McBrien Announces Members County Traffic Safety Council

First Meeting Called Tonight

Judge J. D. McBrien this week announced the personnel of the Floyd County Traffic Safety Council, including a group of 15 citizens from various parts of the county, with Bob Copeland of Floydada as their chairman and Claud Brown of Lockney as vice chairman.

The committee's first meeting will be held tonight, May 1, in the county court room, at 7:30 o'clock.

The naming of the committee followed two meetings last week, the first of which was addressed Wednesday morning by way of the air waves by Governor Price Daniel from Austin.

A plea made by the governor to the people of the state to cut down the appalling death toll on the highways, was followed by his urgent request that a traffic safety council be named in every one of the 254 counties of Texas. Objective is the saving of at least one life for every county in the state in the year of 1958.

Death toll in street and highway traffic last year in Texas was above 2,200, injuries above 120,000, and the economic loss ran into the millions, the governor said, quoting statistical facts.

Naming of the Floyd County committee on traffic safety came after the judge had contacted the citizens chosen. These, he said, will join whole-heartedly in supporting the movement to cut the traffic toll and uphold the constituted authorities in their dealings with traffic problems.

Leading points made in the governor's address were that speed and drunk driving are the greatest hazards. Also he said carelessness and lack of common courtesy are high in the list of causes of traffic accidents.

Trio Arrested in New Mexico To Face Charge of Burglary

Three fugitives apprehended in Alamo, N. Mex., last week are charged with the burglary of the Lunch Box Cafe on Highway 207 East Tuesday night of last week.

Sheriff W. D. Hollums and Deputy Ray Hardin went for the prisoners and returned them to Texas. One is lodged in Hale County jail, the other two in Floyd County jail.

The one in Plainview, Harold Ingram, was one of three prisoners who attempted a jail break there Sunday. Lodged here are Clifton Jones, 42, and Donald Rich, 15.

George Brock, 18, and Dwayne Millman, 13, both of Lubbock and both held on an Abernathy burglary charge were the other two in the Plainview ruckus. The three men were lodged in a solitary confinement tank in the Plainview jail and attacked jailer J. E. Miller when he brought them a pot of coffee they had requested.

Miller was beaten with a mop handle and received a deep gash over the eye and severe bruises on the shoulder, arms and legs.

Officers credited Billy Don Knight, 25, of Shallowater, another prisoner, with preventing the jail-break. He battled the escapees on a stairway and forced Millman back into the tank and the other two, Brock and Ingram followed.

Sheriff Ted Andrews of Plainview said the three were now back in solitary confinement and would be on a bread and water diet for some time.

The cigarette machine taken from the Lunch Box in the burglary here was found northwest of town late Wednesday by Plainview residents.

Plan Surprise For Mosquitoes Garbage Flies

Come spring-time with its mosquitoes and flies, the City of Floydada will have all preparations made to battle them.

For it has a new fogging machine to replace the old one, one the councilmen think is much better than their considerably used fogger; and in addition a simple spraying attachment for the sanitary truck.

The sprayer will be used periodically on garbage cans to eliminate flies and as well on the garbage truck itself to prevent flies from following it.

Total cost in money to the city is \$743.50 for the two machines. Their old fogger, a Tifa, went in on the deal. The new machine is named Dynafog.

Flies and mosquitoes are said to build up immunity to any certain kind of poison formula, after so long a time so the city is set to hit them with a new kind of poison, also.

Demonstrations indicate the new fogger really squishes out the vapor, said Councilman W. W. Goen.

For Commissioner in Precinct Two there are six filed. They are Elmer L. Burleson, Buck Sams, Raymond Martin, Hugh Counts Bob Jarrett and Ray Canon.

In district races George Mahon is the only candidate filed for congressman, E. O. Northcutt of Amarillo for associate justice, 7th Court of Civil Appeals, Andy Rogers for 20th District Senator, and H. G. Wells for representative 88th district representative.

Anticipated are applications of Leroy Saul of Krebs for 30th District senatorial honors and Richard Franklin (Frank) Stovall Jr. of Floydada, and Thomas Toliver of Plainview, for representative, 89th District.

