

Shurbet Named to Six-Man State Water Board

To Administer Giant Revolving Fund of State

Marvin Shurbet, southwest Floyd County farmer, has been named to the six-man Texas Water Development Board.

Announcement of the names of the six men who will administer the giant \$200 million dollar revolving fund voted by the citizens of Texas in November was made Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock by Governor Price Daniel.

The board is expected to be organized and set to work at an early date, possibly before the end of the year.

Other members of the board appointed by the governor are: Marvin Nichols of Fort Worth; Bill Taylor of Longview; Jim Sartwell of Houston; Sy Mills of Mission; W. E. Tinsley of Austin.

Shurbet is a native of Floyd County and a life-long farmer. He operates a highly developed irrigation farm near Almon in the southwest part of the county. He has been interested, also, in industry allied to the farming business. His farming has been on a widely diversified basis.

The appointment of a plains man, who is underground water conscious, was highly gratifying to supporters of the plains country. Tom McFarland, manager of Hills Plains Underground Water District No. 1, Monday afternoon told the Hesperian he thought the governor had made a good selection in his choice of the Floyd County man.

"Mr. Shurbet is a native of the water district an alert president for the year since he was elevated to the presidency of the district and we are convinced he will be equally alert as a member of the state water board," McFarland said.

Shurbet has been a strong supporter of the water district for several years. He served as county commissioner in the early days of the water district's history. One of his more recent achievements has been proving that re-charging underground water sands from surface lakes is feasible and profitable.

Appointees will draw for two, four and six-year terms.

Continuing a cotton harvest, picking up grain that is down in the fields or putting wheat land into condition for sowing. The problem varies from farm to farm.

A good many cotton raisers are through with their harvest, but a good many are not. A few fields have had no cotton harvested yet, the operators leaving the staple in the field to dry. Practically all the cotton is being handled mechanically.

The situation is in contrast with last year's operations which were completed and over with well before Christmas day.

Dry land farmers are having their first abundant harvest in four years. Numerous dry land farms are producing nearly a bale of cotton per acre and grain in proportion.

Gins this week still had a lot of cotton on their yards and are operating around the clock.

However, their crews are to have some respite on Christmas Day. The gins for the most part are planning to close down for 12 hours, 7 a. m. Christmas morning to 7 p. m. Christmas night. Exception will be at the Farmers Coop Gin where the plant will close down at 7 o'clock Wednesday night and resume operations the morning of December 26, making two nights and a day to be closed down.

An unusual procedure is noted in many grain sorghum fields. Farm operators are going back through the crop either manually or with machines and picking up the grain that went down during the rains.

Some crews are making good wages gathering the crop on a percentage basis.

Accordingly, although the heavy rains could not be more than 18 inches, Fire Chief Fred Lambert and volunteer Floyd Sue were made sick by smoke, dust and exhaustion. Neither was hospitalized and both were soon restored.

The high winds caught several farmers enroute to the gins with cotton and numerous trailers were blown over. Late in the afternoon when the wind subsided numerous trailers were on the road side where they had dumped their loads when the winds hit.

A Business Friend Speaks: The benediction of the eternal stars is invoked on our marvelous land by a business friend in a Yuletide greeting which impresses us greatly. Little given to reading preachments, we were much taken by this Christmas message sent with a souvenir: "Recall the spirit of the grizzled old-timers to cheer you up at this season. These vigorous men lived in an atmosphere of ever-present danger, but never in a state of confusion. Their history proves that courage is the hand-maiden of character, and that both are sustained by spiritual faith. The rejuvenation of these qualities will draw the problems of this violent age into focus, re-establish values in perspective and restore confidence and composure to life now dominated by the psychology of crisis. In this broad land the infinitude of space bespeaks the majesty of Almighty God. Troubled men traditionally turn their eyes to the stars, confident that those celestial bodies faithfully whirling in their orbits were not set in place by puny hands. The spiritual faith born beneath their lights along the Sea of Galilee dispels the frightful air of crisis with confidence that these heavenly lights will still be shining when the satellites of fear and evil all have passed away."

We Think So, Too. Judge W. H. Atwell, federal judge of the Northern District of Texas thinks "Segregation is neither immoral nor unconstitutional. Segregation is, in fact, common sense."

