Frank Stovall Is Seen as Best Man For Legislature

If the people of the 89th District choose Frank Stovall as their representative, he can and will give all of his time to the job when the legislature convenes next year.

This The Hesperian learned, by accident, in the course of an interview attempting to bring out points favorable to the candidacy of the Floyd County aspirant.

In view of the fact that his opponent has the Swisher County vote almost solidly pledged for him to assure that county continued possession of the coveted honor after six years of the incumbency of Leroy Saul; and that Stovall is going to have to spend most of the majority primary campaign away from home, this newspaper views as not unseemly that such an effort be made.

Stovall has an uphill race to make. His opponent did have a strong plurality in the first primary over his three competitors including Leroy Saul. His lead over Frank was less than 1,400, however, instead of more than 2,000 as erroneously reported in newspapers of the section immediately after the primary.

And Toliver of Hale County ran a respectable third, with W. H. Tennyson, the Briscoe entry, trailing in fourth place.

Stovall is an intense young man, not too good at shaking hands and back patting. However, he is wide open and frank about his political views.

For instance, when he announced he said he was "unilaterally opposed" to a sales tax at next year's session of the legislature.

"There needs to be a way of getting the money, if they have to have it, without a tax that will make it harder on the housewife's grocery budget," Stovall said by way of enlarging on his theme.

"A lot of people are having a hard time setting by. Among these are the people in the old age group.

"Texas does have great wealth. Also it does have thousands who are stretched across the barrel. A sales tax is not the answer. Neither is an income tax, for that matter.

"I favor going into the session with the thought that a way might be found not to increase taxes at all. They tell us that is out of the question, but things might look different in January."

Enlarging on the fact that Stovall could give all of his time to the job of legislation, if elected, the candidate was asked why he did not bear down on this point in his campaigning. It is definite that his opponent, having just finished his freshman year in law school, will have a man size job meeting his commitments as a sophomore this coming year, and would have to neglect either his studies or his job in the legislature.

"It has seemed to me I would have to be doing a little too much bragging to bring out this point," Stovall said. "It is true that I will be in my senior year, that I have the required subjects already covered in my first two years of the law school, and can finish with elective studies either this winter or next summer as I choose.

"It has been my intention, if elected, to skip the last semester of the school year and concentrate on the legislative job but I had been thinking that it would be plenty of time to announce this when I actually do it."

"If the people choose me I am going to support Waggoner Carr for Speaker of the House. The people just as well know it before they vote in the primary as afterward," Stovall said when queried on the subject. A big battle is on between Carr and Joe Burdett Jr. of Kerrville over which shall be chosen for the speakership.

"I thought Speaker Carr did a masterful job in the last legislature and although I do not agree with him altogether, I think he made a very fair speaker and was pretty well impartial in dishing out committee appointments. I prefer to serve my term under him, if the people choose me," said Stovall.

Henry G. Barber, veteran of the Vocational Agriculture teaching world in Texas is being highly honored in Dallas this week.

Monday night he was elected president of the Texas Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association and has been presiding at sessions of the annual convention, which closes today. Several hundred have been in attendance at the annual affair.

Monday night he had the privilege of presiding when outstanding superintendents of Texas high schools were honored for their aid to vocational agriculture in the state.

Tuesday morning he presided at a breakfast at which State Commissioner of Education J. W. Edgar was honored by the vocational agriculture teachers.

The sessions have been designed to better the work of the vocational agriculture teaching force in the state.

In a telephone call to Mrs. Barber at home Tuesday morning, Mr. Barber said he would not be at home for another week. He will fly Friday to Buffalo, N. Y., where he will represent Texas vocational agriculture teachers in the national congress of vocational teachers.

Liberal Slate Of Delegates Named by County Democrats

The Floyd County Democratic convention Saturday went down the line with all six of the DOT resolutions, 17 out of the 21 precincts represented with delegates present and voting.

Cedar had credentials for three delegates, who didn't make it to the convention. Goodnight, Lakeview, Dougherty and Fairview were unreported. Total voting strength of the convention was 87. The most votes Governor Daniel's sympathizers could muster on any question was 25. In the final rounds of resolution passing the opposition to the well organized majority contented themselves with a passive no vote.

County Chairman Ben P. Jyles was elected chairman of the convention by acclamation and Tommie Assiter Secretary.

The bid for convention control was made by R. E. Patterson, leader of the West Lockney delegation, who offered a slate of delegates to the state convention who would, he said back the governor in his plea for unity.

