## Ready Improvement Noted In Floydada Park System

The park surrounding the swimming pool has grass, trees and picnic tables. Local residents believe that this block area is the most attractive it has ever been.

FLOOD LIGHTS recently installed by the City Electric Department completely light the area for night activities.

Floydada Park, an acreage east of the Floydada High School, has had only one development. The Little League Ball Park occupies a corner of the area. Interest in Little League activities is currently running high as it does each year.

The Floydada Chamber of Commerce Civic Improvements Committee hopes to have a professional work out a master plan for the park's development this year and present it to the City Council for their use in future development.

Pony League games are staged nightly at the Pony League Park in East Floydada.

Although the park facilities are improving each year, the Chamber of Commerce Committee has noted items which are needed to make the parks of Floydada more adequately equipped.

The Swimming Pool Park and Napoleon Park each need three new picnic tables and fire pits, the committee points out.

Both parks need swings, slides and other playground equipment.

Chamber of Commerce Manager, O. M. Watson, Jr., has urged local organizations to contact the Chamber of Commerce Office if their future plans call for sponsoring park or playground equipment.

The Democratic Executive Committee of Floyd County is not one which the State Democratic Executive Committee nor Governor Daniel will find amenable to their plans for uniting the party, unless the SDEC and the governor are willing to play a different tune.

Resolutions adopted unanimously by the committee this week reflect their opposition to:

Both the change in the precinct and county conventions as now held to be supplanted by elected delegates;

And to change the date of the primary elections.

The committee went further and thumbed a metaphorical nose at the governor by resolving that the "conflict . . . may just as probably indicate the governor should change his views, or that the state should change its governor."

The governor this week completed a whirlwind trip into the panhandle and south plains for the purpose of:

Daniel has carried Floyd County in all his races, including his last race for governor.

In a Daniel-Yarborough battle royal in 1956 the present Floyd county Democratic regime swept to power in precinct and county conventions.

## Salvation Army In Texas Has New Commander Effective Today

The Salvation Army in Texas will have a new commander, effective June 19, the first change in top command in ten years.

Chairman J. C. West of the Floyd County Service Unit Committee, announced today that he had been notified that orders have been issued by Lt. Commissioner William Davidson, Territorial Commander of the Salvation Army in the Southern Territory, Atlanta, Ga., for the retirement of Lt. Colonel John A. Morrison as Divisional Commander of the Texas Division, effective June 18, and the installation of Lt. Colonel Ernest Pickering as Texas Divisional Commander, effective June 19.

Colonel Pickering has served as Divisional Commander of the Virginia-Southern West Virginia Division for the past five and one-half years. The newly-arriving Colonel Morrison and Colonel Pickering also include their wives who hold equal rank with their husbands and fill important executive positions on the Divisional Staff.

In the new assignment, Lt. Colonel Ernest Pickering is returning to Texas and to Dallas after an absence of 14 1/2 years. Both had previously filled two assignments in the Texas Division. From January, 1937, to January, 1941, Colonel Pickering served as Youth Secretary in charge of youth activities, and Mrs. Pickering was Director of the Guild; and from January, 1941, to January, 1944, Colonel Pickering was Divisional Secretary for the Texas Division and Mrs. Pickering was Divisional League of Mercy Secretary.

By coincidence, Colonel Pickering succeeded Colonel Morrison when he became Divisional Secretary in 1941, and he will succeed Colonel Morrison again as Divisional Commander on June 19.

William Everett Brown, pioneer of West Texas, born March 14, 1837 at Telahoma, Tenn., passed at Castro County Hospital June 14.

He came to Texas in 1894 where he settled in Motley County in 1908, moved to Floyd County in 1912, and later settled in Hale County in 1937. He is survived by his present wife, Mrs. Thelma Brown, Dimmitt, Tex., three sons and seven daughters:

## Showers Halt Wheat Harvest As Portions Get Good Rains

Showers Monday afternoon broke a torrid season that had been doing damage to late grain, also served to put a stop to the harvest in widely scattered parts of the county, due to start up again Wednesday afternoon and this morning.