Evetts Haley's Suit. If it does nothing else the suit of Evetts Haley Jr. against the U. S. Department of Agriculture will bring to light the status of a man on the farm who votes for nothing, signs for nothing, takes nothing, has no part in quotas, allotments, "practices" and whatnot. Haley, who is the son of Texas' historian and outspoken (to put it mildly) candidate for governor grew about 40 acres of wheat on an Oklahoma farm on which he had no allotment for wheat (or anything else). The wheat he raised he fed up on his farm and did not offer in the channels of trade. Question is, could he do that? The county committee said he couldn't and the government backed them up. They have Haley "penalized" \$506 or some such figure.

How far can the government go toward invading a man's domain in a "program" or in any other civil matter is one of the things Haley wants to know in the suit he is defending. He is not going to pay the \$506 until he has to do so, and in fact, may be broke by the time he gets through hiring lawyers, paying for depositions, plane fare and the like, so that the government could have only

a judgment against him for the trouble. Haley wants to know who gave the committee or anybody permission to come on his place and measure up his land and if they had a right to do so. He says he is going to have a court tell him what he has to do before he does it. Among other things he has interrupted Secretary Benson's busy schedule with a 60-question deposition. A federal district court judge said Mr. Benson would have to answer the depositions in the court's district but it turned out they couldn't make him come to Oklahoma. But he did have to answer the questions at his office in the national capital.

Our feeling is that the farm belt would have been "busted out" completely in the hard years that made up the late thirties. New faces would have been substituted on most all the farms and new names on mail boxes, had it not been for the "programs" that have come along, one right after another. So, to us, it was a matter of emergency and something positive had to be done. (It may turn out in the long run that there'll still be new names on the mail boxes. Plenty of forecasters claim as much.) All this to the contrary notwithstanding we'd like to know if it is the actual fact that a man couldn't raise what he wanted to raise and consume it on the farm.

Cash Will Talk. It is one of the possibilities that the people who have withstood the temptation to go all out in buying things they have wanted so badly because they wanted their cash to do more talking, will have their inning in 1958. A lot of manufacturers of many things that people want are going to have their inventories entirely too high and be ready to make a "deal" of some kind to unload. There comes a time when cash is in scarce supply the same as with other things. Most everybody in business any length of time recalls when \$750 would buy anything almost that a seller could give title to.

When is a house fly not a house fly? It is when he becomes a guinea pig! And that is just what scientists are making of the household pest in an attempt to discover a new treatment for tumors.

The fly is becoming an important test organism for the rapid screening of tumor-inhibiting compounds. This new testing method quickly eliminates non-effective compounds and narrows the search for effective "cancer killing" elements.

An attractive sidelight in the research is that several of the tested compounds act as inhibitors of ovarian growth in female houseflies. This may mean the eventual discovery of an inexpensive chemical that would cause sterility in certain insects. The end result would be an effective insect control.

A federal entomologist, Norman Millin, recently reported his findings in this project at a meeting in Memphis, Tennessee. He said that results of tests with tumor inhibiting compounds can be obtained in as little as three days.

House flies complete a life cycle in slightly more than 2 weeks. They are physiologically similar in many ways to higher animals, as well as to other insects. With minimum space and effort, thousands of flies can be reared by non-pro-

fessional workers, at low cost, for laboratory use. Only 30 to 40 flies are needed for a single test. Mice and rats, normally used in screening tumor inhibiting materials, require months of effort in breeding new strains and in rearing the animals to maturity.

Using flies as the medium, Mr. Millin has tested 26 compounds of which 13 gave positive results. Among them were several compounds provided by the Cancer Chemotherapy National Service Center of the National Institutes of Health, Bethesda, Maryland.

In actual use, the house flies are separated according to sex upon emergence from the pupal stage. The segregated females are fed milk containing the material to be tested. After 3 days the flies are dissected and their ovaries are removed. Underdevelopment of the ovaries indicates that the test material provides inhibiting action on tumors.

**1958 Farmers
Tax Guide Now
Off The Press**

COLLEGE STATION —Farm and ranch families needing information on income and social security taxes are reminded by Extension Farm Management Specialist C. H. Bates that the 1958 Farmers' Tax Guide is now available. Copies may be obtained from county extension agents.

Bates says the 64-page reference publication is not materially changed from last year's popular edition. The booklet is provided by the Internal Revenue Service and is written in easy to understand language with many income and social security tax items covered in detail. Also, a number of sample tax forms are shown for the guidance of those seeking first hand information or "know-how."

