master Corps went to work on the problem of developing potato chips that would stay fresh and flavorful after long storage and would be compact and easy to transport, store, and serve. Their research at USDA's Eastern Utilization Research and Development Division Philadelphia, and at the Quarter-master Food and Container Institute, Chicago, has produced potato chip bars - a product developed for military use which may also prove attractive to civilian consumers.

The base are made of crushed potato chips, compressed and cut into three-inch strips about 5/8 inch thick and one inch wide. They have potato-chip flavor and potato-chip crunch, yet need only about 1/20th of the storage space of ordinary chips. Because they are a concentrated source of energy, they may be practical food to stockpile in preparation for emergencies.

Judging by the reaction of tasters, potato-chip bars may have a promising future as a civilian snack food, but they are not being manufactured as yet.


