

# Engineers Start Survey on 1958 Road Program

## Work Laid Out in Wide Areas Of The County

Improvement of Floyd County Highways and Farm to Market roads will be big news to county residents for the next two years. Already on the planning boards are 68.05 miles of road building and paving which will represent an expenditure of well over a million and a half dollars.

Now busy on this gigantic task is the crew of Senior Resident Engineer Sam Fowler. Working with him are Lou Newell, senior party chief; Sam Spence, senior inspector; Glenn White, junior inspector; L. W. Castleberry, Bill Walker, and M. L. Lancaster, rodmen. Much field and draftboard work has already been done on the projects now in sight, and much more is still to come. The local crew will probably get assistance in the near future from some of the near-by districts in order to keep well ahead of construction schedules. Early in the order of business will be the paving of the remaining gap of FM 1065 through Fairmont in northeast Floyd County. Here 3.85 miles of construction will connect up the Cedar Hill - Plomot road with pavement extending south from Quitaque and give residents in that area a long needed all-weather outlet to the plains.

Engineering on this project has been completed and contract letting is expected soon. Two small pieces of right of way are still to be secured, but no hitch is expected. This job should be completed and ready for travel before fall. FM 651 through Lakeview is also up for major overhaul. The field party of the local office is now running center and right-of-way lines on this project. Plans do not call for any additional right-of-way, but there will be some major improvements.

The 7.3 miles from Lakeview north to highway 70 are to be rebuilt with new base and topping and be widened from 16 to 20 feet. Two lake dumps are also to be raised before the paving is complete. South of Lakeview 3.1 miles to the county line will get a new seal coat. Engineering field work on this job is expected to be completed within two weeks and this project should be completed, contract and all, before the end of the summer months.

Two projects in northwest Floyd County that are also due for completion this year are an extension north on the end of FM 2301 at Providence to the county line. Here four miles of pavement will connect with projects in Swisher, Briscoe and Hale Counties to give residents of this rich farming community an outlet to the north and west.

Just south of the junction of FM 2301 and the Fort Worth and Denver railroad tracks between Providence and Aiken there will be another paving job of 2.7 miles in Floyd County which will connect with a Hale County project extending eastward from the Plainsview-Lockney highway. Engineering on these two jobs is being handled through the Plainsview office because of the heavy load here.

The resident engineer said early this week he did not know the exact date on completion on these two jobs but felt sure they were to be constructed before the year is over.

Highways 76 and 62 are the big jobs. On these much is yet to be done. The engineering field party started some two weeks before the holidays and have run some of the lines northwest of Floydada toward Lockney and the Hale County line.

## Weather Man Starts New Year With a Big Snow

A snow that brought ample moisture to Floyd County's rich farmlands and ranges fell throughout the county beginning Saturday afternoon, continuing through Saturday night and well up into Sunday.

The snowstorm was not a storm at that. It fell gently and without appreciable wind. It left an estimated 85-hundredths of an inch of moisture at this point.

The area covered by the snow was one of the biggest in the history of snowfall in the southwest. It covered the state far into the

Alpine and Marfa country and westward to El Paso, including the Big Bend and all of the Davis Mountains, according to news reports.

Eastern New Mexico and Texas plains west of Floydada had appreciably more snow than in this county. In fact, the snow was heavier, slightly, at Floydada than on the caprock rim and in the breaks portion of the county. It grew heavier westward in Floyd County. Reports indicate the snow was twice as great in Hale, Lubbock and Lamb Counties as in this area. It also was heavier in this county in the vicinity of Aiken and the northwest part of the county.

This week County Agent Cecil Lewis said farmers he had talked to believed the moisture was ample to carry wheat into March in flourishing condition and some thought moisture ample for needs into April.

The snow has been followed by cold mornings, lowest thermometer readings below 20 degrees, to mellow the soil and make its condition perfect for row crop land preparation.

Bright sunshine has prevailed mostly since Sunday.

## Taxes Are Off Slightly From 1956 Figures

Tax collections from the 1957 rolls in Floyd County are off somewhat from the figures for the year of 1956. It was revealed this week when Assessor-Collector T. T. Hamilton made his final report for the month of December to the Commissioners Court. The collector's check to the county was for slightly more than \$24,000 for December.

