

"No public necessity existed for the bank, and the volume of business would not be sufficient to indicate profitable operation of the bank," Woodrum was told in a letter from . M. Falkner, who is state banking commissioner, "The application did not measure up favorably to all the factors which have to be considered. the letter added.

Woodrum did not get the news of the refusal to grant the charter until Monday and that by letter.

The Hesperian, also promised a report immediately the decision was announced, had no information until it was picked up on the streets Sat-

The application was filed on July 29, after the stock was subscribed in the first week of July. The applicants had anticipated a routine hearing and confidently expected a favorable answer. They sought to get a charter for a \$300,000 bank, with the funds designated as \$150,000 capital, \$100,000 surplus and \$50,000 undivid-

In their application the 54 stock-holders named M. P. Goen, L. L. Jones, O. M. Watson Sr., Richard F. Stovall, J. M. Willson Jr., and Wal-ter A. Woodrum as directors, with Woodrum as president, Watson vice

Strong opposition to granting the charter was voiced by the First National Bank, after purchase of a controlling interest in the bank was made by C. E. Fulgham and others of Lubbock. Fulgham is the repre-sentative of this interest on the board

The sale represented one of the biggest local deals made in 1958. In the deal 795 shares of the bank tock went to new owners at \$659,820. The hearing on the application for the new bank's charter was held in October. The First National Bank of Lockney joined in the protest.

The Banking Board deferred action on the application at the time and also deferred a decision on the reguar meeting dates in November and
