## Football Here

Practice sessions for football teams are already in full swing and looking for a successful season. The teams are expected to be playing in a few weeks which is somewhat late for the season. This fall will be in District 3AA for, Post, Slaton and Abernathy, former members of the same loop are now with Morton, Otton and Lockney.

Post is expected to be weak again this fall. Last year they had only a fair ball club and lost 12 seniors to graduation in the spring. The team lost eight boys to graduation and one to the age rule since last fall. Unless the Bulldogs progress faster than expected they should not wind up in the number one slot in November.

The Whirlwinds lost heavy to graduation in May with 12 members of last year's team represented in the senior class. One or two promising replacements have moved away and until practice starts no one knows for sure what is to be in store for the green and white.

Otton which Floydada also defeated in '57 lost 12 seniors in May; Paducah only lost four and Ralls lost six seniors. The latter defeated Floydada last fall.

Tulia, the new team on the schedule, has been improving their football program and could be tough.

Lockney is expecting another good year though they lost a lot of their line men of last season. Their reserves looked good in '57 going in behind the big first string starters. How good they will be as starters themselves will have to be seen.

Abernathy is being picked as the team to beat in the Lockney district.

## Is Given Chance Of 20 At Trial

## Onion Fertilizer Results Are Tabulated On Demonstrations

An onion fertilizing demonstration this season on the Lane Decker farm was carried on by County Agent Cecil Lewis and the crop was harvested in the latter part of July.

Reporting on the demonstration Lewis had the plots arranged in eight rows.

The No. 1 plot was fertilized in the proportion of 30-50-0, the second row 90-100-0, third plot 100-50-0 the fourth 100-100-0, the fifth 100-150-0, the sixth 100-100-100, the seventh (as a check) 0-0-0.

On the eighth plot fertilizer was used 400 pounds 16-20-0; 100 pounds vitrea (45 per cent nitrogen) side dress, 50 pounds anhydrous ammonia side dress.

The fertilizer was applied before setting the onions with Nitrogen being in the form of ammonium nitrate, Phosphorus as Super Phosphate (0-45-0) and Potash as muriate of Potash.

These rows were observed all during the growing season with the rows containing 100-100-0 and 100-150-0 showing the best top growth development. The row with the fertilized rate of 100-100-100 was yellow in color which could have been from too much salt.

Poor stands were noted in the test block as well as the whole field on onions which affected yields.

The No. 8 plot was the farmers regular fertilizing program. He applied 400 pounds of 16-20-0 before transplanting and side dressed twice with applications of 100 pounds of Vitrea (45%) and 50 pounds of Anhydrous ammonia (82%). His yield, six included.

Three replications of 296 feet of row space were harvested through the field. These onions were then graded through the onion shed and the chart shows Jumbo, Medium and Culls.

Appreciation for making this demonstration successful goes to Lane Decker, who furnished the land and plants and Harry Morckel, Morckel Chemical Company, who furnished the fertilizer.

Results were as follows:

Row 1: 480 bags jumbos, 115 bags mediums, 77 bags culls, total 605 jumbos and mediums.

Row 2: 503.3 bags jumbos, 96 bags mediums, 44 bags culls; total jumbos and mediums, 599.3 bags.

Row 3: 470.6 bags jumbos, 93.3 bags mediums, 56 bags culls; total 569.6 bags jumbos and mediums.

Row 4: 685 bags jumbos, 96.3 bags mediums, 50.8 bags culls; total bags jumbos and mediums 781.3.

Row 5: 561.6 bags jumbos, 115 bags mediums, 80 bags culls; total 676.6 bags jumbos and mediums.

Row 6: 470 bags jumbos, 54 bags mediums, 67.3 bags culls; total 528 bags jumbos and mediums.

Row 7: 345 bags jumbos, 109.5 bags mediums, 43 bags culls; total 457.5 bags jumbos and mediums.

Row 8: 470 bags jumbos, 54 bags mediums, 67.3 bags culls; total 528 bags jumbos and mediums.