In the months of October, November and December this year the per centage of total collections was 76.7 per cent, whereas the payments for these months a year ago were 82.6. The difference is 5.9 per cent.

And while the collections from the tax rolls are off somewhat the poll tax payments are really away low. Today the collector has issued receipts to only 1,182 poll tax payers. To reach the usual 3,250 poll tax payments more than 2,000 persons must call at the collection window for their receipts. This seems improbable with only 22 days left to pay before the deadline. Payments would have to be slightly above 100 a day average.

This is election year. One-half of the county slate of officials is to be chosen and all of the state offices are to be filled.

The assessor-collector said his annual visit to Lockney for tax collections will be made on Thursday of next week, January 16. While the crew is in that city only poll tax and automobile business will be transacted in the court house, he said.

His work as a professional singer has taken Krueger into most of the states of the union and Canada. He has sung over the Mutual and N. B. C. networks. In 1944 he gave his own Town Hall recital.

Lillian Krueger, Mr. Krueger's wife and accompanist for the Floydada concert, was born and reared in New York City. She graduated in piano from the Julliard School of Music and has had extensive experience as a soloist as well as an accompanist.

Some one hundred members of the two school choruses have launched their ticket sale campaign for the Krueger concert with enthusiasm and hope to make it the gala musical event of the year, they say.

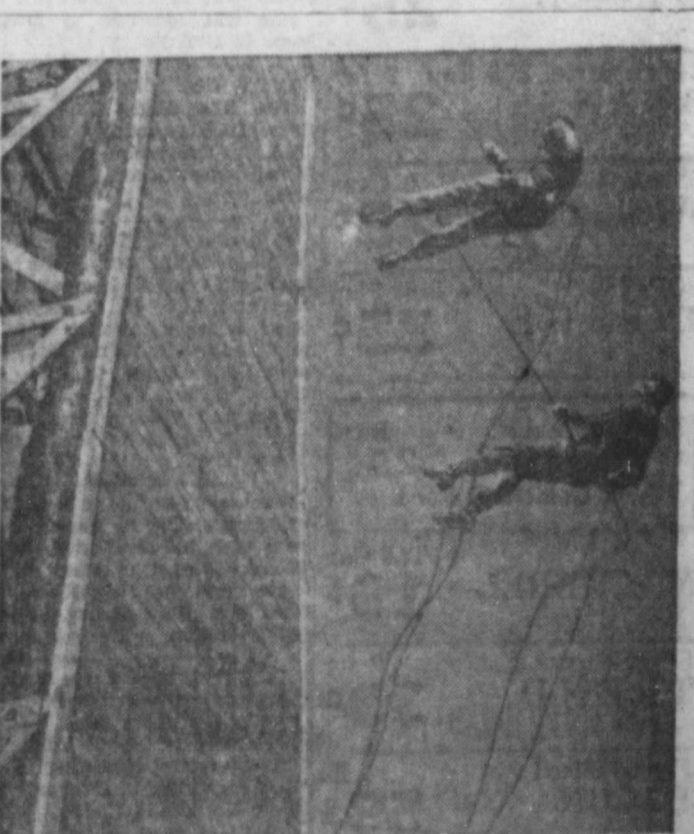

## Spotlight on HEALTH

**Science Features**  
**French Wine And American Fat**

When a Frenchman goes to see his doctor, the physician first checks his liver. The chronic complaint of Frenchmen about their livers is a well-known example of a disease pattern traceable to national eating (or drinking) habits.

Another famous example gave the British the nickname "Limeys." It was discovered that British sailors, while at sea, frequently developed scurvy. Though he did not know the cause was lack of vitamin C in the diet, a Naval surgeon finally discovered that citrus fruit would prevent the disease, and decreed that every tar in the service should receive a regular ration of limes. And the scurvy was beaten.

Now some doctors think they have identified another dietary cause of disease, in this case traceable to the love of American and European for rich, fatty foods. From surveys made in Japan, Africa, the Scandinavian countries and in the United States, doctors have found a connection between a high-fat diet and heart disease, the No. 1 killer in this country.

It was known that the clogging of arteries that feed the heart leads to formation of clots in those arteries and the consequent starvation of areas of the heart muscle. In many cases the heart can recover and continue to do its work. In others, it cannot and the victim dies.