Parts of Hillcrest, Fairview, Center, Baker, Dougherty, Sand Hill, McCoy, had an inch or more of rain. At Floydada it was a light shower. There was no hail damage reported. Wind broke down some of the wheat stalks in the field, but not beyond harvesting condition.

The storm period caught some big crops just as combines were moving in, caught others within a half day of finishing, while in other areas the good rain found the stubble already turned under waiting for the moisture that fell.

Cotton and feed crops benefitted greatly. Probably half of the county had rains that could be termed "good cotton showers" in addition to the good rain areas.

The first grain crops harvested, as indicated in earlier reports, made the biggest yields ever reported county-wide have not done so well. Volunteer fields made some fabulous yields. Thousands of acres yielded more than 40 bushels, while occasional fields had 50 bushels or more.

Later crops are showing the effects of the heat that prevailed last week.

The bulk of the harvest is over but there are several thousand acres yet to go. Many of these fields will be entered this week-end.

Biggest single area of uncut wheat probably is in the old Antelope section of Dougherty District. Ned Bradley and Greer Christian have large crops that will not be ready by Monday or Tuesday and most of their neighbors are in the same boat. The coolness and wet ground from an inch of rain are expected to be helpful in cutting losses from shrinkage of grain in that section.

The tall stubble has presented a big fire hazard but until Monday there had been no fire losses reported.

Sparks from exhaust pipes and broken mufflers presented the big hazard. One such occurred in a 35-acre field of Ray Cook at Hillcrest Monday afternoon shortly before the big rain hit there.

Ignited straw and stubble from a truck exhaust had a big fire going in the field of wheat, full of men and machinery. Pandemonium broke out. Men and machines moved to extinguish the flames to save the wheat and machinery as well.

Cook credits Maurice Campbell and Ray Lloyd especially for quick thinking and cool work. The fire was put out with the loss of about 30 acres of wheat. Cook's crop is the best he has had in a number of years. Help rushed in from all sides and he and Mrs. Cook asked The Hesperian to mention how grateful they are to all who helped them.

Quick thinking of an unnamed employee saved a damaging fire in Henry Hinton's field near Dougherty. Fire there was extinguished with dust without so much as moving the truck that started it.

The biggest yield of barley recorded in the county was from a field of about 120 acres belonging to Marvin Stiles on the east of northeast of Cedar. Stiles measured 108 bushels per acre from this crop. It was one of the earliest harvested. Ray Cook, who combined the crop, said he never saw anything like it before. His machine had to creep through the field.

The feature of the dinner was an address by the governor in which he urged support of the Democratic Executive Committee and declared the efforts of "splinter parties" to "divide the party." He specifically mentioned "Democrats of Texas." He said this minority group is attempting to set itself up as the majority and take over the reins of the party machinery.

Floydada's clean-up, paint-up, fix-up campaign which opened Monday was showing results this week as local citizens concentrated their clean up activity on weeds and trash around their homes.

Trash piles were growing in alleys, and vacant lots were showing an improved appearance as weeds were cut and trash cleaned and placed in the alley for pick up.

During June the Floydada Chamber of Commerce clean up committee has asked local residents to cut the weeds and clean up their homes. Vacant lots and rent property. Alleys should also have special attention, committee members point out.

This week Floydada business men were asked to check the alleys back of their business houses and put a clean up and weed cutting program into action.

## Pass On Wheat Quotas Friday

Voting places for the referendum to be held June 20 on marketing quotas for the 1959 wheat crop have been announced. The locations are as follows:

The Beacott Office, Lockney; ASC Office, Floydada; Poole Grain Co., Dougherty; Dial and Clubb Elevator, South Plains.

Eligible voters may cast their ballots at their local polling places any time between the hours of 8:00 and 7:00 p. m. on June 20.

Farmers who are eligible to vote in the wheat quota referendum are all those who in 1959 will have more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest as grain on a farm, except those who are participating in the 1958 feed wheat program.

Feed wheat participants are permitted to grow up to 30 acres of wheat for use only on the farm where grown, without being subject to marketing quota penalties.