In as much as the county voted heavily in favor of the governor for a second term, Patterson said, he asked why the county would want to elect delegates who would not want to go along with him in the state convention. He also said it was the first step in organizing a delegation to the national convention. Turned down, smilingly but firmly, was his slate composed of:

Chas. Boedeker, R. E. Patterson, Marvin Shurbet, T. E. Mitchell, Ed Brown, Lon Davis Jr., Wilson Kernickel, O. J. Huggins and Chas. Daran.

J. C. Wester, who spoke against the governor's slate, said he would not want to support a Daniel delegation. He wanted to support a delegation not obligated to anybody, adding that Daniel led the delegation six years ago "in the wrong direction."

Nominated by E. C. Carter as delegates to the September 9, state convention and voted favorably 63 to 25, were W. G. Collins, B. A. Robertson, J. H. Barnard, Mrs. J. H. Barnard, W. L. Davis, Ray Sisson, Ben P. Ayres, G. B. Johnston and E. C. Carter. The resolution named W. G. Collins as chairman, and the delegation was voted to be bound by the unit rule.

Six resolutions, some positive some negative in their import, all presented by Carter as spokesman for the majority, briefed, were as follows:

That the nominees of the district delegation caucuses must be respected by the State Democratic Convention "in accordance with the letter and the spirit of the election code."

That delegates shall be pledged to the proposition that no change is needed in the present plan of the selection of delegates by popular vote.

That a workable party registration law should be enacted by the legislature.

That July and August should be retained as the first and second primary months on the election year calendar.

Also two resolutions adopted called for the State Democratic Executive Committee to give an accounting for all funds coming into its hands and declaring it the duty of "every good Democrat" to vote for the nominee of the party primaries.

The seventh and last resolution was a strongly worded vote of confidence for Frank Stovall as a candidate for the 89th District Representative as a person well qualified for the post. The resolution noted that the representative of the district has been a resident of Swisher County for the past six years.

Floyd's Current Cotton Crop Expected to Make New Record

103,000 Bales First Estimate

Floyd County's greatly reduced cotton acreage for 1958, put by ASC at 92,000 acres, is most likely to break a record for production.

The August 1 crop estimate as made officially by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., sets the figure at 103,000 bales, which is close to a record for total production and greatly exceeds any previous yield per acre in the 50-odd year history of cotton production in the county.

Cotton crop conditions on the date the estimate was made—that is, August 1, were about the best in history.

Other counties in the high plains also were estimated and the Cotton Growers and the Lubbock Cotton Exchange, after wide investigation in 23 counties of the area came up with the figures of 1,900,000 bales as a total, which will be a record breaker if future development of the crop is not hampered.

County agents, ginners and farmers furnished the information on which the estimate was based.

Although dry spots and striction from hail have affected the total for Floyd County it is also true that rains and cotton showers in many sections also have helped to enhance the total estimate.

The cotton men's organization claims that much of the irrigated land has more than two bales per acre set, and in some dry land fields more than a bale of cotton per acre is set.

The crop has fruited heavily and is making excellent progress.

Figures arrived at for Floyd County give the dry land acreage at 22,000 and the irrigated at 70,000. If the production figures stand up at cotton picking time at 103,000 this will be more than 25,000 bales in excess of last year's production on 100,000 acres.

