#### Porkers Meet Peaceful End



A new, humane method for slaughtering meat animals has been developed and is now in use in large food processing companies throughout the nation. Here hogs are led onto a conveyor belt that carries them through a tunnel containing an odorless, non-toxic mixture of air and carbon dioxide gas. In less than 30 seconds each hog peacefully drops to sleep and rides out completely unconscious.

Developed by the Ranarex Instrument Department of the Permutit Company, the system speeds production and chows smooth, non-bruising handling methods that improve meat quality. One tunnel will immobilize up to 600 hogs an hour according to the manufacturer, Allbright-Nell Co. of Chicago.