If at least two-thirds of the growers who vote in the referendum approve the quotas, they will remain in effect for 1959-crop wheat.

Price support will be available to farmers who comply with their farm wheat allotments at a national average of not less than \$1.18 per bushel, or 75 percent of parity.

If the quotas are not approved by at least two-thirds of the growers voting, they will not be in effect, and price support will be available to farmers who comply with their farm wheat allotments at a about \$1.20 per bushel, or 50 percent of parity.

## Fyffe Is Named On Gov. Daniel's Safety Commission

Clinton Fyffe of Floydada has been named to the Governor's Highway Safety Commission, it was announced last week by Gov. Price Daniel. Fyffe said he received notification and certificate of commission in May.

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## VIEW AND COMMENT

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**All God's Chillun.** Stories from all parts of West Texas, in particular neighboring towns, tell of extensive street paving plans, some of them quite ambitious, Ralls, Crosbyton, Tulla, Canyon, Spur, and others. They're re-doing the faces of their communities. Paving re-makes a town.

**Old Bugger Boo.** One of the principal deterrents to a paving program in Floydada — reason why the idea is shrugged off in some quarters — is the unhappy experience the community had nearly 30 years ago. Too many still active in local affairs who were much displeased with the handling of one of the best jobs of paving any community ever bought. It hit right in the face of the depression and the following few years were tough ones for those who had to meet the assessments. Lawsuits and hassles were common. The program was cut short of completion, too, leaving a bad drainage condition on some streets. But this is another day and there is a way to head off the bickering and dissatisfaction.

**The city's program** of street betterments that will gradually solve some of the drainage problems in the flat terrain of the town is due to be helpful. The "old timers" are reminded that their newer neighbors who have built nice homes by the score in Floydada are seething with discontent over the do-nothing attitude. They are not going to put up with it too long. They can move, you know. And leave you arguing!

**Here's Another Angle.** Some people, a "considerable sprinkle" of them, reason (falsely, we think) that the city has been slow to maintain the pavement already laid. Last winter and spring was one of the toughest periods on paving in modern history. The city couldn't do anything at the time, but they are now looking for money to put on seal coats. Seems to us the ribbon paving we have has demonstrated beyond doubt that it is worth saving. It has taken a lot of punishment and is still useable, pretty good paving.

**Imported experts** are our pet peeve in connection with public works. Imported experts who take the money and, to our way of thinking, do not give its money's worth. Beginning with the lawyers. With a town full of good lawyers who know their way around, we high tail of somewhere and pay three times too much for legal advice that does not have to stay here and live with the advice given. Then the expert engineers! Our last experience with this tribe was that they came in, took the fees, put freshmen on the job and carried the plans and blue prints off to an office in some other town, and that's the last seen of them until they came back to present the bill for expensiveness. There was no local control and no local way of getting information on how they were getting the job done. The Hesperian still has a score to settle with the last experts that hit Floydada on a municipal job. They flatly refused to give us information on a public works job. On the next public works, which we hope will be paving and will be soon, we hope the city council — this one or next one, whoever is running affairs — will see to it that the experts they hire are their servants, not their masters.

**We glorify speed,** glamorizing it in every way possible, then expect people not to enjoy it, lecturing them on safety on the highways. Perhaps we'll have less death on the roads when we have less glamour surrounding the speed that kills.

**Statehood For Alaska.** Whether there will be statehood for Alaska is one matter that continues to get attention in Congress. Some legislators are doubtful of the wisdom of breaking up the solidarity of the nation, landwise. Alaska would be a state a thousand miles from any contiguous national territory. Also there has been some doubt that the Alaskan rank and file want statehood. You and I can talk about it. The man in Congress has to make up his mind and vote one way or the other, or be a straddler.

**Rain On Flowering Wheat.** Recently we said or left the impression here or elsewhere in the paper, that rain would damage wheat that was in the flower — keep it from pollenizing. That's all wrong, we feel sure, and ought to be mentioned. Polk Goen, although a town feller and not a farmer, probably has studied wheat as much as any layman. He says the idea is a mistaken one.