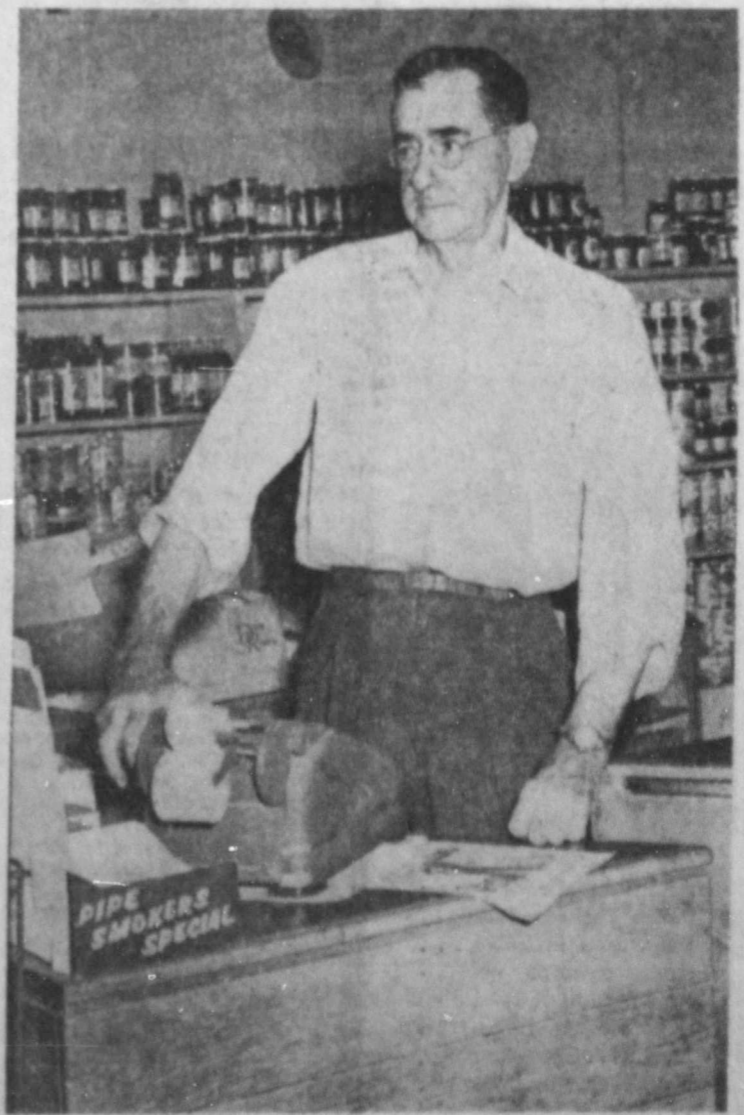

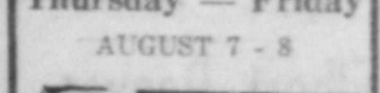

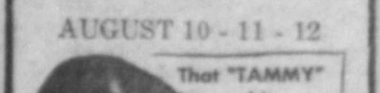

Says Floydada Is A Marriage-Minded People

(Special to The Hesperian) NEW YORK, July 29 -- Floydada is a marriage-minded city. Men and women get married earlier and stay that way longer than people in most parts of the United States.

What's the reason? One explanation has to do with income. As offered by the Bureau of the Census, which collected data on the subject, "men with better-than-average earning power have the best chances of becoming marriage partners."

And, continues the bureau, once they are married, they are encouraged by financial responsibilities to seek more substantial livelihoods.

The statistics show that with better economic status, under normal family conditions, husbands and wives have longer lives and more years together than they would otherwise.

In Floydada, 79.1 percent of the men in the population and 86.3 percent of the women, over the age of 14, have been married, as of the latest official tabulation.

Of both men and women locally of marriageable age, 81.7 percent are listed as having been married. The rest are in the never-had-been married group.

This proportion is relatively high. It is greater than the 76.6 percent average in the United States and than that in the State of Texas, 79.2 percent.

Getting married early and raising a fair-size family has been steadily growing in popularity in recent years. Since World War II, the median age at first marriage has decreased by one and one-third years. It now stands at 23 years for men and 20 years for women.

As the Census Bureau points out, the likelihood of marriage increases as income goes up. Its figures, for men over 16, show that 97 percent of those in the highest income group were married as compared with only 71 percent in the lowest income class.

How this is borne out in Floyd County is indicated by local incomes, which were at a high level. They averaged \$1,893 per capita after taxes last year, as against \$1,381 per capita five years earlier.

Moravian Sugar Bread was one of
the foods enjoyed by those atten-
ing the Freezer Workshop at Plain-
view High School on Thursday,
July 10th.
2 cups sugar
1 cup hot mashed potatoes
1 cup potato water (water in
which potatoes were cooked)
1 cup milk, scalded
1/2 teaspoon sugar
1/3 cup warm (not hot) water
1 package or cake of yeast, active
dry or compressed
9 cups sifted enriched flour
2 eggs beaten
1/2 cup shortening (half lard and
half margarine or butter) melted
and cooled
1 tablespoon salt
Topping - 1/2 cup margarine or
butter
1/2 cup light brown sugar
1/2 cup sugar and 1 teaspoon
ground cinnamon
Combine one cup of the sugar,
mashed potatoes, potato water and
milk. Cool to lukewarm. In a
small bowl combine 1/2 teaspoon
sugar and water (warm not hot,
water for active dry yeast; luke-
warm for compressed yeast). Sprin-
kles or crumble in yeast; stir until
dissolved. Stir in lukewarm potato
mixture; then 2 cups of the flour.
Cover and let rise in a warm
place, free from draft, until light
and spongy, about 1 hour. Stir
sponge down. Stir in remaining
1 cup sugar, eggs, margarine and
lard, salt and remaining 7 cups of
flour. (Dough should be soft and
sticky enough to drop from a
spoon.) Cover and let stand in a
warm place overnight. (Dough will
more than double in bulk.)
Next day divide dough equally
among 4 greased 8-inch square or
9-inch round cake pans. Let rise in
a warm place, free from draft, until
doubled in bulk, about 1 hour.
For the topping, dot cakes with
margarine or butter, pushing "dots"
gently into the dough. Sprinkle
with brown sugar, then with granu-
lated sugar combined with cinnam-
on.
Bake in moderate oven (350 de-

grees F.) 30 to 35 minutes, until
top is golden brown and springs
back when touched lightly with a
finger. Make cakes freeze and
reheat successfully.