Mrs. Alice Baker, "Mother of Lockney," was honored with the presence of some 550 guests from near and far last Wednesday, April 23, as plains people went all out to help her celebrate her 64th year in the mercantile business.

Guests at the celebration included persons from Floyd County, Lubbock, Plainview, Amarillo, Colorado, Hale Center, Dalhart, Muleshoe, Hart, Tulla, Abilene, Kress, Silverton, Pecos, Crosbyton, Slaton, Mineral Wells, Port Lavaca, Otton, Northfield, and Matador. Greetings by telegrams and letters were also received by Mrs. Baker from senators, congressmen, the governor and the President, Senator Ralph Yarborough telephoned during the affair.

Among the guests was Mrs. Ida Ragle, who said she was the first person to buy merchandise from the "store wagon" brought into Lockney by Mr. Baker in 1894.

Mrs. Baker -- who is 4 feet 11, and who has reached the age of 90, was escorted to the chair of honor by the mayor of Lubbock, Lennis Baker and Mrs. Olga Applewhite, two of her 26 grandchildren. The "throne" was a 100 year old chair belonging to Mrs. Tom Simpson of Lockney. It was brought to this country from Czechoslovakia.

Decorations in the American Legion Hall, where the gathering was held, included collections of photographs dating back to the 1890's. There were account ledgers on display which contained the names of some of the visitors in 1897-98.

Floral arrangements graced the walls throughout the building and the serving table held a huge white cake, an exact replica of Mrs. Baker's present, rose building. At one end of the tables were the figures "94" in pink holding white candles.

Mr. and Mrs. Baker came to the

celebration. She was ready to receive a greeting, whether from a youngster or from a person she had known all her life. She seemed to know them all. She was poised and ready for a picture either by a reporter or a celebrator.

All of her 11 children were present to enjoy the planned two-hour anniversary, which went on past the three-hour mark.

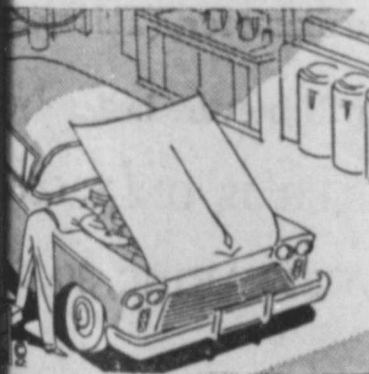

YOUR COUNTY AGENT

(By Cecil Lewis)

COTTON — How to grow cotton to make more profit is the content of the new Extension Service bulletin L-392, "Growing High Plains Cotton." The Texas Agriculture Extension Service, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, and the representatives of the Plains Cotton Growers collaborated to set up the best management practices to use on "Man-Manageable" conditions for highest profits. This bulletin gives a breakdown on production problems and their solutions, such as insect control, irrigation, harvesting and marketing for best prices.

Some of the information in this pamphlet applies to all cotton growers. There are some good tips in it. Copies may be obtained from your local County Agent.

WHICH KIND OF NITROGEN FERTILIZER TO BUY — Every year the question comes up as to which is the cheapest and best nitrogen to buy. Nitrogen fertilizer comes in three different forms, solid, liquid, and gas, each of which may contain varying percentages of nitrogen, depending on the material from which it is made.

W. F. Bennett, soils chemist at Texas A & M College, says the important question is which of these sources is best for you. He says that it is generally agreed that the source is as good as another as long as they are on an equivalent nitrogen basis. So, what you do is decide how much nitrogen you plan to apply per acre, then find out how much it will cost to apply that amount from the different sources of nitrogen. Then use the nitrogen that will give you the lowest cost per acre.

PRODUCE MORE FISH — Anyone interested in producing the maximum number of large fish in the shortest length of time, should consider fertilization of their lakes.

A wide choice of fertilizers can be used. These include commercial mixtures, soybean meal, cottonseed meal, barnyard manure and others. Fertilization should be applied during the spring months and should be stopped about the first of June. Several small applications of from 50 to 100 pounds of fertilizer for each surface acre of water made every four to six weeks during the spring, is much better than one or two heavy applications.

