





EDITORIAL VIEWS AND COMMENT

The non-highway gasoline tax rebate has been running about \$16 million a year in Texas, most of this refund money going to farm operators. The tax proposal before the Texas House is to take one-fourth of this \$16 million to help operate the state's business. It is notable that although this item has not had a hearing before a committee it has been included in the proposed bill. Several things of this nature that are coming to light in study of the Omnibus Tax Bill make us arrive at the conclusion that the measure will not muster enough support to pass.

There's no likelihood we can see of agreement in the legislature on a tax bill. An extra session of the legislature we would almost bet on. A lot of good measures are due to be trampled under foot and much committee study wasted, because of the tax law clashes.

REA Legislation Doubtful. It would be a miracle now if the law the rural electric coops want passes the legislature and gets the governor's signature. The bil has been sent to the attorney general's department for a ruling on its constitutionality. This ruse has beaten many a measure in the past. We have thought the change in the law one which the coops are entitled to as a matter of fairness..

Abandoned Property Bill. The governor is right in his position that abandoned property should belong to the state, rather than to be continued to be used by private individuals and corporations for their own profit. The moneys mentioned have had no known owners for seven years. If the owners cannot be found after diligent effort, the state's eccheat laws should govern. The American Bar Association is among the organizations which have recommended similar laws in other states.

For A Good Cause. The celebration coming up in May which will observe th fiftieth anniversary of the incorporation of Floydada will serve a good cause if there are any funds left after expenses are paid. We never heard of a celebration making money but if this one does the amount will go into a fund for replacing street markers which time and vandals ,the city and the highway. department dissipated. If there ever was a town needed to make sense with treet markers this it it. If it takes a celebration to get street markers put up we hope to see this one make \$5,000. Any way, it's all in fun. Why not go along with it?


