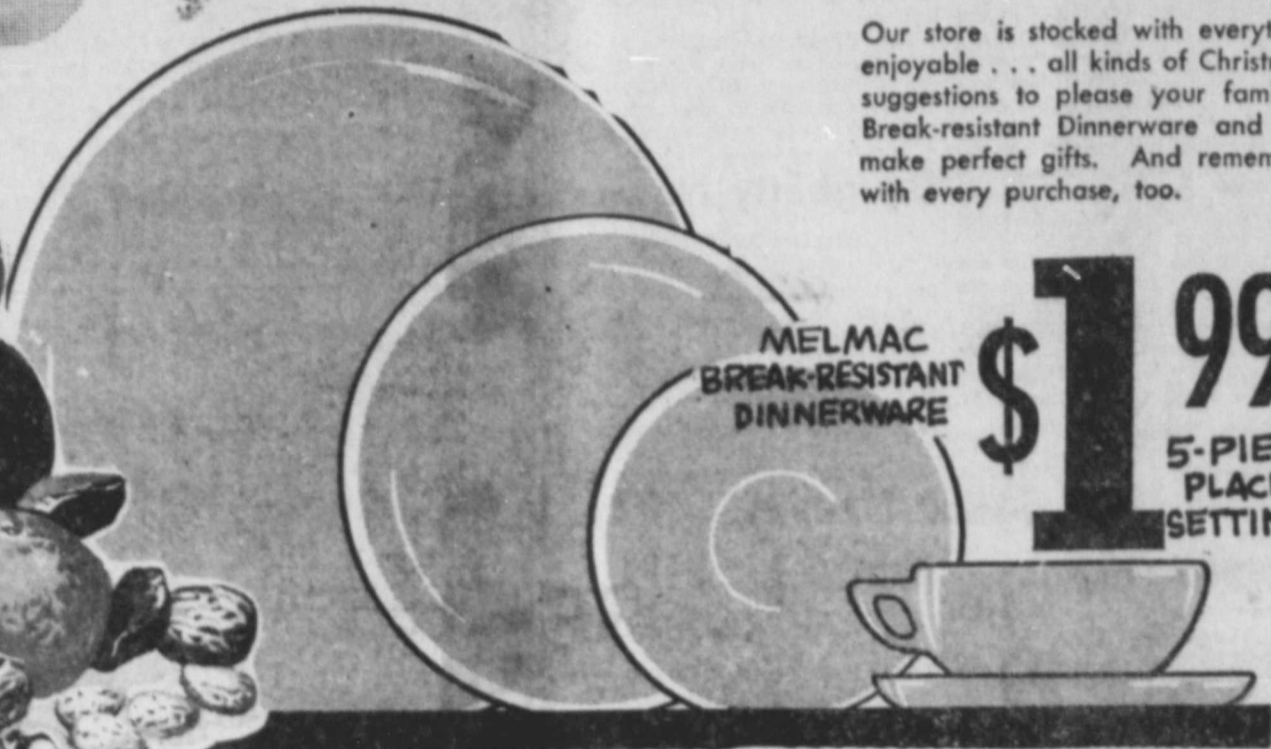
