

In a recent poll of the nation's. independent business by the National Federation of dent Business, 88% voted in favor of placing cooperatives on the same tax basis as independent enterprise.

It is a measure long sought by

independent businessmen, not only to plug a tax inequality, but also make the market place a fairer procedure. ... Many years ago, special

passed to enable farmers C.W. Harder to form cooperatives for the orderly marketing of their crops. And it is without doubt that in marketing plans immensely aided agriculture.

But the law was written on such a broad basis that now there are many cooperative en-terprises that have about as much relation to the farmer as the Kremlin has to the Vatican. Thus, in the field of manufac-

turing, wholesaling and retailing. and even in certain areas of fin ance, there are profit making cooperatives competing with independent enterprise carrying the tax burdens, im-

And in this day and age when any small corporation which pays at least 52% of all profits over \$75,000 in a year in federal income taxes, it is quite obvious the competitive edge that is gained by a competitive edge that gained by a competing enter-prise that can set itself up as a cooperative.

It appears obvious that a great deal of the current inflation has been unwittingly promoted by taxing policies which have put the squeeze upon small business so that normal expansion has been hampered. Thus, for example, a committee headed by Sen. Estes Kefauver, is probing the present prices of bread.

Yet in some markets the bread business is controlled by a baking organization set up as a cooperative, a huge grocery chain with its own bakeries, and the local branch of a huge national baking operation.

While price competition existed between these three disparate operations until the local in dependent bakeries were driven out, today there is a strange unanimity of pricing even though all three should have different pricing structures.

Thus, if as some experts pre-dict, the cost of living, princi-pally in foods, are due to increase about another two per-cent in 1959, it is obvious that elimination of independent com-petition is an impetus to inflation, not a deterrent, and the public loses, instead of gains, propoganda to the effect that mass merchandising is more economical to the contrary.

It also appears obvious that taking policies which make it impossible for small firms to stay in business and thus offer the public a broader range of products and brands at different prices, is the road to ruin.

It becomes quite evident when small business is taxed out of existence, there is bound to be inflation. The only other alternais not a pretty picture.







that their legislators take ample care of the prisoners of the state and of the people with unsound minds, who are wards of the state. If we are too poor to have an educational system that is up to par and too poor to do many of the other things that it would be good to do, we should certainly make any needed sacrifice to care for the helpless and provide facilities to rehabilitate the offenders against society. Some of this last category are killers, some confirmed criminals. Other hundreds make their first trip behind prison bars for the first time every year. There is such a thing as a crime against humanity, the kind we have in mind being one which only people of the state and their legislators can commit. We think we are about up to the point where an indictment for this crime should be brought by public opinion.

Sorry news comes out of Crosby County where a high class boy let easy money rub off on him while holding down the responsible position of sheriff. Lack of proper records and checks and general carelessness were at the inception of the wrong-doing. Peculations which may run into a considerable sum of money began a year or two ago. How much money wrongfully was taken and put to personal use will never be known. Also much of the abuse probably grew out of the careless handling of cases of under-privileged people (meaning Negroes and Mexicans). Law loses much of its dignity when the arresting officer also becomes the judge and jury, and the sense of responsibility to humanity becomes blurred. The same state of mind that permits a person in a place of trust to take money that doesn't belong to him also works usually to make him careless of what he does with the money. So that his life is ruined, a shadow is cast over his family's future, and none of the money is left with which to make restitution or to provide for the family. Nothing much a man's friends can do for him when he gets in that position. Regrets for them, remorse for him.

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

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
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




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### Eighteen Pass **Driving Test**