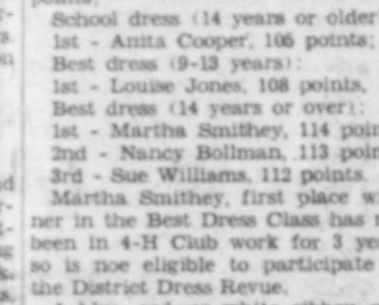

# Who Died In MacKenzie Campaign To Be Honored

The great Comanche chief, Quanah Parker, is honored in a granite monument presented by the federal government through the Veteran's Administration. Following the formal dedication at 5:30 p. m. Tuesday, Sept. 9th, the monument will remain for a time on the grounds of the Pioneer Memorial Building. It will then be removed to a reminder of the high cost of bringing civilization to Llano Estacado. Virtually nothing is known of Max's life, but it is assumed that he served the Mackenzie's forces throughout the Indian uprisings in this section which began in 1870. As the cattlemen came further west,

forcing the Indians off their traditional lands, the Indians retaliated with raids and scalplings. The raids became so numerous that the government was forced to make a concerted effort to round up the Indians and place them on reservations. In Crosby County History, "Through The Years," written and compiled by Nellie Witt Spikes and Temple Ann Ellis, there is an accounting of the Battle of Mt. Blanco between the 4th Cavalry in which Max served and the Comanches. A plundering band of Comanches had stolen 125 head of cattle from a ranch west of Fort Griffin. Col. Mackenzie with about 600 infantry and cavalrymen gave chase. At the mouth of Blanco Canyon, the Comanches stampeded and stole about 50 of the army horses. Ten men from Mackenzie's forces pursued the Indians and were led into a trap set in Blanco Canyon near Mt. Blanco. Mackenzie brought up his troops and the famous battle took place. After a stormy struggle the Indians were forced from the Canyon Walls and disappeared on the Llano Estacado. Despite the Comanche skill in throwing pursuers off their trail, the Mackenzie troops caught up with them in the area around present day Abernathy. However, luck temporarily, at least, was with the Indians and they managed to escape under cover of a nighttime storm. By 1875 the Plains Country had been cleared of Indians and the soldiers were withdrawn from Crosby County, leaving behind them such tragic remnants of an historic past and the lonely grave of Sgt. Max.

# What Papers Do I Need To See SS Man?

What documents do I need to furnish when I apply for my social security benefits? This question is frequently asked of the Social Security office, according to John O. Hutton, Manager.

When a person files an application for retirement or family insurance, some records must be furnished to establish his rights to the payments. Hutton said. The proofs most often needed are proof of age, proof of marriage, and evidence of the amount of earnings in the preceding year. Most people have an old record on which their date of birth or age was recorded many years ago, such as a baptismal certificate, school record, government record, family Bible, insurance policy, poll tax receipt, etc. Census records are sometimes available. A recently established delayed birth certificate is not sufficient proof of age for this purpose. A widow of a deceased worker who applies for monthly benefits is required to furnish proof of marriage. The marriage certificate or certified copy of it may be obtained from the county clerk of the county where the marriage license was obtained, Hutton said.

Evidence of the amount of earnings in the preceding year will specify the payment of a claim. In the case of an employee, this would be the statement of wages and taxes (Form W-2) which he received from his employer. A self-employed person should furnish a copy of his last income tax return and evidence of payment such as a cancelled check or money order receipt. A representative of the Social Security Office will be in Floydada on Aug. 18, 1958, at 9:30 a.m. at the Courthouse, Room 106.

# Korean Campaign Veterans School Privileges Named

Veterans planning to start school under the Korea GI Bill, or take correspondence courses, are urged to file their applications now, to beat the last-minute rush for the Fall Semester, said County Service Officer D. G. Ayres this week.

The VA estimates that about 649,000 Veterans, including 300,000 entrants and re-entrants, will be enrolled in schools and colleges during the School Year. By applying early, Veterans can help prevent delay in processing their papers. Ayres pointed out. A veteran is allowed 1 1/2 days of education for each day of active service, between JUNE 27, 1950 and JANUARY 31, 1955, regardless of where the service was performed, up to a maximum of 36 months. Those in service on January 31, 1955, continued to earn 1 1/2 days education for each day of active service up to the date of their first unconditional discharge after January 31, 1955. Instead of having entitlement cut off on January 31, 1955, eligibility could be built up to the 36-month maximum. Other details of the VA educational plan can be obtained by referring to the service office.