Postage Boost Booms Business At Post Office

With the increase in postage going into effect Aug. 1, and the rush of mailing statements by business firms to meet the deadline of midnight, July 31, it seemed like Christmas in July at Floydada Post Office, said Postmaster Ed Wester Monday.

However, the volume was expected and everything went along satisfactorily.

"We did miss the number of one-cent stamps it would take to handle the three-cent stamps, post cards and envelopes that were made obsolete by the change," said the postmaster.

"From Jan. 1, 1958, to July 27, we had sold 3,328 one-cent stamps; we had 4,000 on hand and 3,000 on order, which seemed to be an ample supply, but by afternoon on August 1st this 9,000 was almost exhausted and Saturday at noon we had less than 100 on hand.

"An emergency order of 15,000 arrived in the mail Sunday morning from Dallas to relieve the situation.

"Our sales for this rush period was 15,900 one-cent stamps. The public has been cooperative in checking their mail and adding to before mailing, but the incoming mail with it due has been terrific.

"To prevent the delay of this mail the city carriers have been rendering a service to the public by paying the 1c due out of their pockets and placing a red postage due stamp on letters and leaving a slip of paper stating the amount due.

"If you receive such a notice please return the 1c to him by leaving it in the mail box."

It is customary for the carrier to return all postage due mail to the office if no one is home for payment, and leave a notice to call at the office, the postmaster added.

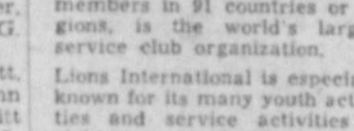

Postage Boost Booms Business At Post Office

With the increase in postage going into effect Aug. 1, and the rush of mailing statements by business firms to meet the deadline of midnight, July 31, it seemed like Christmas in July at Floydada Post Office, said Postmaster Ed Wester Monday.

However, the volume was expected and everything went along satisfactorily.

"We did miss the number of one-cent stamps it would take to handle the three-cent stamps, post cards and envelopes that were made obsolete by the change," said the postmaster.

"From Jan. 1, 1938, to July 27, we had sold 3,526 one-cent stamps; we had 4,000 on hand and 5,000 on order, which seemed to be an ample supply, but by afternoon on Aug. 1st this 9,000 was almost exhausted and Saturday at noon we had less than 100 on hand.

"An emergency order of 15,000 arrived in the mail Sunday morning from Dallas to relieve the situation.

"Our sales for this rush period was 15,900 one-cent stamps.

"The public has been cooperative in checking their mail and adding to it before mailing, but the incoming mail with its due has been terrific.

"To prevent the delay of this mail the city carriers have been rendering a service to the public by paying the 1c due out of their pockets, and placing a red postage due stamp on letters and leaving a slip of paper stating the amount due.

"If you receive such a notice please return the 1c to him by leaving it in the mail box."

It is customary for the carrier to return all postage due mail to the office if no one is home for payment, and leave a notice to call at the office, the postmaster added.

IEWS AND COMMENT

Figures Rained Out. The Hesperian's election board has not been a complete success, weather-wise, this year, but it has done a pretty fair job at that. Before Monday morning after the first primary the raindrops had eliminated all the figures put on the board Saturday night, what you'd call cotton showers in the immediate vicinity. But in considerable spots around big rains fell and have continued, partial to communities to the south, southeast and southwest, helpful all over. Give us credit for doing something about it. Only year The Hesperian made a complete failure in this respect was 1956. That year the board went up nearly a week before the primary and did not come down until almost September 1. Nary a drop. But all the other signs failed too.

Due An Apology. The writer got carried away last week, carrying a picture about the Election Board. Trying to record history, we added a full 12 years to the figures. The first election board was 42 years ago, not 56. Trouble with this explanation is that it will not be seen by the historian, if indeed the historian pays any mind, so the 56-year story will be carried as gospel truth. Things like that are what the de-bunkers are for. They serve a good purpose oftentimes.