Farm records are emphasized as a need for accurate tax reporting, points out Bates. Families desiring assistance with business or living records are advised to contact their local county extension agents for information on record training sessions planned for some counties.

Farmers and ranchmen who keep a close watch on their business operations often find that they can do a much better tax management job when records are kept, says the specialist. The new tax guide will also assist by pointing out helpful tax rights and options.

Because the supply of the Tax Guide may not be sufficient to enable every family to have a copy, Bates suggests that the copy be shared with a neighbor.

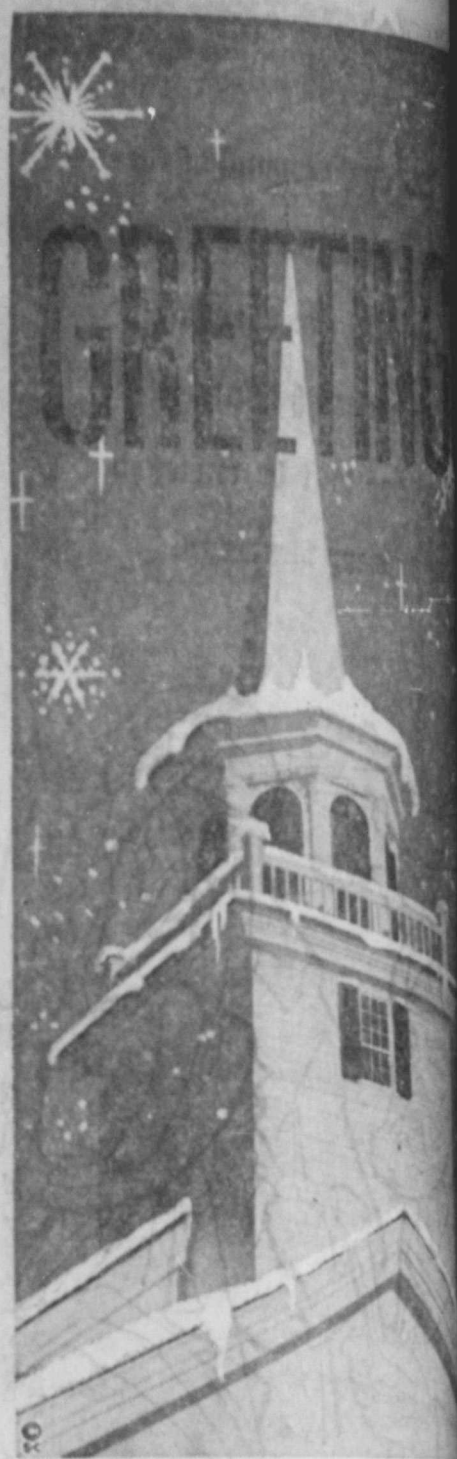

OUTDOORS

-- In Texas

There is an old saying about winter fishing separating the men and the boys. The men stay home by the fire and the boys go out.

Well, that isn't exactly true anymore. Many Texans have learned that some of the finest fishing is had during the cold months.

Also there is a new kind of fishing. Men work at fishing nowadays. They don't just set out trot lines or a few cane poles and let the fish do the work.

Today they get in fast boats and whip out across the fine lakes of Texas. They've learned new tricks for making fish hit the bait. Also they have learned how to find these fish.

For instance, right now there is wonderful white bass fishing. They are caught trolling and with minnows, still fishing. Most of the fun, however is in following the gulls to

find these fish.

Follow the Gulls
This is an old trick on the coast. Fishermen down there for years have followed the gulls, especially in finding trout schools. Now they are doing the same thing on Texas lakes.

It is necessary to have a rugged boat and a motor with enough power to put you there in a hurry. The custom is to work around the lake until you find a flock of gulls. Watch them and you'll find a place where you can load the boat down with these sandies.

As a rule one gull flies low over the water. When the white bass start chasing shad and the shad surface, the fun begins.

Other gulls nearby watch this searcher and when they see it has found the shad, they all join in and swoop down on the water.

That's the time you want to drop anchor and start jigging. Some call it jigging and others have still other names for it. Anyway, the process is simple with a good spoon like the Dixie Jet, or the Abu spinner, you want a light action rod, capable of responding to the lightest action on the part of the fish.