Water which has been properly fertilized will grow enough natural fish food organisms for rapid fish growth.

For more details, consult your county agricultural agent.

Something New
(Copied from FOOD AND HOME
NOTES—USDA, Office of Informa-
tion, Washington, D.C.)
"Potato chips are popular among
servicemen, but they have never
been issued as a military ration be-
cause they don't keep their quality
through long storage or unfavor-
able storage conditions. From the
military standpoint they are also
too bulky and inconvenient to
handle.

Scientists of the U. S. Dept. of
Agriculture and the Army Quar-
termaster Corps went to work on
the problem of developing potato
chips that would stay fresh and flavor-
ful after long storage and would be
compact and easy to transport,
store, and serve. Their research at
USDA's Eastern Utilization Re-
search and Development Division,
Philadelphia, and at the Quar-
termaster Food and Container In-
stitute, Chicago, has produced potato-
chip bars—a product developed for
military use which may also prove
attractive to civilian consumers.

The bars are made of crushed
potato chips compressed and cut
into three-inch strips about 5/8 inch
thick and one inch wide. They have
potato-chip flavor and potato-chip
crunch, yet need only about 1/20th
of the storage space of ordinary
chips. Because they are a concen-
trated source of energy, they may
be practical food to stockpile in pre-
paration for emergencies.

Judging by the reaction of testers,
potato-chip bars may have a
promising future as a civilian snack
food, but they are not being manu-
factured as yet.

Urges Storage For Big Wheat Crop in Sight

By L. A. (Fisherman) Marshall

I have recently observed the wheat crops in Oklahoma, the Wichita Falls, Graham and Seymour areas, as well as here on the plains. Here is the situation this year, this wheat is all going to harvest at the same time. Usually there is a spread of some two weeks, but not so this year. The result may be box car shortages, combine shortages, glutted markets. Markets will sag below loan values. Storage will not be available. The smart farmer will provide storage on the farm, or sell at a loss.

One of the best investments I know of is wheat storage, whether it's wood or concrete, a thousand bushels or a million. It costs 30 to 40 cents per bushel to build storage for a bushel of wheat. Two years of storage pays for it, the larger the storage the cheaper per bushel. A one million bushel storage pays for itself in two years or less.

If nothing happens to this wheat crop, like excess rain, rust or hail this year will be one of the most bushels per acre of over 60-lb. wheat we have had in many years. The plains has a long standing reputation of raising the finest, high protein, hard winter milling wheat found in the nation. This year promises some 63 pound wheat. Remember moisture is the only enemy of stored wheat.

We have with us this spring a winter seed of the mustard family, which is said to be even a worse pest than bind weed. It's a hardy yellow weed that has a short period from bloom to seed. It will take your farm or garden and leave you only the mortgage. Fight it with both hands. Do not let it go to seed. It spreads like fire, and it is a perfect set up for insects.

HAS THIS FELLOW ARRIVED?

At last something has been found that a water dog is good for, something that makes them really in demand. The nasty, slimy things that a plainsman would hardly touch except with a stick, are good bait. That's a fact, they say. And the statement seems to be borne out by what we hear is taking place, like: They've been seining Floyd County lakes for weeks for waterdogs, loading them up in barrels with enough water to keep them from melting and running together, and shipping west. One story has it that waterdogs are choice bait at Lake Meade. They count them out at so much each. The fisherman hooks his waterdog through that tough catfish under-lip. The cold-natured thing lives for hours under water and keeps wriggling, trying to go nowhere, like a waterdog does. A yarn told for the truth in Floydada this week was that a non-resident who has the "rights" to a few lakes said he'd done well this season. He was in a hurry at the moment to get off to a western resort with a pick-up load he had of water dogs contracted. He confided he'd rather have four or five good lakes on the plains than a half-section of irrigated land with two good wells on it. Another story says that lake after lake has been seined for water dogs by local people not too squeamish at the sight, who have made living wages by doing it. But a really good one that showed up over the week-end was about a fellow who was hunting a game warden. He inquired down at the city hall. His story was he had given somebody permission to seine his lake for waterdogs. But the fellow had taken not only a big haul of waterdogs but the catfish the owner had planted in the lake as well. Took them off

and sold them. He was wanting to know of the game warden if he could "have anything done" with the fellow. We did not get any names. In fact, this is one of those nameless yarns. But it is a slick one.