After researchers found that the material responsible for this clogging of blood vessels was a fatty substance called cholesterol, they began to suspect that the amount and kind of fats we eat might be involved in this disease.

Checking the kinds of fat eaten by different peoples, and the incidence of heart attacks among them, doctors found, for instance, a much lower rate of heart disease in Japan than among U.S. citizens living in Hawaii, and further, that Japanese who emigrated to Hawaii



promptly began showing a heart attack pattern similar to that of their new country.

Dr. Ancel Keys of the University of Minnesota is one of the leading heart researchers who is convinced of the importance of eating habits in the development of clogged arteries (or atherosclerosis, its medical name). Doctors do not yet agree that all Americans should give up many of the fats they eat, but most physicians are recommending that older people with signs of heart disease, such as angina pain or high blood-cholesterol levels, cut down on the fat in their diet.

Together with the recommendation that such patients eat less, doctors urge them to avoid the animal fats such as milk and butter fat and to eat less meat fats. The future may well see these recommendations applied to all adults, even those without immediate signs of heart disease.

## JUNIOR HIGH WINS BASKETBALL GAMES, PLAY MATADOR

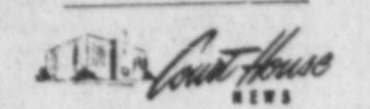
Floydada Junior High basketball teams won two games from Lockney Tuesday night and tied in a scrimmage game to come home without a single defeat.

## Road Work

Here plans call for a divided highway all of the 17.9 miles to the county's boundary.

Divided highway of this type calls for 230 feet of right-of-way where paralleling a railroad and 280 feet at points not touching railroad property. Present right-of-way measures 100 feet and thus calls for an additional 130 to 180 feet to be purchased.

Crews are soon to return to this project of field and paper work needed in securing deeds to additional land needed.

Early in November voters of the county approved a \$294,000 bond issue to be used for purchase of right-of-way and the State Highway Department has pledged a like amount to see the job through.

Only in a few instances will the widened highway cause hardship to land and home owners between Floydada and Lockney. Through Lockney and to the westward, however, several businesses, homes, and irrigation wells will be in or very near the proposed right-of-way.

Highway 70 to the east is due to become divided four-lane for four miles to the junction of the Lakeview road. Past this point the remaining 14.3 miles to the Motley County line will be a high volume wide two-lane highway. This type road calls for a minimum of 130 feet of right of way or 30 additional feet.

Highway 62 south of Floydada will receive like treatment. The first 3.5 miles is to be divided to the intersection of FM 579. The 7.4 miles from this point to the Crosby County line to be wide two-lane. The same right of way problems arise here as on highway 70.

Progress on these cardinal highway jobs seems to hinge on the speed with which right-of-way can be secured from land owners along the routes. Earmarked for the number one spot has been the work on 70 west of Floydada through Lockney. This project also presents by far the most problems. All these improvements are due to be completed and in use within the next two years.

#### BOYPOWER VS. HORSEPOWER

Insurance Companies are tough on boys, they say, but Insurance News, publication of Highway Insurance Underwrites' Guide, says some simple facts are responsible for the higher rates which youthful drivers pay, 20 per cent more and even up to 50 per cent. Reproduction of the article has it this way:

"The facts are in, boys, and you just don't make the grade. As a group between the ages of 16 and 25, you think you're the world's best drivers. But the low-down is this — you're the country's worst. The facts are in and your insurance rate has gone up anywhere from 20 to 50%."

"Think it over, lads . . . and dads. The insurance people are no dopes. They don't care whether you're handsome and have the females in a dither, they do not care whether you have a piece of junk tuned to a raceway song. All they care about is poor performance on the road."

"Frankly, sons, your performance as a group is a menace to society . . . and to yourselves. Who says so? Not us. The insurance companies say so and they know; they don't know your name and address. They don't know if you own a Ferrari or a Ford. All they care about is facts. The facts are you have the worst road record of any age group in the country. And getting worse!"

"You are still boys, boys. You aren't men unless you can handle cars, among other things, and you aren't handling them properly, though you have plenty of know-how to do so. It isn't only you who gets killed or hurt . . . It's the girl with you, it's the guy down the street, or the lady in the next county who trusted you to act like a man."