## VIEWSON COMMENT

**There's No Way of knowing exactly how much greater the actual accident toll on America's highways is than that reported in the figures of the state and national organizations committed to the work of reducing the number of deaths and economic loss on the highways. The Association of Casualty and Surety Companies, which is composed of companies which pay for most of this terrific toll and in turn pass it back to the traveling public in the form of insurance premiums collected, says the National Safety Council puts the figure at one million four hundred thousand, while the United States Public Health Service gives the tremendous figure of four million, five hundred thousand. Far more in doubt is the total number of traffic accidents that cause only property damage, on streets and highways. In addition the personal injuries which never get on the records runs into astronomic figures. So, hunting for a factual basis on which to make computations and really paint the picture for the people is practically an impossibility.**

**Workable Farm Bill.** While there's still time for it, farm leaders claim, the fact is that unless a workable farm bill does come out of the Congress and get approval of the President, the farmers of America face a drastic reduction in income next year. Cotton farmers stand to lose up to 30 percent of the acreage and wool growers will be in real trouble. What will happen to the wheat and maize man we are not informed at the moment. We can depend on Speaker Sam Rayburn getting some kind of action in the House, but the matter is more doubtful in the Senate.

**Since the casualty insurance companies do not know for sure what the overall accident picture is and how much their bills are going to climb before they level off (we refer to the accident toll, we are not sure we are through with the rise in the cost of casualty insurance. Whether the increase August 1 represents what we may anticipate as the high point or whether it may go even higher is still in doubt, we gather. There will be some people who cannot pay any such terrific figures every year as are indicated, others who can do it only under dire necessity for a way to travel. The result will be the temptation to get out on the highway without any protection for one's self or for the other fellow and chance the good fortune of getting by. The number of "illegal" vehicles surely will mount higher and higher. Already one knows that of the hundreds of cars one passes there is a large percentage which have no financial responsibility. They hit you and you are sunk unless your own insurance takes care of the matter.**

## SPANS THE IRON CURTAIN

(Wes Izzard in Amarillo Daily News)  
In all the excitement of the Middle East crisis, we nearly missed the story of the release of those nine U.S. soldiers from East Germany.

It was the American Red Cross that did the job. The diplomats had tried for weeks to get the helicopter crew out of an East German jail. Russia wouldn't talk, and the East Germans wouldn't deal unless we extended them official recognition.

Then, quietly and without publicity, the American Red Cross and East German Red Cross began negotiations. Last Saturday the men were escorted across the border into West Germany.

Of course, even the Red Cross couldn't have succeeded had the Communists been determined to hold onto their prisoners. But the incident is one more proof that the Red Cross is universally recognized as above and beyond political organizations when emergencies arise.

We bring this up in face of some petty comment the other day by Abigail Van Buren, the syndicated columnist whose daily feature appears in the Globe-Times. She wrote that "90 per cent of the letters" she received about the Red Cross were critical.

Although we doubt she had, up to that time, received enough letters on the subject to justify the glib percentage figure, we do know that some servicemen have been criticizing the organization for years.

Most of the stories we have heard concern the selling of cigarettes stamped "Red Cross," and the sale, rather than free distribution, of doughnuts and coffee.

These stories have been investigated over and over. A few instances justifying the criticism have been verified. But when pinned down, many a story turned out to be hearsay. At one time, griping about the Red Cross seemed to be the thing to do among soldiers.

Actually, though, Red Cross files are stacked with expressions of appreciation from servicemen and others. We happen to have four such letters, written to the Potter County Chapter, on our desk right now. Every one is a heart-warming expression of thanks.

We suppose the old cigarette-doughnut stories will keep bobbing up for year to come. But meanwhile the Red Cross will go on helping disaster victims, lending money to servicemen in trouble, and overriding world political barriers, as it did when it got the nine Americans out of Red jails in East Germany.