Floyd County Democrats who feel that Swisher County is trying to make a continuing monopoly of the district's representative in the legislature have some good arguments they are overlooking. In the first place, of the two candidates ours is the only one who can go to Austin and give full-time to the job of representing the district. Like it or not the district is going to be represented in Austin by a law student. But there is a big difference in the status of the two young men in the University Law School. The Tullia had just finished his freshman year and when he returns to Austin this fall will be a sophomore in the law school. Anybody who has been a sophomore in U of T will tell you it is a full time job. How he could make an adequate representative on capitol hill and make an adequate sophomore student at school at one and the same time is a matter that cannot be resolved. One or the other, perhaps both, would suffer.

On the other hand, The Floyd County "boy" (he's older than his daddy was when he became head of a family) is in an entirely different status. He has had five full years at the University. He will begin his senior year this fall at school. He has finished "contracts," "torts" and the like, that are required in the first three years of the Law School and is now on his "electives." He can take out at Law School the end of the first semester and be a legislator — and a full-time one. His competitor cannot do that without losing a full year. He will be a sophomore with sophomore chores to do. Why Franklin has not played up these facts in his campaign we have not understood. Probably an exaggerated sense of fair play. His competitor is also a good school friend.

The way it has worked out on the public forum Stovall gets credit for being an unfinished school boy while his competitor has the role of the finished college man in the eyes of the public. One who doubts can get the facts from the files of the registrar at University of Texas.

On the same subject, it is worthy of note that Frank has yet to take the role of a straddler in the campaign. His first announcement gave his stand on all the matters of controversy extant at that time. And as others came along he has said what his attitude would be. He has even made the public announcement that if he goes to the legislature he will support Waggoner Carr for Speaker against Mr. Burkett. That is now an issue in the campaign. In our view his competitor, or opponent, has not made it clear what his attitude will be on these matters and others. All in all, aside from the

fact that he is endorsed by the home-town clubs, school people and the like, proving that he is a worthy young man with political ambition, he has not scored, as we view it.

It should be mentioned here, we think, that the Floyd County Democratic Convention Saturday gave Stovall a hearty endorsement for representative. The convention was made up of politically-minded persons. Few, if any, have any political ambitions of their own. Thus they spoke freely in the hope their action would have a beneficial effect for him.

Good reason why a state committee of the dominant political party should be sympathetic toward the governor's plans is that the governor must take responsibility for policies and credit or blame for them also. No wonder, then, that the leadership hesitates to give approval to a committeeman pledged to oppose him in all he wants to get done. Floyd County, for instance, is sending an "unpledged" delegation to San Antonio which will exert its efforts toward thwarting the announced policies of Governor Daniel. That is one of the things wrong with the precinct convention plan. The people of the county evidently would like to go along with the governor, but they won't have a chance at San Antonio, with representatives in the saddle who have strenuously opposed him and still were by their actions as late as Saturday.

We think that there may be a practical way of electing delegates to the county convention who would make it more truly representative of the people's inclinations than the present precinct convention plan. We are not sure of what it might be. But recall that six years ago the present mode of voting with a numbered stub to be signed by the voter was opposed as completely impractical by most everybody, including ourselves. It was another wacky idea of the League of Women's voters. But the women came up with a completely workable plan. There may also be a practical way of electing delegates. Surely it could not work out worse than having a delegation at the state convention which opposes the man who got more than two and a half times as many votes as all his opponents combined.

Begin Thinking Now. Take what opportunities you are offered to determine now what your attitude is going to be toward the proposed constitutional amendments when general election day rolls around. That is in November. Texas people are operating under a constitution made three generations ago. At that time the people were economy conscious. Likewise, those who were left to adopt a constitution were the lank, hungry losers in one of the most devastating wars that was ever visited on a people. Accordingly it is somewhat tinged with the times and has to be revised to meet more modern conditions. Most everybody would like to have a new constitution, but on the other hand, is afraid to turn a constitutional convention loose to make up another one. There are too many fox-like and power-hungry minorities ready to prey on the state at the first opportunity.

Announcement last week that several of the steel firms are going up on the price of steel, had considerably more impact than most any other news of the season. In shops and on farms the words best describing the reaction would be indignation mixed with consternation. It also left dealers in machinery, equipment, accessories and parts shaking their heads. What turn affairs will take on mechanized farms is hard to say. And dealers, who long since quit trying to take a reasonable markup on their new machinery, now are faced with the problem of what to do about parts going up once more, when their customers already are crying to high heaven. Steel mills need to take a long, hard look at what they are doing to the economy before they put the new prices into effect.