About Irrigating Cotton. Plains Cotton Growers says the first summer irrigation should be made after the cotton begins blooming. Earlier irrigation, the authority says, encourages vegetative growth, retards fruiting and delays maturity. Plenty of good reasons, if the reasons are right, and they probably are, though contrary to usual practice.

At a speech-making and question and answer meeting last week preceding the bond vote on Saturday it was declared by a civic and business leader that "everything we have done that was worthwhile has cost money," who, importantly, added he thought most towns Ralls size have already done something about their street situation. This was the banker speaking. From which we conclude to remark: (1) There is at least one town that has not done enough about the streets; and (2) it is important to have the right people looking at and backing any community project.

West Texas water holes will see plenty of activity this year. The urge to buy a boat and get to a water spot was never more fully demonstrated than last week-end when car after car, bumper to bumper, it seemed at times, whizzed along every highway in the vicinity of Floydada, with some kind of a boat on a trailer.

It's up to every Texan, said the governor, to "accept traffic safety as a do-it-yourself project."

Toward Safer Roads — An important arm of the anti-accident campaign is a \$43,000,000 program to rebuild some hazardous spots in the highway system.

Governor Daniel and State Highway Engineer DeWitt Greer formally launched this work by placing a "drive carefully" sign by a narrow bridge on a farm road near Austin. Scene of previous accidents, the bridge is to be widened.

State Highway Department allocated \$25,000,000 to the emergency safety construction fund, and \$18,000,000 will come from federal funds.

Texas Court of Criminal Appeals has the task of deciding whether Promoter BenJack Cage got a fair shake in the trial that brought him a 10-year sentence on charges of embezzling \$100,000. Defense attorneys contend the money, withdrawn from ICT Corp. and channeled through a maze of Cage enterprises, never went to Cage personally. Prosecutors retort the route was purposely devious.

Building construction awards for March increased 29 per cent — almost three times the expected 10 per cent seasonal increase. Dollar-wise, construction for the first quarter of '58 was within one per cent of the same period in '57 says the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. But allowing for higher costs, the volume was 4 per cent below '57.

Discus Mark Set By Motley Youth

MATADOR — Richard Stafford, Matador senior, set a record in Interscholastic League meet, when he tossed the discus 170 feet, 1 1/2 inches.

It was the state's second best throw this season and the best throw by a Class B athlete in West Texas history.

Only other man in the state to better Stafford's throw is Walter Myers of Odessa who tossed the discus 171 feet, 8 inches in the Brady Relays.

Stafford is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lyod Stafford, of Hoaring Springs.

How Egg Prices Are Determined
The chicken egg, probably the most universal of all foods, is a part of everybody's diet in one form or another. Eggs are produced, bought and sold practically everywhere, and yet the business of pricing eggs is an unexciting science in which many gauges are used, although not all of them are accurate.

Ultimately, of course, egg prices like all free commodity prices, are determined by cost of production and handling and supply and demand. In day to day pricing it is impossible, however, to know just how much influence factors such as sentiment, rumors, connivance, personalism, weather conditions, human judgment, faith, hope and perhaps even forced charity, are involved in arriving at egg prices.

Who Should Determine Prices?
The people most directly affected by egg prices are the same people who should establish these prices. They are the people who produce, buy, sell and consume eggs. In order that these individuals involved in egg marketing know how to make the intelligent price decisions which are required of them, they must have the most factual and up to date information possible.

Market information agencies such as the Texas Market News Service, a section of Agriculture, whose job is to report conditions and prices on certain commodities, can do a great deal toward removing mysteries

concerned with marketing. Their job is our job, as it is to report information, carefully receive and evaluate as an aid for the buyer and seller in determining their own prices. The important thing to remember is that the Market News Service does not function to determine prices but to report the prices which have been paid, after such payment has been validated.