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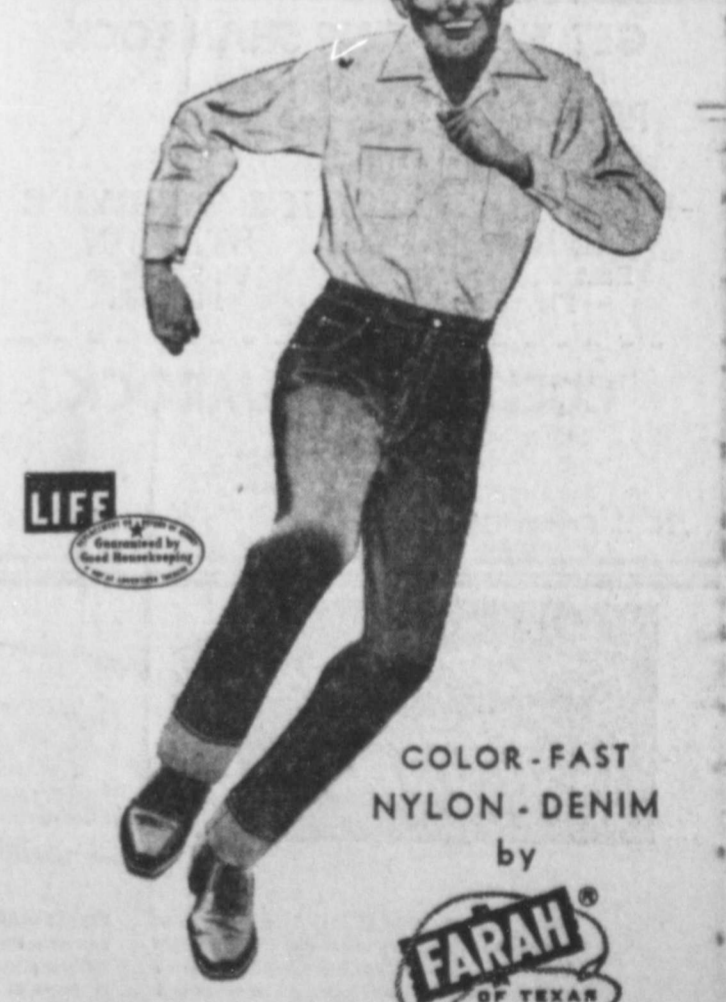

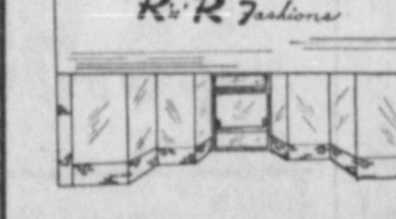

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN — Texas Legislative Budget Board is somewhat in the position of the harassed husband who's struggling with a stack of unpaid bills when his wife announces the children all need new shoes. Budget Board works out a recommended state spending plan in advance of each regular legislative session. This year, to make "ends meet," the Board will have to stretch a shorter rope over more territory.

Horst 1. For the next biennium state agencies have turned in requests to the Budget Board for \$368,000,000 more than they received for the current two-year appropriation period.

Horst 2. Official predictions indicate the state is far from having enough money to grant increases. Instead, it may start the next two-year fiscal period \$100,000,000 short of enough money just to maintain the present level of spending.

That leaves a potential gap of some \$468,000,000 between the two horns — money requested and money in sight. For the next Legislature it's a half-billion-dollar headache.

As far as can be seen, closing the gap would involve either (1) sharp cuts in state spending, (2) enactment of a fair-sized new tax or (3) letting the state government go into debt.

None of these courses likely would be either painless or popular. Third possibility is virtually prohibited by the Constitution which says no appropriation in excess of revenue in slight can be passed "save in the case of emergency and imperative public necessity and with a four-fifths vote of the total membership of each house."

In the past the Budget Board has limited its spending recommendations to foreseeable revenue under existing tax laws. Making up the board are the lieutenant governor, speaker of the house and eight other legislators.

More Here, More There — How did new money requests get up to \$368,000,000 when the present state budget is at an all-time high of more than \$2,000,000,000?

Big figure results from a lot of requests from a lot of state departments and institutions. Examples: State colleges, faced with increasing enrollment, want \$40,000,000 more.

State Water Board, charged with a stepped-up water conservation planning program, asked for a nearly doubled appropriation of \$3,990,100.

