EDITORIAL VIEWS AND COMMENT

Texans are reading about the hard luck their state's many departments, schools and institutions are having. It is the season of the "hard luck story," as the report from Austin has it. Of the many stories of this kind which the appropriations committee hears we are most prone to give full credence to that of the director of the State Prison System. We can understand such things as losing a 3,000-bale crop of cotton in the floods last year, which the management had banked on to help meet expenses. We can also understand that the legislature borrowed for a special session a \$500,000 nest egg the system had put away to meet emergencies of the last three months of a fiscal year. We can understand that when these two disasters hit the system almost within one year it left them short of money with which to operate.

Meanwhile population figures of the prison have grown by leaps and bounds. Commissioner Ellis spoke of "stackin" the prisoners, of inadequate sleeping quarters and the like, and the expectation that "the lid will blow off" if relief is not obtained. All of which would be only a matter to be checked. If true, the state must get money from some source. If the prison system is down to its last dollar, then that is that.

On the other hand, a problem which may be equally as meritorious, presents itself from the "other end" of the state's sprawling system of education and welfare. It is the need for more adequate support for the land grant colleges, University of Texas and the A & M College system. The university will sink back into mediocrity, says President Logan, if the recommendations of the legislative budget board are carried out. The school already is losing some of its bright, young minds, lured off to other schools where they are better paid than in our state.

The difference in the two appeals is that such minds as direct The Hesperian can understand what Mr. Ellis is saying, Mr. Logan speaks in a strange tongue. To us he is away out in space, as it were, when he speaks of a University of the first class. But we quickly catch the import of the loss of 3,000 bales of cotton. We would not belittle the university needs and desires. We simply understand what Mr. Ellis says and don't catch all the import of President Logan's ap-

Helpful in UT's appeals will be thousands of alumni, whose pride in the University will cause them to support President Logan and get sympathetic hearings. Mr. Ellis' graduates will not be so helpful.

Corporations can't vote so they are likely to catch it when the appropriations committee makes its final report and the legislature comes to make up the tax levies. Twice already corporations as such have had raises since other types of taxpayers have. The tax is based on the capital investment and "capital investment" is made to include any borrowed money the corporation reports. Thus if a corporation has \$50 thousand capital and has \$5,000 borrowed to carry on its operations the law calls the "capital investment" \$55,000 for taxpaying purposes. If corporations are "malefactors of great wealth", as some phrase coiner has called them, they are getting consistent, that is punitive, treatment.

The Farm Bureau is still plugging away in its efforts to get a better animal health program in Texas. In particular at the moment their efforts are to interest the legislature in brucellosis eradication and control. If you feel that the Farm Bureau is on the right track drop a note to your senator or representative and tell him so. Things like that are technical to some extent and don't appeal to the average legislator because they are out of the range of his thinking.