The Texas Egg Report
Very recently, egg price reporting was established in five separate areas of Texas production -- Lubbock-South Plains area, Dallas-Fort Worth area, East Texas area, Houston area, South-South Central Texas area, and the Corpus Christi-Rio Grande Valley area. Prices and conditions from these areas are reported and published twice weekly, both through press and radio and through a mailed bulletin available free of charge on request.

The Texas report is as welcome and valuable to the Texas egg industry as it is new. Texas egg market prices should be determined by Texas egg market conditions, and it is our hope to accurately and thoroughly report these conditions.

Dept. Releases Texas Highway Map For 1958

AUSTIN. — It's here! It's new! It's free! The Texas Highway Department today released the big new 1958 Official Highway Travel Map. Maps may be obtained by writing the Texas Highway Department, Austin 14, Texas, or at the Highway District Offices and Travel Information Bureaus. County tax offices have map cards available for requesting copies of the map.

The Official Highway Travel Map is used by state and governmental agencies in Texas for determining highway distances, mileages, zones, and like information. The same map is used by Texas tourists seeking roads to recreational and historical attractions throughout the state. The reverse side of the map reflects in full color some of the outstanding scenic and recreational facilities in Texas.

Texas' new 1958 travel map is the answer to today's demand for more and more travel information. The steady growth of Texas from a state with a population of slightly over seven million just ten years ago to its present estimated population of more than nine million is reflected by the information shown. The number of cities and towns indicated on the 1948 map was 567. Today, there are 1,812 -- an increase of 1,245. State and U. S. highways have been increased by 2,028 miles, and farm-to-market roads from 620 miles to 17,136 miles -- a 16,506-mile increase. The map reflects a total of 43,292 miles of highways.

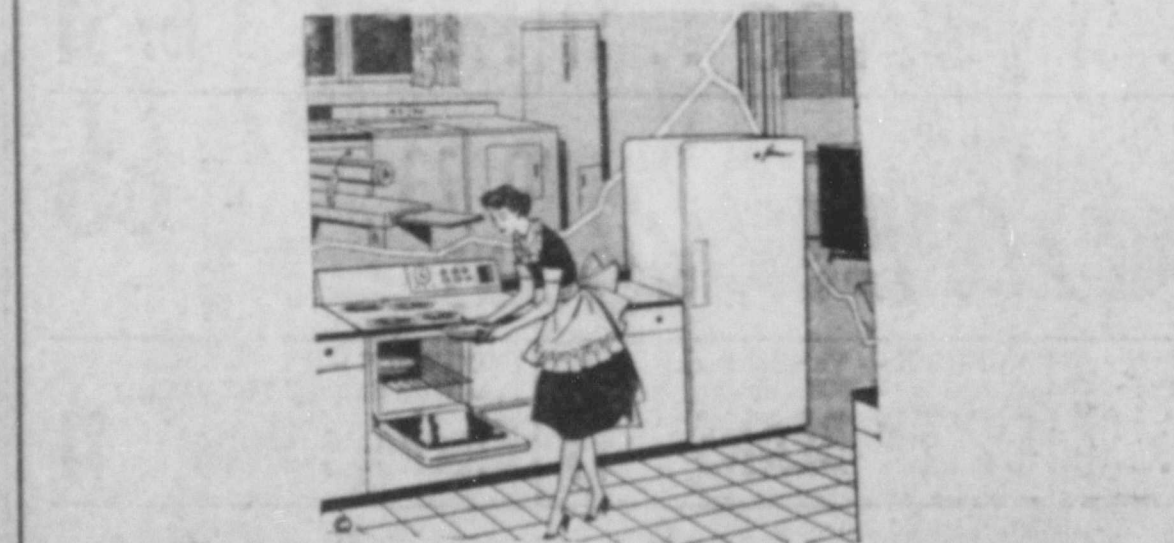
Roadside parks, long cherished by Texas highway users, were not shown on the 1948 map. Today, 1,028 roadside parks are pinpointed as pleasant stopping places. Divided highways also show a startling jump in the ten-year period. In 1948 there were 110 miles of divided roads shown. Now there are 1,007 miles marked on the map with the black bands and red center indicating divided highway miles.