"You wouldn't let a guy hit you over the head with a hammer; why let him drive you into a post? You wouldn't let him steal fifty bucks out of your pocket. Yet he's already done that this year, boosting your own cost of driving a car. And you the worst offender . . . you spoiled brats thinking you can handle 200 horsepower when you can't handle one boypower, what are you going to do about it?"

"Brother get the low-down . . . the girls in your age group have it all over you. Not only in looks, but in intelligence, in self-control, in fair play, and in their ability to handle that horsepower you can't handle. That's not our opinion; it's the considered opinion of the insurance companies. The rates for girls in your own age group have gone down, not up. They are getting to be better drivers, not worse."

"You haven't yet learned that champs are not chumps. And if you don't believe the insurance companies about what lousy drivers you are, ask a champ someday . . . if you can face it. Don't fool yourself about

the cheap adulation of the kids around you who don't know any better. And don't think your girl is impressed by your hot-shot antics the next time you take her out. She, and most of your buddies, have you tabbed for just what you are, a chump. They're just too proud or too scared or disgusted to tell you.

"Nobody else will tell you, so we're telling you. We'll take it back when the insurance rates go back down."

**Million Dollar Snow.** Snow over the weekend was one of those "million dollar" events that the newspapermen so cheerfully report. And "million dollar" really does represent about the true value of such in a high plains county. A deep fall season plus a good wet January snow has always meant, probably still does, that the farmer needs only a thunder shower or two and a good wet dew next summer to make a big crop in the fall. Also it means wheat will go into the spring in an ideal condition. Also—and this may be the biggest one—the need for winter and spring pre-irrigation will be practically nil.

**Harnessing The Brazos.** Although the job is far from completed the time is foreseen when the Brazos River will be tamed and all of its waters put to use, instead of creating flood and havoc as the floods sweep toward the gulf. The Brazos River Authority, of which publisher H. S. Hillburn of Plainview is president, is gradually working out the tricky problems which have arisen from many conflicting interests. It will be a good day for Texas when this job is finally completed. The final date is years hence, as a matter of fact, but they do foresee that day.

### Blind Mexican Dies In Blaze At Farm Home

Three fires at Lockney last week destroyed two rural homes, heavily damaged a third and took the life of an 80 year old blind Latin-American.

The first fire occurred Friday afternoon about 4:15 on the Harmon Handley farm. A five room dwelling some 200 yards from the Handley house was completely demolished. The blind man, Juan Gonzales, who made his home with his stepson, Ray Gonzales and family, was found in a part of the house where he seldom ventured. Several children in the house escaped injuries.

Gonzales was taken to Carter Funeral Home and funeral service for the man was held Saturday. At 11:45 a. m. Saturday fire destroyed two bedrooms and the kitchen in the Vernon Hotel farm three miles west of Lockney. The rest of the \$25,000 brick home was saved but damaged by smoke and water. The Hotel family had only lived there since last spring.

The third fire was discovered about 2:45 p. m. the same day. An old farm house on the Sam Moore farm eight miles southwest of Lockney was destroyed. Occupants of the house, Latin-Americans, were at the funeral of Juan Gonzales when the fire was discovered.

go to the newspapers, radio and TV which played a major role in aiding law enforcement, and focusing public attention on the increased driving hazards of the holiday season," Garrison stated.

And Governor Daniel stressed that one of the chief aims of his administration during 1958 will be "to reduce our traffic deaths and injuries even farther below the 1956 record. It can be done... this is best illustrated by the results of our efforts during the past holiday season when the nation's death total increased but the Texas total decreased."

If the DPS figure of 103 proves accurate, it will be the lowest since 1952 when 98 persons were killed in the holiday traffic crush.

**Twice As Much Water** — New State Water Development Board has set up shop with the aim of doubling Texas' water storage space. Board members predict the program will bring the state an additional \$600,000,000 in conservation projects -- without cost to state tax payers.

Board is authorized to raise \$100,000,000 by selling bonds at four per cent interest -- and another \$100,000,000 later, on say-so of Legislature. This money can be lent at five per cent interest to help pay up to one-third of cost of local conservation projects.

"I firmly believe the program will be self-liquidating," said Board Vice-Chairman W. E. (Buck) Tinsley of Austin.

Board hired Joe Carter as its \$10,000-a-year executive secretary. Carter was legal counsel to the State Board of Water Engineers until animosity from two board members forced his resignation last spring.