**Many Are Called.** Realizing that there are going to be some more taxes for somebody to pay in Texas this year, and knowing also that a special commission is exploring all the possible sources for new revenue, expectant taxpayers have been making heavy traffic through the doors of the Tax Study Commission's office. Everyone of them has a good reason why his group should not be the fall guy.

**Pay Big Dividends.** There have been plenty of host plants for thrips, aphids, fleaoppers and even bollworms to hibernates the past mild winter, so a cotton farm operator may count on having to battle insects all through the month of June especially. W. O. Fortenberry, president of Plains Cotton Growers, says it will pay big dividends to go all-out to control insect pests and keep a field free of weeds. Early-well-matured cotton is at a premium and will be this fall, market experts say. The premium will be several dollars a bale.

**Mr. Campbell's History.** An eye-witness who also talked with other eye-witnesses is the best authority on history. Harry H. Campbell of Matador, now in his declining years, was on the ground, except for brief periods when he was off at school, when the first trails were still being traveled, before and when Motley county was being organized. So his recently published "History of Motley County" rings with authenticity. For the period before he was on the scene, he quotes the late Frank Collinson, the wandering West Texan who knew everything about everything from El Paso to Palo Pinto. Campbell's history makes no attempt to write history in the accepted style. But he tells many things which answer many of the latter-day whys. The Matador Tribune is distributing these histories at \$5 per volume. The supply is limited and if you are interested in that kind of thing the little volume is priceless.

**Give Aways Popular.** At the moment, give aways are popular with the public. Recognizing this fact, local "Harvest of Values" promoters have a good many offers of this kind in this issue of The Hesperian. Some of them you may not be interested in, others you may. But all are worthwhile. They carry no stingers. Only two that you have to be present. One is at the swimming pool, the other at the theatre. You have to go in before it is free. That's the "Free" part.

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

**Set Conference For Ginners On Electric Power**

An "Electric Ginning Conference", the first ever to be held for gin owners in the Plains-Parhandle area of Texas, will be presented in the ballroom of the Lubbock Hotel, in Lubbock, on Tuesday, July 1. It has been announced by Earl Hobbs, President of the Plains Ginners Association.

Mr. Hobbs said, "This will be an important conference for gin owners because it will enable them to adapt modern methods of utilizing electric power to their operations and so operate more efficiently with greater profit to themselves and their customers."

Hobbs said that the conference will be under the joint sponsorship of the Association, the Southwestern Public Service Company and the Extension Service.

Highlighting the conference, which will begin with registration at 8:30 a. m. will be technical talks in laymen's terms covering 7 vital areas in the utilization of electric power in cotton gins.

Floren Owen, assistant industrial manager for Southwestern Public Service Company, will speak at 9:30 a. m. His subject, which will establish the key for the ensuing talks, will be "Common Electrical Terms". Mr. Owen will be followed by Mr. Bonney, General Electric Company Electric Cotton Gin Specialist, from Dallas, speaking on "Types and Selection of Motors for Gins".

At 10:35 a. m. Mr. J. H. Vendrick, General Electric Company Sales Engineer of Lubbock will speak on "Types and Selection of Motors for Gins".

Another Lubbock man will present "Maintenance Program for Gin Motors". He is H. J. Witcher, manager of W. M. Smith Electric, Lubbock.

Following lunch, Joe Jones, Extension Service Ginning Specialist, Texas A&M College, will call the expected 300 delegates to order.

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# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

**AUSTIN** — If a fire-breathing dragon were loose on the Texas country-side -- smashing cars and their occupants, slapping down pedestrians -- there'd be no question about the need to get rid of the monster. An aroused public would demand that SOMEBODY DO SOMETHING!

In actuality innocent people are being maimed or killed every day as they go about their business. Thousands are lost every year.

But somebody is doing something. Right now, officials and private citizens are forming a state safety association, a pioneer group which finances its efforts on a voluntary basis.

Texas Legislative Council is studying traffic problems and will report to the 56th Legislature.

Bringing new weight is the Governor's Highway Safety Commission. Scores of prominent Texans answered Governor Daniel's call to give citizen support to official efforts. First Commission meeting is set tentatively for Fall.

