







To Our Friends and Customers

The Southwestern Public Service Company has been furnishing Friona with electric service since the fall of 1942, having acquired the electric system at that time, and in order to better acquaint our friends and customers with the Company and its operating policies, we are instituting a series of statements to be published in the form of advertisements once each week for the next few weeks.

The Southwestern Public Service Company was organized in New Mexico in 1925 and, before acquiring the electric facilities in Friona, and in neighboring cities and towns, it served principally the Central Panhandle of Texas and the Pecos Valley area of New Mexico.

Soon after its organization, the Company established a general policy of operation which has been continued through the ensuing years.

This policy consists principally of the following:

- (1) The best possible service to the public with friendly and courteous handling of our customers' dealings with us.
- (2) The fair treatment of our employees, supplemented by a continuous program of training them in an eager willingness to serve the public and in good citizenship in their communities.
- (3) A program of voluntary reduction in our rates to the public, made periodically as business conditions permit.

As a result of the repeated rate reductions made during the period of our operations from 1925 until the outbreak of the war, the average rate per kilowatt hour for all lighting and power sold by the Company, in the original territory served, was reduced to less than one-third of what it was in the beginning. These reductions in rates were accompanied by large increases in electric plant and line investment, to provide adequate service at all

This is the program of service to the public which we bring to the people of Friona. Although we are handicapped along with all others by war conditions, it is our purpose to put our operating policy in full effect in the years of peace ahead. These matters will be amplified in later statements, and additional information will be presented to you, in order that you might become better acquainted with the Company and the service which it renders.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON -

Paul's Tolerance Is a Guidepost

The International Sunday School Lesson for April 30 Text: Acts 15:23-29; Galatians 2:1, 2, 9, 10, 20, 21

PREJUDICES die hard. And the finest of faiths and convictions tend to become affected by

The story of the way in which well-intentioned Christians sought to prevent the fullest manifestation of the grace of God in the early church ought to have been full of enlightenment and warning; but the same sort

of attitude persists today. Paul said, "I do not frustrate the grace of God." Are we, by any chance, insisting upon our ways to the frustration of the grace of God?

The well-intentioned disciples who rebuked the mothers who brought young children that Jesus should bless them were in a sense frustrating the grace of Jesus was "much displeased." When we seek to impose ideas, and rites, and formal observances on others because they mean much to us, we are in danger of frustrating the grace

When the power of the Gospel became manifest in the saving of gentiles, and these gentiles took their place in the fellowship of the Christian church, the Jewish Christians, or some of them at least, who still observed many of the requirements of the Jewish law, sought to impose these obligations upon the gentile con-

Against such an attitude Paul took strong and uncompro-mising ground; it was his belief that the law could not perfeetly be fulfilled, and so he laid great stress upon faith as "the end of the law for everyone that believeth": apart from this he does not seem to have sought to persuade Jewish Christians to bandon Jewish rites.

Thus Paul observed an attitude of tolerance and common sense in two ways. He regarded the rights and liberties of his fellow ewish Christians, and he upheld t the same time the rights and iberties of the gentile converts.