After that, Carter served on Gov. Price Daniel's staff, assisting with

water legislation drafting. He is a former state senator from Sherman.

**Breather for Schools** — Some 600 still-segregated school districts in Texas are more relaxed now. Many had feared that court-enforced integration in Texas would begin this winter in Dallas.

Federal Judge W. H. Atwell of Dallas ruled last year that Dallas schools must integrate at mid-term (January, 1958). But a higher court (U. S. Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans) overruled. It said Dallas school officials should be given "a reasonable further opportunity" to plan for integration.

Decision leaves intact, for the time being, a state law passed last spring designed to delay desegregation. It prohibits school districts from integrating unless instructed to do so in a local election. Integration without a voter mandate would bring loss of state aid.

For Dallas, this would have meant \$1,500,000 a year.

**Unwanted "Eggs"** — Estate Life Insurance Co. of Amarillo is asking the state to take back some "rotten eggs" it bought at a bankruptcy sale.

Last summer Estate took over some \$11,000,000 worth of policies that had belonged to Physicians Life Insurance Co. Physicians had gone broke, and its affairs were being settled by the state liquidator.


Estate's attorney charged at an insurance Board hearing that the contract arranged by State Liquidator J. D. Wheeler was unfair to Estate. Some batch of business (mostly burial policies on older people) has passed through three companies -- Southern Bankers, American Atlas and Physicians. It bankrupted all three, said the Estate attorney, who called the business "a bunch of rotten eggs."

State Insurance Department officials charge that Estate presented a false statement of assets when it entered into the contract. Insurance Board forced the resignation of Estate's president, John L. McCarty, after it was revealed McCarty had given a State Insurance Department employee \$2,000.

**Short Snorts** — Creation of an administrative office for the state's judicial system is urged by State Supreme Court Associate Justice Ruel Walker. An administrative director, he says, could help in more efficient assigning of pending court business and equalizing of trial loads... Texas Rangers are now under the direct authority of Public Safety Director Homer Garrison Jr. Transfer from regional commanders was announced by the Public Safety Commission. Change to a single command was said essential to efficiency... Present state land office employees will keep their jobs under new Land Commissioner Bill Alcorn when he takes office Feb. 1, he has announced. Alcorn said he will move his family to Austin but would not say whether he will run for election to the post.

He was named by Governor Daniel to succeed Earl Rudder who has resigned to take an administrative job at Texas A&M.

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### The Trouble With Cotton

Although 1957 will be happily recalled by Texans as "the year the drought was broken," it will also be remembered by everybody in the cotton industry as the "trouble year."

The trouble with cotton didn't miss anybody. It ranged from the farmer to the processor and on up to the government.

The farmer probably suffered more and lost more than anybody. His troubles started back in the spring at planting time, although he certainly didn't complain, because who could complain about rain at that time? But anyway, the rains came and washed out what had been planted or else delayed planting by precious weeks.

When the cotton finally got planted, the farmer thought he had it made. And it did look good for a while, although it would have helped if some of that spring rain had waited until mid-summer to show up.

The rains did come back, though, at harvest time. And they are

still ginning cotton in Texas as a result.

Texas farmers have lost millions of dollars from fallen, degraded or ruined cotton. And along with their losses have been equally serious losses throughout the cotton industry. Cottonseed crushers, for instance, felt sharp losses when normally heavy receipts in the fall failed to show up. Ginners have had a long, drawn-out season with the many processing difficulties that come with a wet harvest.

The Texas Department of Agriculture's important pink bollworm control program took a backseat to economic necessity in the matter of delayed harvesting when cotton stalk plow-up rules were extended, re-extended and finally left open in many areas. However, eventual plow-up of cotton stalks has been encouraging and it is hoped an effective kill of insect larvae can be accomplished even at this late date.

Perhaps the most encouraging outcome of this trouble year for cotton is that U. S. surpluses are expected to be shortened considerably, paying the way for a good market for Texas cotton to come back to in 1958.

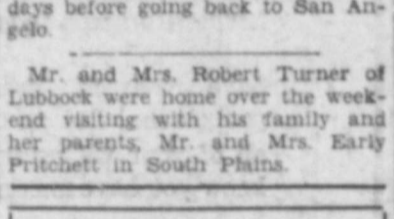
