

EDITORIAL VIEWS AND COMMENT

Courtesy Pays Off. While there is still much to be done to accomplish greater safety on the highways and on the streets of communities, educational efforts made thus far have not been fruitless. One notes much more courtesy and consideration on the highways than was prevalent brief years ago. Matter of self-preservation has proven courtesy much the wiser policy. So many thousands more vehicles on the road should take a much greater toll of life and property if the public were not responding to safety precautions. Courtesy is the magic word. There still are discourteous people driving, of course, and all of us have an occasional lapse of thoughtfulness, but by and large driving is fully as safe as it was five years ago, when millions less cars were on the highways.

Good Roads Help. The skill of the engineer should not be overlooked in connection with the increased safety which marks highway driving. How to build roads that are safer, and install road markers that bring quicker and more positive response psychologically is a study which the engineers have carried on with marked success. How to arrive at a decision quickly and positively that will be the correct one at intersections and junctions is one of the aids which the engineer has given to be helpful for the driver.

John Nance Garner, the 90-year-old Texan who served in responsible places in his nation, was honored last week by men high in the Democratic party on his ninetieth birthday. Garner quit the capitol when FDR insisted on running for a third term. He fell out with the president over that overt act but he had already had a belly full of the sitdown strikes and the high court packing fuss. Reminder that about the worst thing that ever befell the nation was Franklin Roosevelt's third and fourth terms. Had he only had his fill of the highest honors and followed the example of George Washington! How Mr. Roosevelt did throw his weight around and let his hunches take the place of cold reasoning! Many of our present-day ills can be charged to bad judgment of a sick man.

Incidentally Mr. Garner said he'd never be back "north of the Potomac" (meaning Washington) so long as he lived. That was when he left. He has not been back and he has insisted on not being quoted on national affairs. Texans have every reason to admire Cactus Jack, and to be proud of the part he played when he was an actor on the national