Hospitals and special schools asked for a 31.5 per cent increase, up to \$114,000,000.

State Youth Council asked substantial increases for the facilities it operates including a 22.3 per cent increase to \$4,748,000 for the severely overcrowded Oakville School for Boys.

"How Much" Labels — Budget Board has proposed enactment of a "price tag" procedure to help lawmakers keep track of just how much measure they consider would cost.

Suggested bill would require that each spending bill be accompanied by an itemized list (with prices) of the expenditures it would involve.

It was seen as a means of keeping a tighter check on the tax dollar.

More Time For Teaching — Giving teachers fewer extra chores and more time to teach, has been suggested as a means to relieve the shortage of qualified instructors.

Texas Education Agency conducted a survey on ways to make better use of existing teachers and school buildings. Resulting report noted the many miscellaneous tasks that fall to teachers — keeping up with lunch money, football tickets and charity drives; sponsoring athletic events and special programs; keeping extensive records. Use of teaching aides and secretaries was suggested to free teachers to concentrate on class work.

In regard to building use, the report suggested consideration of a longer school year, a longer school day greater use of special purpose rooms such as laboratories, shops, homemaking departments, etc.

Fresh Start — After months of upheaval and dissension, the State Insurance Liquidator's office is re-organized and off to a new start.

C. H. Langdeau, newly appointed liquidator, has announced the names of nine attorneys who will make up his legal staff.

They are Cecil C. Rotsch, general counsel, John R. Grace, Clay Cotton, V. F. Taylor, Horace Wimberly, Art M. LeCroux, J. C. Thomas, William Colburn and Hoyt Cole.

Missing from the scene will be Rene Allred Jr. who had been appointed by Dist. Judge Charles O. Betts as receiver for all insurance liquidation cases in his court. Betts had refused to accept Langdeau as receiver. Langdeau was appointed by Insurance Commissioner William A. Harrison.

Situation was resolved when the State Supreme Court ruled that Betts must accept Langdeau.

Langdeau said his staff would have to do extensive investigating before deciding whether to pursue a \$15,000,000 damage suit Allred had filed in connection with the ICF bankruptcy. Suit charges some 34 different corporations, including some famed names in the financial world, with having some responsibility for the building up of a fraudulent enterprise.

More Money for Farmers — An overall increase of 3 per cent in Texas farm prices is reported by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Principal gain came in higher prices for new-season cotton, hogs, beef cattle and calves. Slight gains were shown for corn, oats, barley, hay and potatoes. Dairy products, poultry eggs registered a seasonal increase.

On the minus side, lower prices were reported for cottonseed, vegetables, food grains, lambs and sheep. Texas 1958 calf crop is expected to total 3,919,000 head, a 5 per cent increase from last year.

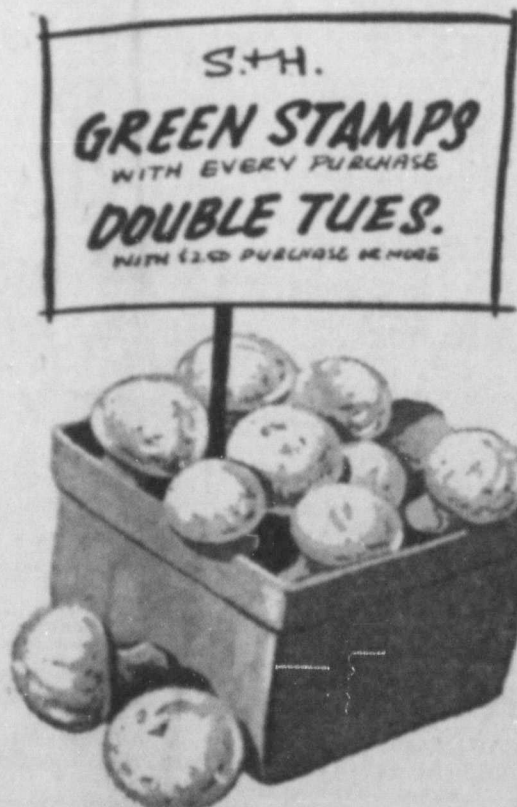