Results thus far are encouraging. For the first 23 weeks of this year tire toll was down by 161 persons, about 11 per cent, from last year. There were 161 fewer deaths, down about 17 per cent, from '37.

Goal for 1938 is a year-long 10 per cent drop or 24 lives saved -- a real stab at the dragon.

**July Snow Storm** — Next summer's Democratic precinct conventions will be like an extra after-hours election. There'll be rival "platforms" and rival candidates, but only one key issue -- who's to control the party.

Battle lines were drawn when the State Democratic Executive Committee held its June meeting in Austin. Governor Daniel, as head of the party in Texas, called on his moderate-conservative cohorts to "show under" the liberal-labor Democrats of Texas at the conventions. He accused DOT of trying to usurp the party name for a "splinter group."

SDEEC is recommending electing precinct delegates to county conventions by primary ballot and moving primaries up to May and June. It also suggests a search for means to prevent party line crossing at primary time.

DOT is pushing for its "code of ethics" for conducting conventions and a party registration law to keep out Republicans.

Relative merits of the two "platforms" may be as confusing to some voters as a snowstorm in July. What's clear is that if the moderate-conservatives win out, Governor Daniel will continue at the helm of party affairs in Texas. If the DOT prevails, Mrs. Frankie Bushnell, national committeewoman and DOT Chairman, will take the wheel.

**SHORT SNOOTERS** — Governor Daniel has asked the State Board of Water Engineers to have ready by Dec. 1, a survey of Texas water needs that is to be presented to the next Legislature. Study is to be projected to the years 1975 and 2020.

For the fourth straight week the Texas Employment Commission reported a drop in unemployment payments. Jobless persons receiving benefits totaled 74,965 in the last report. During the spring the total soared above 91,000.

Jay Denn Howell Jr. of Waco will join Atty. Gen. Will Wilson's staff June 23 in the state and county affairs division. Howell is a former assistant U. S. district attorney.

AUGUST H. POLKARD, State Highway Department engineer has been cited and given a \$500 cash award by the Western Assn. of State Highway Officials for achievements in the use of gamma ray cameras to inspect bridge work.

San Antonio will be host city for the state's big political shindig this year -- the State Democratic Convention Sept. 9. . . . A 10 per cent hike in motor bus fares, within the state of Texas has been granted by the Railroad Commission, effective June 20. Interstate fares had already been upped 10 per cent.

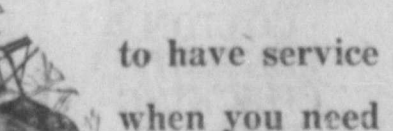

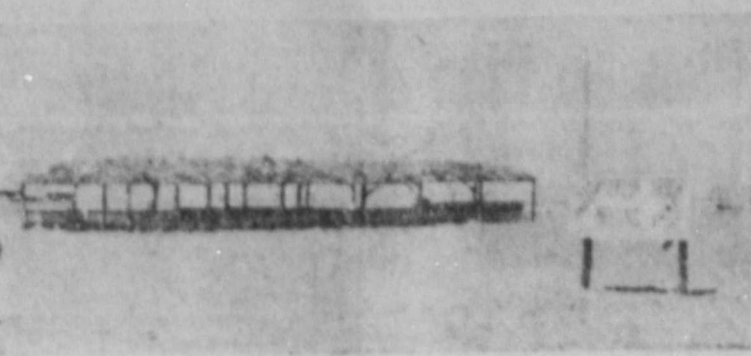

In Buying Power**

**NEW YORK, June 16** — Floyd County stood out as a vigorous, flourishing market last year, with a level of income and spending above that found in most sections of the United States.

The facts are brought out in Sales Management's new copyrighted "Survey of Buying Power" covering all parts of the country.

It shows that business activity in Floyd County reached new heights in the year, with retail stores chalking up a sales volume of \$13,223,000, topping the \$14,460,000 record of prior year.

The amount was considerably greater than might have been expected in the face of population. From that standpoint, retail business locally should have amounted to only 5088 percent of the national volume. Actually, however, it came to 5976 percent.