Using Spinning Reels

Perhaps spinning equipment is best for this purpose. I personally use a Mitchell reel, with a 6 1/2 foot Mitchell spinning rod, with a 6 pound monofilament line. One of my fishing buddies uses one of those new free-spooling Ambassadeur reels, also produced by Garcia.

We drop our lures to the bottom, reel them back a turn or two and then start a tantalizing vibration of the rod, by raising and lowering the tip slightly, mostly with wrist movement. Sandies strike on the down movement of the lure. For that reason if your upward movement is too quick or severe you'll probably lose your fish.

With a little practice you can tell very easily when the fish has taken the lure. He'll telegraph you when he's ready and then you have a nice fight on your hands with this light equipment.

We mentioned the above equipment so that you will have some idea of tackle most suitable for this type of fishing. This same tackle also is very good for sand bass fishing in fast water, such as you'll find below our dams in Texas.

While some of this fishing also is done with spoons, this is a fine place for free minnow fishing. Use a bubble some 18 inches above your hook, with enough waterweight to carry it out.

Of course many fishermen sit on the banks with cane poles and use worms or drag spoons through the swift running water. Some of these catch fine strings of the whites or sandies.

Texas has a limit of 25 on sand bass. Oklahoma doesn't consider it a game fish and has revoked the limit. Still the fishermen are not able to catch them all.

Every large impoundment in Texas now has sand bass. They are lots of fun to catch.

Fishing for Blacks

Of course black bass also can be caught this time of the year. The process is not the same. While there are some plug casters who have just about as much luck in the winter, with top water plugs, as they do in the summer, generally the big ones dive deep and hit hard.

On Lake Texoma a few Sundays ago we watched two fishermen work around the Willow Springs Camp on the Oklahoma side. They used nothing but top water lures and caught a big string of blacks. Most of them were around a pound and a half, but some went as much as two pounds.

Some other Texoma fishermen have found they can use heavy salt water equipment, with Hellbenders or similar lures. These lures run real deep. With the heavy equip-

ment the fisherman can jerk them loose from brush in the bottom of the lakes. They don't catch too many small fish, but occasionally they come up with some big lunkers.

A new lure also has been made by the Hellbender people. It is called a stinger.

It looks like a long worm, with hooks in it. This usually is strung behind a Hellbender or similar plug, and not worked too fast. Cast it toward the shore and pull it out close to the bottom.

Here is a word of caution, however. A bass will take hold of the tail end of this lure and slowly suck it back into his big mouth. Don't jerk too quick. Be sure he's swallowed it.

This artificial worm is a wonderful lure for either summer or winter fishing, if worked right. But it takes practice.

Yes sir, winter is a good month to go fishing. See you at the dam.

YOUR COUNTY AGENT

We of the County Agent's office would like to express a Merry Christmas and a happy new year to each of you.

The handling of sorghum residue always presents some problems. The Experiment station at Lubbock has worked out a plan at the present that shows some definite advantages.

The stalks are shredded as soon after harvest as possible to permit faster decay and prevent planting trouble. This is followed by chiseling. The stubble is left on top of the ground along with the clods to prevent wind erosion. The land is left in this shape until preplanting irrigation time and then listed.

After the preplanting irrigation the fertilizer is chisled in the sides of the land. The rate usually used for cotton following grain sorghum is 60 to 80 pounds of Nitrogen and 40 to 60 pounds of Phosphorus.

The reason for placing the fertilizer in the soil after the preplanting watering you get 2 to 3 weeks of stubble decomposition and your fertilizer to start the crop off in a healthy condition.

The earlier application of Nitrogen can cause some problems. The breakdown of stubble provides definite protection to the soil in preventing wind erosion. The stubble provides definite protection to the soil in preventing wind erosion. The possibility of leaching the nitrogen out of the root zone by the preplanting irrigation can mean a loss of this element.

A ton of stubble residue will need 20 to 30 pounds of nitrogen to decompose the stalks. The normal stalk crops are around 2 to 2 1/2 tons per acre. The amount of nitrogen needed for decomposing these stalks would be 60 to 75 pounds of nitrogen.

Cotton following grain sorghum residue in 1957 produced as follows:

Tons of Residue	Lint, acre
0	655
2	672
4	624

Forty pounds of nitrogen added to 4 tons of residue produced 711 pounds of lint per acre, compared with 624 pounds of lint per acre.

The application of the nitrogen was placed after the preplanting irrigation.
